THOUGHTS FOR THE SUMMER

Students, while you are working on your summer tan, remember that every hour you invest in your future may pay out big dividends later. Consider spending a few hours volunteering at John C. Lincoln, building a house with Habitat for Humanity, or working in a nursing home.

You will reap intangible rewards while gaining valuable skills and experience.

Colleges and universities weigh volunteer and community activities very heavily when determining awards for scholarships. This can be achieved in a varietay of ways. You could contact a city organization, such as Phoenix Parks and Recreation, online at www.ci.phoenix.az.us, or a private volunteer organization such as the local Volunteer Match, found online at www.volunteermatch.org. Other organizations that make a difference in their communities are local block watches, neighborhood associations, churches and clubs, such as the YMCA.

Choose an area about which you are passionate, or one in which you can impact your community using existing skills. You may wish to learn new skills, in which case you may choose a different volunteer path.

NOTES FROM THE DEAN

Rising tuitions at public and private schools should motivate students (especially, but not exclusively, juniors) to learn as much as possible before their senior year about college financial aid and its processes.

The following tips may increase understanding and offer resources for further learning. To become eligible for financial aid at a school you must first apply and be admitted. This does not commit you to attending, just allows for your eligibility to receive financial aid and/or scholarships. It may be in your best interest to apply to more than one school to compare financial aid packages offered because these will vary.

You may be eligible for federal financial aid if you fill out your Free Application For Student Aid (FAFSA). This form must be filled out each year you attend post-secondary education if you would like to be considered for financial aid and/or scholarships. You (and your parent) may file taxes early, or estimate your income. Applying online speeds up the process considerably. Find it on the Internet at: www.fafsa.ed.gov. The scholarship deadline at ASU is December 1st, Related link: students.asu.edu/financial-aid. Parents, if you have moved recently, please remember to update your contact information.

Stop by counseling for a Personal Information Change form. Students who are currently attending our campus on a variance should come in to complete a variance for the next school year. Stop by the Attendance Office for the necessary forms.

NOTES CONTINUED:

Juniors - Equip Your Financial Aid Toolbox! This requires a Personal Identification Number, or PIN. Apply for one online at www.pin.ed.gov

Be aware of college deadline dates for admission to assure eligibility for financial aid and academic scholarships. UofA's scholarship priority date is September 1st and you should have your FAFSA completed by February 14th. The scholarship deadline at ASU is December 1st., the recommended FAFSA date is March 1st. NAU asks for applications to be in by March 1st, and the FAFSA priority date is also March 1st.

For juniors, this is the year that you should begin to seek out scholarship opportunities available in your chosen institution as well as private scholarships. Use your resources wisely to find little-known awards and always apply for the largest payoffs first. There are additional Internet resources to help students, including custom scholarship searches at www.fastweb.com as well as www.petersons.com/finaid. Both sites require free registration —don't wait until your senior year to look!

HAVE AN OLD CELL PHONE TO DONATE?



Secure the Call Foundation takes old donated cell phones, inspects them, cleans them, charges their batteries and then reprograms them to be used as free 911 emergency phones. Any phone that

can turned on can access 911 services even without a carrier service plan. FROM OFFICER PFAFFENBACH, CAO

On June 12 there was an Aggravated Assault (Stabbing) at 3801 W. Cactus at the park. The victim was walking in the park when he was approached by the suspect and they became involved in a verbal argument. The argument escalated to the point where the suspect stabbed the victim once in the left upper arm and center of the back. There was only a small mark on the victims back and a one inch cut to the victims arm. No suspects located. Exact motive of the assault is not known at this time.

YARD SALE GUIDELINES

Frequently Asked Questions

How many yard/garage sales can I have per year? The Zoning Ordinance limits the number of yard/garage sales at any residential property (house, condominium, apartment development, etc.) to two sales within a twelve month period. Each yard/garage sale may not exceed three consecutive days. You can not use the sidewalk or street for your yard sale.

What items can I sell? The purpose of a yard sale is to allow residents to dispose of household items, clothing, furniture, etc. Residents may not use yard sales to sell vehicles, new or commercial items not intended for household use.

Who can I call if my neighbors are having frequent yard/garage sales? Complaints can be reported to the City of Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department at 602-262-7844 or email blight@phownix.gov.

DIGITAL TV TRANSITION



The digital TV transition is the time period during which TV broadcasters will switch their television signals from analog to digital technology. Congress enacted legislation

that would ensure the transition is completed by February 17, 2009. At that time, the nation's broadcast TV stations will begin broadcasting exclusively in digital.

Who will the Digital Transition affect?

The DTV Transition will affect; 1) anyone with an analog TV that relies on "rabbit ears", 2) anyone who has a TV set without a built -in digital tuner, and/or 3) anyone who is not hooked up to cable (or another service provider). If you fall into one of these categories, you will need to follow one of the options below to continue viewing broadcast television stations.

What are my options?

- 1) Make sure all TVs in your home are connected to cable.
- 2) Purchase an analog-to-digital converter through the Government coupon programs, www.dtvtransition.org.
- Purchase a new digital tv with built -in digital tuner. New TV sets 13 inches and larger include embedded digital tuners.



SUN PROTECTION

Learn the basics to stay healthy in Summer's Heat. If you've lived in Phoenix long enough, you've heard those words....."But it's a dry heat". Yeah, but

it's still hot!

- Stay Hydrated Drink plenty of fluids, avoiding alcohol and caffeine. Carry water in your car and to any event you attend.
- Use sunscreen Apply to package directions and don't forget the tops of your ears.
- Know your risks Be aware that some medications, including sulfa drugs and some acne medications, make users especially vulnerable to sunburn. St. John's wort and other over-the-counter preparations also can increase sun sensitivity. Consult your pharmacist to learn more. The young, elderly and the chronically ill have less ability to deal with heat and it's effects.
- Where sunglasses and a hat Protecting your eyes against the sun's glare will help prevent cataracts.
- Stay inside during the hottest hours.
- Watch for snakes in desert areas
- Never leave a child or pet in a vehicle In triple digit heat, temps can quickly soar up to 120 degrees or more.
- Know the signs of heat stress, heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Heat stress a rapid heart rate, muscle cramps, extreme fatigue, flushed cheeks, nausea. When they occur, find a way to cool down. Stop physical activity; drink cool water or sports drink, get out of the sun and pour cool water on the head and neck. If a person stops sweating, has difficulty breathing, shows signs of confusion or altered consciousness, call 911. Heat stress is an early sign of trouble. Left untreated, it can progress to heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Heat stroke is an emergency that can lead to brain damage and death.
- Beware of the "skillet" Sand and playground equipment can become a "skillet" heated to extreme temperatures even when the outside temperatures are below 100 degrees.

HAPPY 4TH OF JULY!



Did you know..... that The Continental Congress of the New <u>United States</u> did not adopt the specific resolution to create a flag until June 14, 1777. The resolution stated: ... that the flag of the <u>United States</u> be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars. white in a blue field, repre-

senting a new constellation."

The red, white and blue <u>colors</u> used in <u>decorations</u> for the 4th of July celebrations are not coincidental but have significant meaning on the <u>American Flag</u>.

Currently there are 50 stars on the flag. Alaska and <u>Hawaii</u> represent the last two states to join the Union. It is important to note that the original flag had only 13 stars that represented the 13 original colonies.

The white stripes also represent the original 13 colonies. White represents purity of intention. The originators of the Declaration of Independence were pure of heart and intended to free the nation from the tyranny of King George III. The white on the flag signifies purity and innocence. The red represents the shed blood of the patriots and also hardiness and courage. The blue stands for the perseverance, vigilance and the seeking of justice. Many signers were vigilant in their pursuit of justice and freedom for the masses. Those brave souls who lived and died for our freedom. When you weave the color together, you get the red, white and blue American Flag, the ultimate symbol of equality and freedom.

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Safe Routes to School Program was created by the U.S. Congress as part of a federal transportation bill called <u>SAFETEA-LU</u>. The primary reason for developing this nationwide program is this country's growing epidemic of childhood obesity and diabetes. One of the courses of the epidemic is children's inability to get physical activity — biking and walking to school - due to the lack of safe and convenient ways to do so. To this end, Safe Routes was created to accomplish three goals:

- 1. To enable and encourage children, including those with disabilities to walk and bicycle to school;
- 2. To make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative, thereby encouraging a healthy and active lifestyle from an early age; and
- To facilitate the planning, development and implementation of projects and activities that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption and air pollution near schools.

The program accomplishes this by providing funds for schools and communities to implement infrastructure projects (such as sidewalk improvements, trails, and 'traffic calming') and non-infrastructure programs (such as education campaigns, law enforcement efforts, and prize giveaways).

Safe Routes To School is a **reimbursement** program -- not a grant program. This means that the selected applicants will be entitled to request reimbursements from ADOT for an amount agreed upon at the time of selection. The applicant first must spend funds that it already has secured -- **ADOT will not provide upfront cash**. Any work on the project that was performed prior to the project's selection is not eligible for reimbursement.

There are two main criteria that will determine if your school and your project are eligible for funding under the Safe Routes To School Program:

- Program funding is only for elementary and middle schools;
- Programs and projects must be within a 2-mile radius of the school.

Program Goals

To enable and encourage children, including those with disabilities, to walk and bicycle to school; to make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative, thereby encouraging a healthy and active lifestyle from an early age; and to facilitate the planning, development, and implementation of projects and activities that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools.

\$2,200,000 Grant money is available to schools, communities, and non-profit orgs beginning in September.

- Eligible projects education programs, events, and curricula; giveaway items, some law enforcement activities, as well as some engineering, street, and signing.
- Applicants do not have to provide a monetary match.
- Per application grant maximum = \$45,000\$250,000 for the engineering/infrastructure requests.

Applicants may apply for as many grants as they like.


