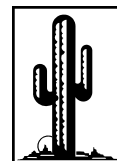

FREE ADVICE FROM AN ATTORNEY



Here is something I received in an email, but you should always check with your financial institutions regarding their policies:

1. Do not sign the back of your credit cards. Instead, put **"PHOTO ID REQUIRED."**

2. When you are writing checks to pay on your credit card accounts, **DO NOT** put the complete account number on the 'For' line. Instead, just put the last four numbers. The credit card company knows the rest of the number, and anyone who

might be handling your check as it passes through all the check processing channels won't have access to it.

3. Put your work phone # on your checks instead of your home phone. If you have a PO Box use that instead of your home address. If you do not have a PO Box, use your work address. Never have your SS# printed on your checks. (DUH!) You can add it if it is necessary. But if you have it printed, anyone can get it.

4. Place the contents of your wallet on a photocopy machine. Do both sides of each license, credit card, etc. You will know what you had in your wallet and all of the account numbers and phone numbers to call and cancel. Keep the photocopy in a safe place.

5. We have been told we should cancel our cards immediately. But the key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know whom to call. Keep those where you can find them.

6. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where your credit cards, etc., were stolen. This proves to credit providers you were diligent, and this is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

7. Call the three national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and also call the Social Security fraud line number.

4.) Social Security Administration (fraud line) 1-800-269-0271

The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen, and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.

Dear Friends in Safety,

After meeting Michelle Davis at the **Towards Zero Deaths Conference** in Minnesota in October, I received this reflection from her. "Just after lunch on August 14, 2008, my husband, 29-year-old James L. Davis, was rear-ended and killed on his motorcycle in St. Paul, Minnesota. Traffic on Interstate 94 came to a halt; James was able to stop in time, but the driver behind him was not. Driving an SUV under a revoked license, this young woman was not paying attention and following James' motorcycle too close. The impact was so strong that James' full-face helmet flew off his head, and his body was dragged under the SUV along with his motorcycle. He died instantly.

James and I wed on Lake Superior and were married for 13 months. We were the best friend each had waited our entire lives for; we shared all passions and activities together to preserve our closeness and continually grow in our relationship; we expressed our feelings through original poems and music; and we learned what being "alive" really meant. In mid-September, James and I planned on closing and moving into our first house, where we hoped to raise four children. We were so excited and happy! James spent his days in his dream job as a supercomputer

software engineer, and at night engaged in photography, car mechanics, movies, classic novels, running, and as he told me regularly: "finding ways to show you how much I love you." James also left behind both parents, four siblings, and many nephews and nieces who looked up to him.

I cannot believe I lost the love of my life to THIS. There is no reason; **the simple truth is that every choice we make has consequences.**

Michelle's story moved me to act on an idea that had been germinating for a couple of years. Thus, in memory of James,

The facts speak for themselves. In 2006 1.8 million rear-end collisions occurred on America's roadways. These accounted for 29% of all injury incidents due to motor vehicle crashes. NEWS FROM MOON VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL

Moon Valley Excels Again! Earns Top AZ Learns Label 3 Years in a Row



For the third consecutive year, Moon Valley celebrates being labeled an **Excelling** school by the Accountability Division of the Arizona Department of Education. Let's take a look at what this label means, exactly.

Schools much achieve benchmarks within the Arizona Learns system, and earn points in the areas of Adequate Yearly Progress, AIMS Test Scores, Drop-Out Rates, Graduation Rates and ELL Reclassification Rates. The more points, the better the achievement for labeling purposes. The **Excelling** label is the highest level of achievement.

Let's look at a breakdown of the points.

AIMS – 18 points possible

- Reading—6 points awarded
- Writing—4.1 points awarded
- Math—6 points awarded

Drop-Out Rate – 1 point possible

- 0% met the target—1 point awarded

Graduation Rate – 1 point possible

- 92% met the target—1 point awarded

Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) – 1 point possible

- Moon Valley did make AYP—1 point awarded

To achieve AYP, schools must achieve all of the following:

- Annual measurable objective in 10th grade reading and math within every subgroup
- 95% of students tested in 10th grade reading and math within every subgroup

ELL Reclassification Rate – 1 point possible

- Moon Valley was able to reclassify 33% of our ELL students into the Fluent English Proficient (FEP) category—1 point awarded

Overall, Moon Valley was awarded 20.1 points. Additionally, because the school also had a statistically significant number of students exceed the standards on the AIMS tests, the school met the target in this area, also known as the Z-score. This number is used to identify **Excelling** schools. Because Moon Valley's score was higher than 1, we earned the **Excelling** label.

Thanks go out to students and staff for an exceptional showing in maintaining the **Excelling** label. It is due to the community effort of achievement that this label has been retained for three years running, and we applaud your efforts. *Go, Rocks!*

FUTURE PLANNING, ALMOST COMPLETE.....

The Counseling Department has been busy this fall helping all students plan for the future. Beginning in September, each senior did a credit check to make sure he/she was on track for graduation. In addition, students were asked about their plans for after graduation. A copy of this credit check was mailed home to the parents. Following the seniors, counselors met with the juniors to find out how things were shaping up for them and what classes they were looking forward to taking their senior year. Juniors were able to see what classes they had previously selected and make changes. A copy of the junior credit check and transcript was mailed home. In October and November, freshmen began working on their four-year plan. This started as a three day process on the computer where they answered questions about themselves and what they would like for high school classes, and a career pathway was identified for each student. This individualized career planning guide, at Bridges.com is used district-wide by all students. After the student completed the process on the computer, parents were invited to join their student and counselor to finalize the four-year plan.

Spanish Students Give Back

Spanish teachers Shalise Stapp and Peggy Urton along with thirty-one of Moon Valley's advanced and AP



Spanish students volunteered their time with the Salvation Army's Angel Tree program on November 7th.

The students interviewed 330 needy families, the majority of which used limited English. Students were able to utilize their advanced language skills to communicate with the families. Without the help of the Salvation Army and volunteer interviewers, these families wouldn't be able to provide Christmas for their young children.

Students came on a Friday, the last of four days of interviews, and spent four hours finding out the ages, clothing sizes and gifts that would best fit each child, then entered all of the data into a computer and explained to the clients how they could pick up the gifts for their families.

The Angel Tree program director was thrilled with the performance of our students, saying that "it was the smoothest and most efficient work that had been done all week."

MV students processed 330 families, which greatly exceeded the average of 200 applicants, and were requested to come and help again next year. Rockets, rock on!

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Individuals interested in Census jobs apply on-line....then based on their zip code, they are contacted and referred to a local office for testing. Current recruitments are targeting field operations and the data processing center. Field operations include those aspects directly related to conducting the surveys. Staff is being recruited for field office managers, leads, assistant leads, and enumerators ("census takers"). Pay ranges are \$13.50 - \$16.50 for the majority of the 1,500 positions, with the exception of managers and leads which will be case -by-case. The projected start date has not yet been released.

For the processing center, there will be approximately 2,500 positions at this facility, mostly as data keying staff; two work shifts are planned. Plans are to hire up to 80 managers in the fall of 2009, with the remainder of the positions filled starting in January 2010.

Exceptions are some of the infrastructure and higher managerial positions for which hiring will occur earlier. **The pay range for the majority of the workers is \$14-20 hour.** For Workforce Connection locations see: <http://www.arizonaworkforceconnection.com/locations/cityofphoenix.asp>

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NEW LAW FOR ARIZONA LICENSE PLATES



The following is the result of changes to Arizona law A.R.S. 28-2354(B.) effective January 01, 2009

License Plate Holder Law - State law **requires that the state name at the top of Arizona license plates must be visible.**

Any license plate holder or cover that prevents the license plate from being clearly legible, is in violation of this new law. Violators will be fined an average of \$135, plus court fees, depending on the city where the violation is discovered.

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BLOCK WATCH GRANTS

\$10,000. Applications for the 2009 Neighborhood Block Watch Grant Program (NBWGP) will be available beginning Friday, **January 2, 2009**, online at **phoenix.gov/police/nbwgrant.html**.

Several changes have been made to the 2009 application process. The only workshop for 2009 will be on our website and is currently available at phoenix.gov/police/nbwgrant.html. The form is new, and all applicants, regardless of the amount of money they want to apply for, will use the same form. Applications are available online only, and completed applications must be submitted via e-mail to nbwgrant@phoenix.gov no later than Friday, February 6, 2009.

The 2009 application will require a budget narrative for the items requested. Also, each applicant must submit via U.S. mail a meeting roster from two different months of the previous year and an agenda that shows a crime prevention or safety topic was discussed during the meeting.

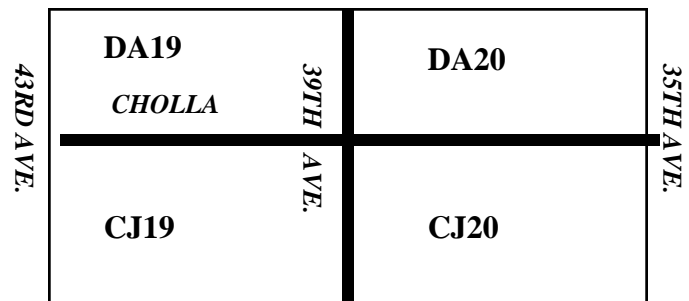
