AQUARIUM A Night at the Aquarium

A Special Family Program from The Florida Aquarium

Bring your children, neighbors, and friends on Thursday evening, February 28, for a uniquely different Bay Crest Civic Association program presented by The Florida Aquarium. The aquarium, located on Channelside Drive in Tampa, is a 250,000 square foot world-class aquatic facility. Opened in March 1995, the aquarium tells Florida's unique water story as it follows a drop of water from its underground source to the open sea. It is home to more than 20,000 aquatic plants and animals both native to Florida and from all over the globe. Since opening, the Aquarium has provided cultural enrichment experiences to more than seven million visitors, including 100,000 school students and teachers annually.

For our special Bay Crest program, an animal expert will offer an entertaining and informative presentation featuring a number of live animals. **Ms. Wendy Meers**, Education Outreach and Animal Coordinator for the aquarium, will speak about aquarium operations, programs and exhibits. She will also introduce several small several traveling companions ... small critters that we'll be able to see "up close and personal."

The meeting will begin promptly at 7:30 PM, at the Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church Family Life Center, 6100 Memorial Highway. Come at 7:00 PM for the social hour and our usual fine selection of refreshments.




TREASURER'S REPORT

As of January 30, the Association has a treasury balance of \$12,101.88. We currently have 596 paid members, or about 64 percent of the homes in Bay Crest Park.

Our annual dues are only \$10 (or more if you choose). This assures continuation of the many benefits each resident gains from our Association. Remember, we are a Civic Association, not a Homeowners' Association with mandatory dues. We are supported entirely with membership donations and by the continuing dedication of many volunteers. SECRETARY'S REPORT

President Juli Milas called the meeting to order at 7:30pm. Gil Leimbach recited the Pledge of Allegiance. He also announced that protocol allows retired military to salute the flag rather than placing a hand over the heart.

Juli thanked Norm Coffman for coordinating the Wesley Memorial facilities for our meetings. Norm acknowledged and wished everyone happy holidays. Juli thanked Gil and Gwen Leimbach for hosting refreshments for the meeting, and also Lynette Peel for providing decorations for the meeting room.

Board members were asked to stand and be recognized. Juli noted that Theresa Shell had been affirmed as a new Board Member. Theresa will also be acting as Secretary in an interim period, filling in for Lisa Lovelace.

Juli reported on meeting with Reverend Clark Edwards, the new pastor of Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church, our hosts for each meeting. She expressed the Association's appreciation for use of church facilities. Reverend Edwards, in turn, offered his continued support to the Association.

Gil Leimbach announced that we received an unidentified membership dues check with the name **Bridget** and **David Terry** to members to see if anyone knew these individuals. No one was familiar with the names. He reported also that as of October 31, our bank balance was \$111,017.72, with 587 paid members, or 63% of the residents in the community.

Juli asked that all new residents or first time attendees to come forward for recognition. Heather Quinones at 5001 Shetland was welcomed and given a new resident welcome package.

Juli also thanked the Code Enforcement officers for attending and presenting the program. She also announced that Commissioner Rose Ferlita was invited to the meeting but unable to attend because of a conflict. The Commissioner plans to attend a future meeting.

Gene Milas introduced the main program on Code Enforcement and the guest speakers, Gene Minkel, Paul Morales and Brandon Sheridan, Code Enforcement Investigators for Hillsborough County. They presented an entertaining and informative slideshow on Code rules, regulations and the enforcement process. After the presentation, the team answered questions from the audience.

David May, standing in for Chairman Tom Devney, reported on the Fishing Tournament held September 22. He advised that approximately 30 boats competed and everyone had a great time. The next tournament will be held in the spring.

Chairman Theresa Shell reported on the "Octoberfest" Fall Picnic held October 13. We received a \$1500 grant towards picnic expenses from the Hillsborough County Office of Neighborhood Relations. Approximately 250 people attended.

Chairman Norm Coffman reported on the Bay Crest Yard Sale on November 17. There were 68 homes that participated. He's looking for ideas to improve participation next year. The date may change to October next year to ensure better participation.

Chairman David May is coordinating the Dumpster Day December 1. It will be held from 8:30 to 11:30 AM. He's looking for volunteers to be available at the two dumpster locations. Three dumpsters will be in Middle Bay Crest and two will be located in New Bay Crest.

Chairman John Housand reported on the 8th Annual Holiday Boat Parade which will be on December 15 starting at 7:00 PM. Anyone interested in participating can contact him for more information. He reported there will be many prizes for participants. Those not on the water can watch from the "mini park" at the end of Bay Crest Drive.

As liaison to the Taxing District, David May reported on the entrance walls makeover project being planned by the Bay Crest Park Taxing District and advised that work will start in early 2008.

Gil Leimbach reported that it is unlikely that a flag pole will be installed at Lopez and Bay Pointe due to new county ordinance that does not allow signs or poles in road right of ways.

A resident reported that the Hillsborough County School Board is considering changing Bay Crest school children's assignments from Famell and Alonso to Webb and Leto. She advised parents to contact your representatives to voice your opinion and concerns. This will affect approximately 70 children in Bay Crest.

Juli Milas announced that the Save Our Canals group (SocS) received the Gulf Guardian Award presented by the EPA. Thirty-nine tons of waste were picked out of baskets in nine months in Bay Crest. Following, Juli reminded everyone that Hillsborough County Water Resources has asked residents to limit water use until Sunday December 2 because of the shutdown of an 84° supply pipe while working on expansion. She also reminded the group that free informative publications are available at the rear of the meeting room.

Juli announced that the next general membership meeting will be held February 29, 2008.

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
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"Dumpster Day" Saturday, December 1

The second of our semi-annual community cleanup days, affectionately called "Dumpster Day," occurred Saturday morning, December 1. A group of hardy volunteers gathered at two community locations to assist residents in dumping trash and unwanted items into five 30 cubic yard roll-off dumpsters. At the end of about three hours, the dumpsters were virtually full.

Chairman and Association Board Member **David May** coordinated publicity, volunteer staffing, and arrangements with the county. Costs of delivering, retrieving, and emptying the dumpsters were borne by Hillsborough County, through the Office of Neighborhood Relations. Many thanks from David to the volunteers as well as residents who helped in making the event a success. About 85 to 90 homes participated, some making more than one trip to the dumpsters.

Items not allowed in these cleanups include electronics and hazardous materials, which can be taken to the county's Sheldon Road disposal site, open the first Saturday of each month (see page 23). Excluded materials also included common yard trash and garbage handled with regular weekly pickups

Bay Crest has had semi-annual cleanups over several years. Based on the turnout and amounts of trash gathered, the twice-yearly activity is one of our most effective and popular events, and will be continued with County cooperation.

The November 29 General Membership Meeting of the Bay Crest Park Civic Association hosted three of Hillsborough County's finest... Code Enforcement Investigators, that is.



The group entertained, amused, and most of all informed our residents of the intricacies of code law and the steps involved in resolving complaints. They also discussed many aspects of the county's Land Development Statute and discussed the problem of illegal signage ("snipe signs").

Paul Morales is the investigator that is assigned to our area. Paul has been extremely active in supporting our Association and is very responsive to Bay Crest concerns. Over his tenure, he has reviewed numerous situations and written many citations to resolve violations, many resulting in property owners being taken to the Code Board and served with fines or having liens placed on their property.

Don't bother calling. The National Do Not Call Registry is open for business, putting consumers in charge of the telemarketing calls they get at home. The Federal government created the national registry to make it easier and more efficient for you to stop getting telemarketing calls you don't want. You can register online at WWW.DONOTCALL.GOV or call toll-free, 1-888-382-1222 (TTY 1-866-290-4236), from the number you wish to register. Registration is free.

The Federal Trade Commission, the Federal Communications Commission, and the states are enforcing the National Do Not Call Registry. Placing your number on the registry will stop most, but not all, telemarketing calls.

This site has information for you - whether you're a consumer interested in signing up for the National Do Not Call Registry, or a telemarketer or seller interested in learning more about your responsibilities related to the Telemarketing Sales Rule.

Signs of gangs. The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department advises all citizens to watch for organized gang activity. One of the primary signs of this undesirable trend is

While graffiti may be the result of random mischief, it is often associated with gangs marking their territory, or a challenge message to rival gangs.

graffiti, or "tagging."

Any incidence of graffiti should be immediately reported to the Sheriff, where experienced law enforcement officers can readily determine if a gang is involved, its name, and whether the neighborhood can expect more problems. The Sheriff can also offer assistance in covering or removing the material, to discourage more incidents at the same location.

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

Coming Soon: A New Look for Bay Crest Park Entrances

In 2008, Bay Crest Park subdivision entrances will gain an attractive new look, as entrance walls and facades are significantly upgraded. Mike Perotti, President of the Taxing District, reports that contracts have been let, permits secured, and work is beginning on the existing structures, which are about 40 years old. The appearance of the structures has been deteriorating for some time, with significant stucco damage evident.

Groundwork and planning for upgrading the structures was started by the Civic Association about two years ago. In the past year, the Taxing District has stepped in and shepherded the project to completion, using District funds.

Mike reports that the design goal was to make the walls more uniform without substantial structural change. New and improved custom signage will provide an elegant and updated look while also being larger and more visible than the current dark etched granite squares. Elevation renderings of the refinished main entrance walls and upgraded Bay Crest indicia are shown below.

In other Taxing District actions, the group will monitor the several-times-annually street sweepings promised by the county. If budget cuts affect the schedule, the Taxing District may independently hire sweepings by private contractors.

The group has also developed a new all-inclusive contract for maintenance, trimming, and plantings in common areas, including the Memorial Highway strip and road medians. Both the Taxing District and the Civic Association have done seasonal flower plantings on the entrance road medians over the past few years.





They are Bruce and Michelle Odiorne and they donate their time and money to raising some very special puppies from nine weeks to adulthood. Bruce and Michelle work with Southeastern Guide Dogs, Inc. SEGD

Puppy Love

provides fully trained \$40,000 guide dogs, free of charge, to visually impaired individuals who depend on them for mobility with dignity.

You've heard that "it takes a village to properly raise a child". Well, it truly applies to these dogs as well. Raiser families like the Odiornes may host two to five other puppies in training during any given year as they rotate the dogs between local raiser families for total socialization training. If the host family happens to have other dogs and cats as do the Odiornes, so much the better! (And yes, they are always looking for new puppy raisers if you have the itch!) At twenty months the pups usually return to the school where they were born to complete their formal "Guide Dog" training phases.

One special initiative of the organization is the "Paws for Patriots TM" program, a special group of pups being raised and trained specifically for blinded veterans returning from the war. General Tommy Franks (U.S. Army, Ret.) is the spokesperson for this worthwhile project.

Privacy issues preclude disclosure of the new master's name when the dogs receive their final assignment. It is known, however, that a radio DJ in Memphis, an author and church deacon in Orlando, a South Carolina family, a Tampa family, and many others have all benefited from the Odiornes' efforts in this vital national program right here in Bay Crest Park! Their current guide dog student "Jingles," shown in photo, is currently attending classes at the schoolhouse as the Odiornes await a new puppy assignment. Fun Facts About Mold. Now more than ever, mold is the new boogeyman in your attic and is causing quite a panic throughout the State. The truth is, we live in Florida, where if you haven't noticed, it is very humid and conducive to mold growth. The last thing that most people remember about mold is that High School Biology experiment or that loaf of bread that should have been thrown away weeks ago. Now, there are a few people that are highly susceptible to mold, but the truth is, every house has mold and there are only a few molds that are dangerous. This article contains tips and information from several articles from the EPA and links to additional websites.

According to the EPA, "Molds produce tiny spores to reproduce. Mold spores waft through the indoor and outdoor air continually. When mold spores land on a damp spot indoors, they may begin growing and digesting whatever they are growing on in order to survive. There are molds that can grow on wood, paper, carpet, and foods. When excessive moisture or water accumulates indoors, mold growth will often occur, particularly if the moisture problem remains undiscovered or un-addressed. There is no practical way to eliminate all mold and mold spores in the indoor environment; the way to control indoor mold growth is to control moisture."

Basic Mold Cleanup

"The key to mold control is moisture control. It is important to dry water damaged areas and items within 24-48 hours to prevent mold growth. If mold is a problem in your home, clean up the mold and get rid of the excess water or moisture. Fix leaky plumbing or other sources of water. Wash mold off hard surfaces with detergent and water, and dry completely. Absorbent materials (such as ceiling tiles & carpet) that become moldy may have to be replaced."

Plant or transplant cold hardy trees and shrubs. Fertilize citrus trees if not done in January. Fertilize annuals and vegetables.

Check Out Seed and Garden Catalogs. Most gardening catalogs arrive during the winter months. Check out new varieties offered.

Prepare vegetable and flower gardens for spring planting. Till soil and add organic matter such as manure, compost or peat. Test pH of soil (Contact your county Cooperative Extension Service) and add lime or sulfur if necessary.

Prune, mulch and fertilize roses. Roses that are older than 1 year require a major pruning each year. Remove one-third to one-half of the top growth and any unproductive growth. Strip leaves from remaining to rid plant of latent diseases and insects. Fertilize and mulch.

Prune grapes. Grapes should be pruned before leaves begin to sprout. Bunch grapes and Muscadine grapes each have different pruning requirements.

Control scab disease on citrus. Scab fungus causes light brown, corky areas on fruits and leaves of susceptible citrus varieties. Spray Murcott, Page, and Temple varieties with a copper fungicide when new growth emerges and again when 2/3 of petals has fallen from the flower blossoms.

Fertilize lawn and trees. Shop for a fertilizer that contains slow- or timed-release nitrogen. To determine the correct amount of fertilizer to use, simply divide the first number on the fertilizer bag (which represents nitrogen) into 100. Apply this amount per 1,000 square feet of lawn and landscape area. Broadcast the fertilizer over the soil or mulch and water. The nutrient and water absorbing roots of trees and shrubs are concentrated in the upper 6 -12 inches of soil so there is no need to punch holes in the soil--simply water the fertilizer in.

Apply mulch to all plant beds. A 2-3 inch layer of mulch will discourage weeds and retain moisture in the soil.

Apply pre-emergent weed killer to lawn. Pre-emergent herbicides kill weed seeds as they germinate. Some fertilizers contain preemergent herbicide. Do not apply near trees and shrubs or in areas where any seed will be planted. Carefully follow label directions.

Fertilize shrubs. A good lawn fertilizer such as 12-4-8, or 15-5-15 or the like is usually adequate. Shop for a product with 30% to 50% of the nitrogen in a water-insoluble or slow-release form. Acid-loving plants (Azaleas, Hollies, Gardenias, Camellias, etc.) will benefit from an acid-forming balanced fertilizer such as 6-6-6 or 8-8-8. Broadcast the fertilizer on the soil surface and water in.

Start vegetable and flowers from seed. Sow seeds in flats or pots in a light, sterile mix. Plant seed no deeper than twice the seed's thickness. Place in a sunny spot; keep warm and moist.

Watch new growth for aphid infestation. Aphids feed on the undersides of new, tender leaves causing curied, distorted growth. Most broad-spectrum insecticides easily control aphids, but soap solutions are effective as well. Mix 2½ tablespoons of liquid, dishwashing soap (do not use those containing a degreaser – use 1/3 less for concentrated soaps) in one gallon of water. Forceful sprays of water can dislodge aphids.



Understanding Your Credit Score

The subject of credit scoring has become an increasingly hot topic, and for good reason. For many years, the general public only associated the concept of credit scoring with the need to purchase high-ticket items such as a new car or a home. Today, credit scoring goes much further. Your credit score can affect your ability to get a good rate on commodities such as car insurance, cell phones, or even determine whether or not you get the job that you want. Indeed, the financial snapshot provided by the credit score has also become a gauge for many employers, especially those seeking to place employees in a position of financial responsibility.

Why Your Credit Score is So Important

The credit scoring model seeks to quantify the likelihood of a consumer to pay off debt without being more than 90 days late at any time in the future. Credit scores can range between a low score of 350 and a high score of 850. The higher the score, the better it is for the consumer, because a high credit score translates into a low interest rate. This can save literally thousands of dollars in financing fees over the life of the loan.

Only one out of 1,300 people in the United States have a credit score above 800. These are people with a stellar credit rating that get the best interest rates. On the other hand, one out of every eight prospective home buyers is faced with the possibility that they may not qualify for the home loan they want because they have a score falling between 500 and 600.

The Five Factors of Credit Scoring

Credit scores are comprised of five factors. Points are awarded for each component, and a high score is most favorable. The factors are listed below in order of importance.

PAYMENT HISTORY - 35% IMPACT

Paying debt on time and in full has the greatest positive impact on your credit score. Late payments, judgments and charge-offs all have a negative impact. Missing a high payment will have a more severe impact than missing a low payment, and delinquencies that have occurred in the last two years carry more weight than older items.

OUTSTANDING CREDIT BALANCES - 30% IMPACT

This factor marks the ratio between the outstanding balance and available credit. Ideally, the consumer should make an effort to keep balances as close to zero as possible, and definitely below 30% of the available credit limit when trying to purchase a home.

CREDIT HISTORY - 15% IMPACT

This portion of the credit score indicates the length of time since a particular credit line was established. A seasoned borrower will always be stronger in this area.

TYPE OF CREDIT - 10% IMPACT

A mix of auto loans, credit cards and mortgages is more positive than a concentration of debt from credit cards only.

INQUIRIES - 10% IMPACT

This percentage of the credit score quantifies the number of inquiries made on a consumer's credit within a six-month period. Each hard inquiry can cost from two to 25 points on a credit score, but the maximum number of inquiries that will reduce the score is ten. In other words, 11 or more inquiries within a six-month period will have no further impact on the borrower's credit score. Note that if you run a credit report on yourself, it will have no affect on your score.

Remember that the credit score is a computerized calculation. Personal factors are not taken into consideration when a credit report is generated. It is merely a snapshot of today's credit profile for any given borrower, and it can fluctuate dramatically within the course of a week.

How Does a Low Credit Score Affect My Interest Rate?

Lenders estimate your ability to pay back money based on your credit score. The risk factor they take on is built-in to your interest rate as a financing fee. Therefore, a low credit score results in a higher interest rate, higher monthly fees, and a higher amount of interest being paid over the total life of the loan.

Ultimately, experts say that it is best to have two to five credit cards, and no more than that. You should keep your balances as low as possible. If you have a credit account with a zero balance, do not close the account. Instead, make a small purchase so the card shows up as an active account on your credit report, and you will be awarded points for your long-term credit history.
