
beat officers, and community health service members made this a truly neighborhood-community event.

COP ACTIVITIES

Patrols continued through the summer and fall. Quite a few calls were made by COP patrols and others to police concerning suspicious vehicles in the park and potential prostitution along Washington and the park area. At this same time the police were making a more concentrated effort to respond and scan the area. Police were stopping suspects and their presence has seemed to have had an impact in greatly reducing such activities. I and other COP members as well as Deanna Palla, as the PCHA chairperson, met with a couple of apartment owners, the police, and the Arlington North Chairman to discuss a new thrust of cooperation in abating the environments for crime in the area. These two apartment managers pledged a new emphasis on renting to a better clientele, through background checks and other means saying they had ownership support. We will see where these initiatives take us.

Winter Gardening Tips

Typically, fall and winter are slow in the garden, or so we think. There's actually a lot to do, especially here in North Texas.

Now is a great time to plant trees, shrubs, perennials, bulbs and wildflower seeds. Planting in the fall or winter allows the plant's root system to get established well before the temperatures rise. Even though the top of the plant may die back after it's planted, the roots will still grow, and in the spring the plant will start vigorous growth.

Top-dress your lawn and flower beds with a thin layer (? - ?") of compost. Healthy soil eventually leads to healthy plants. The nutrients from the rich compost will wash down into the roots during the winter/spring rains and your plants will thank you in the growing season to come. Top-dressing helps your lawn by decreasing thatch, increasing fertility levels, and introducing some beneficial organisms that will help your lawn's soil long-term.

Add mulch to your flower beds. Mulch is extremely important in our area. It helps: stabilize the soil temperature throughout the year, decrease soil evaporation, reduce weeds, reduce evaporation, reduce soil compaction and it is usually more aesthetically pleasing. One word of caution: don't mulch right around the base of trees or shrubs; this encourages rot and attracts insects.

Start a compost pile! This is a great

way to recycle your grass clippings, leaves, coffee grounds and more. You can buy a compost bin or make a container easily at home. The end result is home made compost that will enrich vour garden.

Prune your trees and shrubs. Most trees are dormant in the winter, which is the best time to trim them (unless it is a winter/spring bloomer – then trim after bloom). If pruning oaks, pruning spray should ALWAYS be used to prevent the spread of oak wilt. Trees other than oak don't need the spray; it actually inhibits the plant's ability to heal from the cuts.

Incorporating just a few of these tips into your winter regime, will help have an outstanding Parkway Central yard when spring eventually gets here.

Update on Gas Drilling Activities

If you've been reading the paper, you'll have noticed that with the recent dramatic drop in energy prices, gas-lease signings have pretty much dried up. Don't we look like the smart ones now for having gotten our deal done while we could!

The Marsh operation on Rolling Hills is still moving along: according to information received from Tom Panzer (RHCC board chairman), they are planning two seismic tests across the country club grounds in the near future. Cables and sensors will be placed along two east/west lines between Roquemore Elementary and Lamar High School, and one additional line will stretch diagonally from the southeast corner to the northwest corner of the club and on across Cooper Street towards Green Oaks blvd.

The first test will begin on December 6. This will be a calibration-test. The second test is planned for early 2009.

Drilling at RHCC is still projected for late 2009.
