





Among those present at King Park (between Orange/Lemon, 19th/20th Streets) were Mayor Bob Foster, his mother (traveling in a wheelchair propelled by the Mayor), First Lady Nancy Foster, Vice Mayor Bonnie Lowenthal, Council Members from the Sixth District and Val Lerch and the City's Human Dignity Coordinator Melissa Morgan.




The Sixth District Office Council welcomed participants, and said the event meant to focus on the principles for which Dr. King Mayor stood. Foster said the gathering is tribute to Dr. King's teachings

Mayor Bob Foster and famous motorcycle manufacturer — and Long Beach native — Jesse James yesterday unveiled the Long Beach 2030 Plan Van, a mobile classroom customized by James and his West Coast Choppers shop meant to travel around the city and encourage residents to share their views for the future of Long Beach.

The van, a Ford van sitting on 22" rims and sporting graphics of downtown landmarks on its side, will attend community events such as schools, farmer's markets, senior centers, parks and parades in order to reach out to the community. The main purpose is to engage and educate residents while asking for feedback about the things that can be done to benefit their lives.

Community Code Enforcement (CCE)


SPEAKER: Karl Wiegelman, Supervisor for the City of L.B. February WANA Meeting

If anytime you have driven around the neighborhood and have seen homes that with chipped paint, roofs that are in need of replacement, or a fence that is falling down, you are witnessing city code violations (just a few of many). These conditions make a neighborhood look run down thereby decreasing property values. CCE program came to Wrigley about 9 years ago but we are in jeopardy of losing it because of lack of attene dance and participation. To help stir 💚 up interest again, Karl Wiegelman, 💚 Code Enforcement Inspector/ Supervisor for the City of Long Beach Seach will be on hand to explain the CCE w program details and will be looking to V recruit CCE Block Captains in Wrigley.


Captains get assigned blocks (not the block in which they live) to monitor and report property deficiencies (such as: deteriorated fences, roofs, chipping paint, and trash/debris) at monthly meetings with Code Enforcement Inspectors where they submit their ANONYMOUS referrals. coming Block Captains will be briefed and trained on their roles and responsibilities before they begin.

f we want to maintain the best living conditions for our neighborhood and make sure our property values continue to rise, then we MUST NOT lose 💖 this vital program.
