

Betty Voit recently saw a blind person with a guide dog trying to make his way up Stilz Avenue from Grinstead to Frankfort, only to be blocked by several of those new, mammoth city garbage cans scattered on the sidewalk.

"The guide dog stopped and made no effort to move sideways," Betty said. "The blind person felt about with his hand for awhile, then stepped into this very busy street to get past the garbage cans."

Betty made the point that the blind person could have been killed. Each homeowner, she said, should see that trash cans don't block the walkway - even if it means acting quickly to move them after the sanitation workers leave.

Arboretum Trees for Crescent Hill

The Crescent Hill Community Council has a great tree-planting program, which works in conjunction with the Crescent Hill Garden Club. Here's the deal:

A tree expert comes out and has a look at your yard. If there's a good spot for a nice tree, some place it would be readily visible to your fellow Crescent Hillians, the council and the club will pay half the cost of a nice arboretum-quality tree, maybe something unusual. The project seeks to place less-common trees that are suitable to the site, and to the Ohio River Valley.

All you have to do is water it carefully for the first couple of years, and take care of it according to instructions you will be given free of charge. It's a piece of cake. Residents of the community will be grateful for your thoughtfulness decades, maybe a century or more from now.

CCTV Keeps Print Clear for Visually Challenged at Crescent Hill Library

The acronym stands for "closed circuit Televison," and that's how the thing works. It takes a picture of a page and projects it onto a video screen, in a clear picture several

times the size of the original. Crescent Hill Library branch manager Debra Oberhausen put the device in the branch's periodical reading room, where it is handy to magnify small print in documents to be found there.



But Debra said that in California, where the devices are in

widespread use in libraries, staff members have tound that the elderly often use them for such chores as balancing their checkbooks. It is easy to put a hand and a writing implement into the area viewed. A tryout shows it is indeed phenomenal. A person could thread a needle with a really small eye in that thing.

The device was purchased for the library branch with funds from the Crescent Hill Community Council. Library staff is standing by to show patrons how to use it. They'll be glad to answer questions about it at 574-1793.







WHEN TO PLANT: Although we are now suffering through the worst of the summer season, fall will be here soon. And fall is, with certain exceptions, the best season to plant trees, shrubs, and many perennials. When leaves fall, roots continue to grow until the ground is frozen; plants are better able to withstand the onslaught of bad weather if roots are well established. So if you plan to rejuvenate your garden this year, plant a tree or shrub, or persuade your neighbor to give you a start of that wonderful perennial -- start your planning now.

PROTECT YOUR NEW TREE: More trees are killed by lawn mowers and string trimmers than any other cause. Even the best of mowers occasionally dings a tree. So protect your investment by placing a TREE AND PLANT GUARD around your new tree. Inexpensive and it works. Contact T. 

School Board Member Steve Imhoff Reports on Crescent Hill Schools


