#### <u>Trash? Recycle? Or</u> <u>Reuse?</u>

Julie Robey from the Bureau of Solid Waste Management spoke at the August 26 General meeting. She revealed some startling facts. Baltimore County's recycling rate is about 45%, with 50% being commercial and 12% being residential. The majority of our trash is taken to a Virginia landfill, which will be full by 2039. Also, it costs the county \$36 per ton for trash, \$37 per ton for waste energy (ex. batteries), and \$59 per ton for yard materials. But the county actually makes \$85 per ton for recycled materials, so before throwing out those items please ask trash? Recycle? Or reuse? Recyclable items are bottles, metal cans, and

paper products. Please sit the items out on your recycle day and use bags of any color except blue, yellow or red. These colors represent hazardous materials. Reusable items are clothing, electronics, and appliances. Also, instead of bagging grass clipping, they can be mulched and left on the lawn. ## From Condoms to Condiments.

Doug Policy of the Gwynns Falls Watershed Association (GFWA) says that any trash thrown in the yard or street usually ends up washing into the sewer. If it does not cause pipe blockage and costly plumbing repairs, it usually washes into the nearest stream and is recycled into your drinking water. Some items are perishable, but others are not. Doug has participated in many stream cleans-ups and has removed items like bank statements, bills, diaries, condoms and condiments. He suggests that the best way to keep your stream and neighborhood clean is to make sure trash is put in its proper place, organize a community clean-up, or contact GFWA.
