
Can't get your car in the garage? Or, need to turn that extra bedroom into an office but don't know what to do with all the junk that has accumulated?

NEIGHBORHOOD PLANNING ACADEMY

A series of local planning meetings, sponsored by the University of Oklahoma Urban Design Studio, will be held in areas where schools that have been designated as "Community Schools" are located.

This is a wonderful opportunity for our neighborhood to be involved in the planning for our own community. Meetings are scheduled as follows:

6:00 - 8:00 PM **Tuesdays** May 13, May 27, June 10 and June 24

(The May meetings will be held at Cooper Elementary, however, the location for the June meetings is yet to be determined.)

These meetings will focus on mapping of the area, a review of the area's strengths and weaknesses, followed by a vote to focus on the top priority. The group will be encouraged to create an action plan with objectives, goals and a four-step implementation plan.

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO STOP GRAFFITI VANDALISM

If you see graffiti in your neighborhood on public or private property, report it immediately to the Mayor's Action Line, 596-2100 or on-line at http://cityoftulsa.org/Reporting/Graffiti.asp.

> Remove any graffiti on your property immediately! Make sure your child is not a graffiti vandal.

Work with the Police Department if you know of someone guilty of graffiti vandalism.



Did you know? Mohawk Park is the 2nd largest city park in the United States and is bigger than Central Park in New York City.

Readily available this year, apply 2 to 3 inches of wood chips for a good

permanent mulch. As they decompose, wood chips draw nitrogen from the soil. To prevent nitrogen starvation of plants mix in 1.0 pounds of nitrogen per 10 bushel of wood chips. Note: The nitrogen could be applied on top of the spread mulch.

To reduce risk of soil borne diseases allow 2 years before planting members of the nightshade family (tomatoes, peppers, eggplant & potatoes) in the same location.

Tired of mixing chemicals and spraying - try some of these or similar products. Note: Always read and Apply per the label.

<u>"Bayer Tree and Shrub Insect Control"</u>, a systemic insecticide that is mixed in water and poured around the base of trees and shrubs, it controls multiple insects (aphids, lace bugs, borers, etc) and is effective for one year. Apply before insect is anticipated to allow time for insecticide to travel from roots to the extremities of larger trees and shrubs. Apply to azaleas when you fertilize after they bloom.

<u>"2-in-1 Systemic Rose and Flower Granules"</u>, a Bayer product, there are similar products available from other companies. A granular systemic insecticide that is sprinkled around plants and provides six weeks control of insects and spider mites.

Sorry - it's back to the sprayer but the reduction in frequency and necessary reapplication after every rain makes it worthwhile. "2-in-1 Systemic Rose and Flower Care" If allowed to dry after application, rain or watering will not wash it off and the product provides 6 weeks protection from fungal and bacterial diseases.

A tip of the hat to the Tulsa Parks Department. Prior to the ice storm, with the exception of Mohawk Park, the Parks Department had an inventory of every tree (14,000) in the 125 Tulsa Parks. Each tree had been identified by its exact GPS location, tree species, condition and age. After the ice storm Maureen Turner, the Tulsa Parks Horticulturist, was looking for help inventorying Mohawk Parks trees and evaluating the storm damage. Mark Bays, Urban Forestry Coordinator for Oklahoma Forestry Service, led a team of specialists from many states who completed the inventory of Mohawk Park and evaluated damage to all trees in Tulsa Parks.

Thanks to the excellent records kept by the Tulsa Parks Department and the assessment by Bays and his team of professionals, FEMA was able to complete its review of storm damage to trees in the Tulsa Parks in weeks instead of months. As a result, Tulsa has been selected as one of the first recipients in a new FEMA Pilot Program. This program will provide slightly under \$1 million "up front" money to cover part of the expenses of trimming 4,099 trees and the removal 3,454 trees in Tulsa Parks.

ARE YOU AWARE OF THE NEW "SOCIAL HOST" LAW?

With graduation right around the corner, there will be lots of celebrations and parties as our young people celebrate this step in their life.

While celebrations and parties are an important part of this "coming of age," we want to be sure that our young people aren't at risk.

The tragic death of a local teenager brought home the importance of adults being held accountable for what happens when they provide alcohol or illegal drugs to young people *in their home*. Working with the family of that teenager, Council Troyer sponsored a "Social Host" ordinance that was approved by the City Council.

The ordinance makes it a misdemeanor to knowingly and willfully allow anyone younger than 21 to consume alcohol or use other controlled and dangerous substances while at their residence or other legally procured property or structure.
