

Day Of Caring

Tuesday, September 11, 2007
Trident United Way's Day of Caring is an annual, community-based event rallying thousands of people in the Tri-county area to roll up their sleeves and tackle projects for area schools and helping agencies.

Volunteer teams from local businesses and organizations give time and services in an effort to improve our community.

Area schools and non-profits identify project(s) that volunteer teams can complete in one day. Projects range from reading to students, to minor construction – anything that would improve service to clients or enrich our community.

Projects are posted online for volunteer teams to review and choose the one(s) that best fit their size, skills, passions, etc.

Last year, more than 100 volunteer groups participated. Ninety local businesses gave their employees the day off so

that they could be part of the event. In the past seven years, Day of Caring has provided more than 23,000 volunteers to work on almost 1,300 projects, for an estimated donated value of \$6 million.
