## **Missing Banners**



## Old Rose Manor Site Set for Fitness

Quoted from the Oregonian, 'In Portland'

Brooklyn residents will be able to tone their abs closer to home starting next year. A 24 Hour Fitness Health Club is scheduled to open in the neighborhood in August 2009 on the site of the old Rose Manor Inn at McLoughlin and Holgate.

The club will be the anchor tenant in a 52,000 square foot development called "The Shops at Brooklyn Yard." The gym, at 43,000 sq feet, will be a "Sport" level club, like all the other 24 Hour Fitness Clubs in Portland. It will have the usual workout facilities, sauna, steam rooms and classes, plus one or more the following: basketball court, racquetball court, swimming pool or whirlpool.

An additional 9000 square feet will be available for shops and restaurants. As David Weislogel, president of the Greater Brooklyn Business Association, put it, "Almost anything would be better than the empty lot that's there right now."



## Brooklyn Park & Little League

In response to Neighborhood Association request, a meeting was held on March 25th with the Powell Little League and Parks representatives to talk about the upcoming baseball season and its impact on neighbors who use Brooklyn Park. The following issues were resolved:

1. The green trailer used for concessions will be removed at the end of the baseball season.
2. The outfield fence will be put up in early April and removed no later than June 14th. Powell Little League will remove sections from the right and left field fence when the field is not being played on, allowing other park users convenient access to the North East part of the park.
3. Banners and signs will be up on the fence, only during times when the field is being used by the little league.

# GAS PRICES, ENVIRONMENT and DOGGY DOO WHAT'S THE COMMON LINK?

Here's a new angle you may not have heard of, despite all of the email circulating on the Internet about gas prices. Most of the suggestions deal with not buying gas from a particular oil company. But have we thought much about other factors? Have we given enough careful consideration to how petroleum-based materials, for example, may play into the rising prices at the pump?



For example, we probably don't give a second thought to the little plastic baggies that we use for picking up doggy doo. They're made from petroleum; perhaps from the very same barrel of oil that is transformed into gas for your car. Most of us with a pooch companion know that "have dog, will scoop" is expected. But what to do with the "scoopables" is up for grabs. Companies market all sorts of doo-dads and contraptions promising to help with lawful (and leisurely) disposal or burial of dog poop.

When it comes to your dog's leavings, believe it or not, flushing is best. It keeps bags and their contents out of overstuffed landfills, while preventing the bacterial contamination of soil and water that can result from outdoor disposal. How do you get it to the toilet?

**One way is with the Flushable Bag, a pooper-scooper that dissolves in water.** The Flushable Bag, made of polyvinyl alcohol was developed two years ago. The translucent green bags measure 7.9 inches by 9.8 inches and are water soluble. They are an environmentally-friendly, non-toxic sister to the compound that makes up Elmer's glue.

Is the idea of transporting the bag to the toilet a little too green for you? **There are biodegradable bags such as a unique corn-based bioplastic product sold through Trellis Earth store on NE Sandy Blvd which can be disposed of in the garbage can.**

"Why should I worry about this," you ask? If you have one dog and use two bags a day, you're using about 700 bags a year. With all the responsible poo-scooping dog owners out there, that adds up to a whole lot of petroleum-based plastic bags.

Improper disposal contributes to pollutants in waterways. Twenty to thirty percent of all pollutants in waterways are attributed to dogs. Overall, it is believed dog waste is third or fourth on the list of contributors to bacteria in contaminated waters.

Then there's the doo itself. Instead of allowing all of our dogs' leavings to be mummified for the future, within plastic bags, let's be the wonderful people our dogs think we are—consider one of the above alternatives. Who knows, if everyone meticulously focused on lessening their consumption of plastics, we may see the price of oil come down enough to fill our tank for a spontaneous drive to the beach. And who would appreciate that more than our four-legged friends?

***Plastic bags are made from a non-renewable resource (oil), are not biodegradable and take thousands of years to break down.***

## Brooklyn Neighborhood Sustainability Committee


The quality of our environment is something that affects us all. It is not only an issue at the global level, but right in our own communities.

**AREA REPRESENTATIVES NEEDED**

World Heritage International Student Exchange Programs is a non-profit, public benefit organization offering quality students from a variety of countries the opportunity to spend a high school year abroad with a volunteer host family. They are in need of interested people to help with the program by providing local support for exchange students and their host families. While this is considered a volunteer position there is a \$500 payment for placing/supervising each full academic year student. World Heritage local representatives volunteer about 2-4 hours per student each month. Training, materials and support are provided.

Your help is needed to make a student's dream of visiting America come true. All students are between 15-18 years of age and are carefully screened by the World Heritage representatives. Those who demonstrate excellent character, behavior and proficiency in the English language, are accepted. Students arrive with their own spending money and insurance. Host families provide a bed, meals and a loving environment. Without your support there will not be enough homes for these students.
