Also, I would like neighbors to consider the a few simple home security tips offered by law enforcement officials to deter crime: Keep outside lights on at night or install motion sensor lights. Make sure to keep vehicles, sheds, garages locked and valuables out of sight.

Lastly, I would like for us to keep things in perspective in terms of crime rate. Our most recent crime report showed that the Beechmont area is low compared to the other neighborhoods of the 4th division. In my travels through the neighborhood, I

have noticed an increase in numbers of basketball goals at the street and also more yard parking. I'm asking the membership to call Metrocall at 311 or e-mail metrocall@louisvilleky.gov and report these violations. These are quality of life issues for which the city has established ordinances to preserve our community. The basketball goals at the street pose both a safety hazard to the children playing in the street as well as the motorist navigating them. The city can and has removed this type of equipment from the roadway to bring about compliance with metro ordinances. In regards to yard parking, property owners can be fined \$100.00 on the spot for said violation. If you are in violation of the above we ask you respectfully to stop.

#### **Reported Offenses for July**

Overall criminal offenses in Beechmont are at or below historic levels. The following reported totals occurred in July for your neighborhood:

- ♦ 13 Burglaries (which includes residential, business and garages/sheds)
- ♦ 10 Criminal Mischief/Vandalism
- 8 Auto Thefts (Many of these were due to keys being left in the ignition)
- 9 Thefts from Auto

There were no obvious patterns or trends to any specific offense. Overall reported offenses are consistent with the levels the neighborhood typically experiences this time of the year. Offense totals usually increase in warmer weather, and decrease during periods of sustained cold temperatures. Also, general disorder related problems, such as noise, graffiti, vandalism, and loitering usually decline when children return to school from summer break. There has been an increase in street robberies and assaults in the Southside Drive area over the summer, just outside the boundaries of Beechmont.

An analysis of the data does not indicate this has spilled over to your neighborhood, but please continue to exercise vigilance and good personal safety techniques in whatever part of our community you frequent.

You can now access crime data pertinent to your address at www.lojic.com and select "interactive maps". Then select Metrowatch maps and enter your street address.

#### **Tips and General Information**

- ♦ Keep your car doors locked and windows up when your vehicle is unattended.
- ♦ Never leave valuables in plain-view inside your vehicle.
- ♦ Never leave your car running while unattended.
- ♦ Never leave garage doors open...this is an open invitation to thieves.
- Never allow strangers inside your home or vehicle.
- Keep prescription medications out of sight of visitors to your home.

Remember to contact the TRU at 574-4661 to report less serious offenses by phone. They are available from 6AM to 10PM, Monday through Friday.

ast year, volunteers, street sweepers and cleanup crews collected more than 850 tons of litter in Louisville. Metro government spends about \$2 million each year to clean up litter and trash.



Residents can help reduce litter and give Louisville an assist by:

- ♦ Placing trash in the proper receptacle putting cigarette butts in an ashtray, securing paper and other items in your car so they don't blow out the window and properly sealing garbage containers.
- ♦ Carrying a litterbag in your vehicle or on your bicycle.
- ♦ Reporting a litterer, by calling Metro Call 311 or 574-5000. If you see motorists throw trash or cigarette butts out the window, get the license plate number and the city will send the litterer a letter warning them of potential criminal penalties.
- Making your church, school or community celebration a litterfree event by contacting Metro-Call 311. Brightside will provide signage and trash receptacles, and the organization simply provides volunteers.
- ♦ Recycling materials to save landfill space, energy and natural resources. Most litter is recyclable.
- Volunteering for Brightside's Fall Community-Wide Cleanup on October 27 or organizing a neighborhood cleanup. Brightside will provide free bags and gloves.

When you see litter, pick it up and "Take it to the Basket!"





