# **Changes in Store for our Library**

Te love being a vibrant hub of the Beechmont neighborhood. As we continue to fulfill our role as the cornerstone of learning for a lifetime, we take seriously our mission to be a neighbor and leader in this community. We are alert to how we can improve the delivery of library services and maintain a safe, welcoming and accessible environment for all library users.

The first six months of 2007 were marked by significant change in our neighborhood and at the library. Working together with neighbors and community leaders; Louisville Metro Police Department; Jefferson County Public Schools; software vendors and others, we have pulled together several improvements to the Iroquois Branch Library that will pay dividends for years to come. And the best part of it all? It is just a start. We will continue to anticipate, innovate and respond to change.

The Library's fine relationship with the Louisville Metro Police Department is now better than ever. The spirit of cooperation shows itself in several ways, including on-going, regular conversations between folks on every level of both the LMPD and the Library. We, of course, want the police to consider the library as a second home, using our information resources, participating in community events and being a presence. The police want to be a presence in a quiet, comfortable and welcoming place where they also get to know the people of this community. It is quite a synergy at work!

Not only has LMPD been extremely helpful, we recently added selective contract security to the Iroquois branch, and other branch libraries. All of us know that having a wise, friendly and attentive security guard in place does not solve everything, but we think it is another piece to help make the environment safe and comfortable for us all.

As life-long education is one of our core missions, the Library considers its support of Jefferson County Public Schools one of the most important services we perform. Now it is more so. For instance, in the Beechmont neighborhood, library leaders met with school principals, counselors and security officials to make sure we are doing all that we can to support each other. The spirit is positive and early rewards terrific. We know the awesome task the school system faces with respect to truant kids and we are solid in our support of JCPS. We do engage children in conversation who are in the library during school hours. We are learning that the few children who are there during the school day usually have a valid reason for being there.

One of the great lessons we have learned is: talk to kids; show them you care about their well-being and their education. We are never too smart or too established to learn new skills. We continue to stress to all our staff that we need to better understand how to work well with kids, especially teenagers. And we helped develop special training on that topic. The results of the training have been outstanding. Staff people are happy to have new techniques and understanding as they work with kids.

Over the next several months, all of us will see some physical changes in the Iroquois library. We are still working on the plans, but one of the changes will involve reorienting public computers to be more user- and staff-friendly. In the meantime, we have installed several software enhancements that allow the public to do more things with our computers. Google Earth and a program to allow patrons to manipulate photography, for example. Time-management software makes it easier for the patrons to have access at any time of the day to the public computers. Volume control software helps control noise in that



very busy branch.

We hope you have had the opportunity to meet Lisa Sizemore, the new branch manager. She comes to Iroquois after several years of being the manager of the children's department at the Main branch of the Library. If you have not met her, do yourself a favor. Her excitement about being at Iroquois and being a part of this wonderful neighborhood is infectious. Lisa, the Iroquois Branch Library and the Beechmont neighborhood, smashing synergy that equals success for everyone.

#### Louisville Metro Police 4th Division Beechmont Newsletter Reported Offenses for May



Overall criminal offenses in Beechmont are at or below historic levels. The following reported totals occurred in May for your neighborhood:

- 12 Burglaries (which includes residential, business and garages/sheds)
- · 10 Criminal Mischief/Vandalism
- 6 Auto Thefts (Half of these were due to the keys being left in the ignition)
- 8 Thefts from Auto

There were no obvious patterns or trends to any specific offense. It should be noted that the Speedway at 3rd and Amherst has been burglarized in the early morning hours (@ 0300) on two recent occasions. If you are in the vicinity of the Speedway during this time frame, please report any suspicious activity to dispatch at 574-7111. Overall reported offenses are consistent with the levels the neighborhood typically experiences this time of the year. Offense totals usually increase in warmer weather, and decrease during periods of sustained cold temperatures.

- · Keep your car doors locked and windows up when your vehicle is unattended.
- · Never leave valuables in plain-view inside your vehicle.
- · Never leave your car running while unattended.
- · Never leave garage doors open.....this is an open invitation to thieves.

- · Keep prescription medications out of sight of visitors to your home.


