Oklahomans want to see deserving students succeed – students who study and work hard, but whose families find it difficult to afford college. If a child dreams of going to college and works to achieve it, then Oklahoma's Promise can help make it a reality!

To make that happen, the Oklahoma Legislature has set up a unique program for eighth, ninth and 10th grade students (home-school students must be age 13, 14 or 15) that will help pay for their college education if their family's income is \$50,000 or less at the time the student applies for the program. This program is Oklahoma's Promise.

But college isn't easy. So to make sure students get ready for college while they're still in high school, the program requires students to take <u>certain high school courses</u>. They will have to pass those courses and keep up their grades. And besides staying on top of the books, students will also have to show that they're in control outside the classroom. That means staying away from trouble like gangs, drugs and alcohol. In short, the student promises to prepare academically for college and stay out of trouble, and in return, the state of Oklahoma promises to help pay the student's college tuition.

Neil's Gardening Tips Neil Flory

December: Keep the leaves raked off of cool season grasses. Apply a second application of fertilizer if you missed a November application.

Newly planted trees and shrubs need to be watered through the winter months, also azaleas, rhododendrons, and roses. Keep needle evergreens moist to avoid excessive needle drop and winter kill. There is only 1/10 of an inch of moisture in an inch of snow and much of it sublimates in freezing weather, so don't rely on it for adequate moisture.

Houseplants and over wintering plants need a rest during the dark months, December to mid-February. Suspend fertilization or keep it to a minimum during this period.

During our freezing weather, on clear days the sun thaws the southwest side of the trunk of newly planted and young trees causing the sap to rise. Freezing temperatures over night split the bark; this is sun scald, an unsightly injury to the tree that is permanent. Protect your young trees by applying tree wrap around the trunk up to the lowest branches.

January: The Xmas rush is over. Time to kickback, relax, get out the gardening catalogs (many are online) and plan for next spring. Look at some of the new plants. Select plants that can stand our long hot dry season and drying winds. Tulsa is in hardiness zone 7 and heat zone 8.

This is a good tine to get a soil sample if you have not had one in the last five years. The waiting period is short this time of the year. It won't be next spring. Call the OSU Master Gardeners office, **746-3701**, for information on how do a soil sample or visit the Master Gardener website.

January to mid-February is the best time to prune most deciduous trees. Remove broken branches, branches growing towards the center of the tree, dead or unsightly branches, crossed branches and sprouts growing from the base of the tree. Consult OSU Fact sheet, F-6409, for proper pruning methods. Pruned surfaces should be left bare, do not apply dressings.

P.S. Professional tree trimmers may be expensive but they are a lot cheaper than broken limbs (yours). Keep your feet on the ground and leave the rest to the pros.

February is a busy month in preparation for spring and is a good time to plant trees and shrubs. Begin fertilizing houseplants. Outdoors: Feed spring flowering bulbs with a high phosphorus (5-<u>10</u>-10, it's the second number) content fertilizer. Fertilize cool season grasses, apply pre-emergence later this month if needed. February through March fertilize trees and shrubs. Mid-February, plant cool season vegetables, lettuce, cabbage, peas, potatoes, and carrots. The third week in February is a good time to plant seeds that need cold exposure to germinate, snapdragons, coreopsis, California poppies, cornflowers and strawflowers.

COOPER NEIGHBORHOOD CRIME PREVENTION

Sgt. Jeff Cealka writing to you and your neighbors again. As we all head in to the holidays let me put down a few thoughts that may make your shopping trips and homes safer over the next few months.

First, for those of you out shopping, avoid the traffic. That's a tough one considering that businesses entice us to get out the day after Thanksgiving with sales. But as you plan how to spend your hard earned dollars consider planning your trip to avoid the traffic. Avoiding collisions and their resulting traffic snarls reduces holiday headaches.

Second, shop in groups. By far the majority of purse snatching victims are out by themselves. Men and women shopping together, guys, drop off the woman at the door then find a parking spot. Women, if you are carrying a purse make sure to carry it on the non-traffic side as you walk through the parking lot. Folks don't carry all your cash and credit cards in one place. Use your coat and pants pockets. And have those credit card numbers written down so they can be immediately reported to cardholders and the police in the event they are stolen. Leave the store as a group or have one person (not carrying packages) go get the car.



Use a timer(s) to turn off a light(s) at different times in your house. Try to set up your outside Christmas lights so you don't have to go outside to turn them on and off (not only is it safer, it's warmer and drier that way, too).
