Help! - RNO Challenge for 2009



The Dollar Dictionary Drive faced many challenges in 2008 that left us short of our goal in fund raising. We are confident we will close that gap in the near future, however we will be starting the new year from a difficult position of scratch - zero. We received donations from 36 member RNO's this past year which is a significant increase over **a** the participation of 24 RNO's in 2007. Those donations comprise about one-fourth of our annual needs and we need to increase RNO participation so that it reflects half or better of the total goal. Other donations come from individuals and in the form of small grants. We are truly grateful • for every contribution. We are proud to announce that our administrative costs are zero as we are an 'all volunteer' organization. Every dollar is applied toward fund raising, book purchase, and the distribution of books to students.

INC currently has 84 member RNO's. Our challenge is to have each member RNO donate to the dictionary drive in the year 2009. Our annual budget for this project is about • \$30,000 and, as all are aware, funds are scarce as hen's teeth lately. Participation by all our RNO members will greatly help during the coming year.

We have provided 6,000 to 8,000 dictionaries and thesauruses to Denver's third-grade students every year for the past 13 years. We place a gift label in the front of each book listing neighborhood organizations as a benefactor. We are sure your organization has been listed on that label and now we would ask that you do everything you can to make that recognition a part of the pride of your neighborhood. Not all RNO's have surplus funds in their treasuries but any amount you can give will be a big help. Some RNO's pass the hat at their annual or monthly meetings and some have neighborhood garage sales that may provide a means for a donation.

This project is widely respected in Denver and, in 1997, we were proud to be the recipient of the national Neighborhoods USA Award. We will be proud winners again this year when we have a greatly increased participation from RNOs citywide.

Of course, remember that individual donations are always welcome as well. Share this information with your friends, associates, and fellow workers. Maybe a donation jar at your place of employment will pique interest and awareness of this great project. Perhaps you can add an additional amount when submitting your INC Membership Renewal and desig-

University Park—The Volunteer Snow Shoveling system is active. "Safe Routes to School" sidewalks are being constructed. And the three-year Prairie Park project is underway. This 14-acre area along Buchtel Boulevard Trail will be re-vegetated in native grasses where needed. Care is being taken to protect the fox den site. An educational ecology-walk also is in the plan.

RNO Registration By Michael Henry

The Community Planning and Development Department (CPD) has sent to the contact person for each registered neighborhood organization (RNO) notice of the annual requirement for each registered RNO to re-register no later than January 31st. If an RNO fails to re-register, it will **not** receive notices of rezoning applications, zoning variances, liquor and cabaret license applications, street and alley vacation applications, and a host of other important notices from many City departments.

RNO representatives should note and be prepared for the fact that this year's notice requires more detailed information about each organization in order to ensure compliance with the City's Neighborhood Registration and Notification Ordinance. In other words, do not wait until the last day! The City is offering an option to re-register online. The City has sent e-mail instructions to each RNO.

In addition, RNOs should note that groups are now allowed to designate a **secondary, optional contact person** to receive city notices; this recognizes the fact that contact persons may fail to receive important notices if they are out of town or their computers malfunction. Very few groups have yet designated secondary contacts. RNOs should seriously consider taking advantage of this new option. If groups have recently changed officers and/or contact persons, they should be very careful to ensure that the appropriate person receives, fills out, and submits the registration form no later than January 31. As usual, CPD's Julius Zsako is administering the registration process. You should contact him if you have any questions about the

registration of your RNO at julius.zsako@denvergov.org or 720-865-2969. (Note: This re-registration as an RNO with the City is separate from the requirement of corporations to file an annual report with the Secretary of State {See Colorado Revised Statute 7-90-501} and is also separate from rejoining INC. The INC application form for 2009 is on page nine.)

Participate in ZAP

All members of Inter-Neighborhood Cooperation are encouraged to participate in the monthly meetings of the Zoning and Planning (ZAP) Committee. The Committee generally meets on the fourth Saturday of each month from 9:30 a.m. to noon at 1201 Williams Street in the 19th-floor party room. Thirty or more zoning experts from many RNOs attend each month to share information and ideas. The next meeting will be on **January 24th** with Michael Sizemore, the director of Neighborhood Inspection Services, as one of the presenters. The committee usually has several discussions each month with City administrators or policy-makers regarding zoning or planning issues and often proposes motions to the INC delegation. Contact the chair of the committee, Michael Henry, at 303-377-6609 if you have any questions or issues.

One of the major issues for the ZAP committee, for INC, and for all RNOs during 2009 will be the update of the Denver Zoning Code of 1956 vintage. Michael Henry serves as the INC representative on the Zoning Code Task Force. The Task Force, which has been working for almost four years, hopes to have several public meetings in the spring and to have a new zoning code and a new zoning map ready for City Council consideration in late 2009. TOD Area-Plans

As part of Denver's Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Initiative, Denver has been working with community stakeholders to develop new area-plans for priority stations identified in the City's *TOD Strategic Plan*. While the *Louisiana-Pearl Station Area-Plan* was adopted in 2007, the Sheridan, Alameda, and Auraria-West station area-plans are the next three nearing completion.

The purpose of adopting these plans is to establish the community's vision for how land use, transportation, and other public infrastructure should evolve in the areas around transit stations for the City to grow in the ways that promote the livability and sustainability envisioned by *Blueprint Denver*. Adopted area plans become the framework for implementing important regulatory tools such as zoning as well as guiding future public investment in the station areas.

The station area planning process has involved outreach to numerous stakeholders including community residents, businesses and property owners, and public agencies like the Regional Transportation District (RTD).

The Sheridan Station Area-Plan articulates near- and long-term goals for the area around the planned West-Corridor light rail station at Sheridan Boulevard and Lakewood Gulch on the Denver-Lakewood border, the first new corridor under construction in FasTracks. The line will extend 11 miles from Denver's Union Station to Jefferson County's Government Center. The West Corridor should be in operation by early 2013.

The Sheridan Station Area Plan goals include:

- Creating strong pedestrian connections between the light rail station and Colfax Avenue along Sheridan Boulevard.
- Attracting more mixed-income and market-rate housing to increase the number of people living near the station and to support retail services.
- Incorporating Lakewood Dry Gulch into the station design and bring new uses to its edge.
- Developing a station identity that reflects the best aspects of the surrounding neighborhoods and Lakewood Dry Gulch.
- Coordinating future infrastructure improvements between Denver, Lakewood, and regional partners including the Colorado Department of Transportation, RTD, and the Denver Regional Council of Governments.

The Alameda Station Area-Plan is for the area around the existing Alameda Station on the Central Corridor. Currently an area dominated by auto-oriented development, the station is surrounded by major roads like Alameda Avenue, Broadway, and the I-25 highway. While these provide high visibility and convenient auto access, they also pose great difficulty in walking or biking to the station for residents of adjacent neighborhoods such as Baker and West Washington Park.

The area closest to the station is anticipated to redevelop over time into a pedestrian-oriented area that reintroduces the city street grid and provides a variety of uses (including a new education center) that support the station and provide amenities to adjacent residential neighborhoods. The plan also envisions enhanced sidewalk routes to make major roads in the station area safer, more convenient, and attractive for pedestrians and new bicycle routes and bridges over the consolidated mainline railroad tracks and South Platte River to provide connectivity to the Athmar Park neighborhood to the west.

The Auraria-West Station Area-Plan will re-designate the existing Auraria-West Station, a part of the Central Platte Valley spur, as part of the West Corridor light rail project planned for opening in 2013 to serve as a transfer station between both corridors. Educational and industrial uses, as well as a large amount of surface parking serving both the Pepsi Center and Auraria Campus, currently dominate the area surrounding the station. Existing and proposed student housing are located west of the station. The plans for development surrounding the station encourage vibrant, transit-supportive, mixed-income, urban environments. The plan's fundamental objectives are to:

- Improve multi-modal connections between the mixeduse entertainment district, Auraria Campus, and the office/employment uses to the south.
- Connect students and transit riders with downtown, surrounding neighborhoods, and adjacent light rail stations.
- Activate the station platform and provide a destination for students and transit riders with a "campus hot spot."
- Connect the study area to the regional transportation system, including adjacent transit stations and downtown.

The Sheridan and Alameda plans were scheduled for Planning Board review this past December and a City Council vote this month. The Auraria-West plan will follow about a month later. Other area-plans that are expected to be adopted later in 2009 include the La Alma/Lincoln Park Station (which includes the 10th/Osage Station), the Evans Station, the Decatur Station, the 38th/Inca Station, and the 38th/Blake Station. Zoning and Planning

There was no ZAP meeting in December. The January meeting will occur on January 24th at 9:30 a.m. at 1201 Williams Street in the top-floor meeting room.

Executive Committee by Larry Ambrose

The meeting was called to order by Karen Cuthbertson on December 15th, 7:02 p.m., at 1201 Williams Street. Other Executive Committee (EC) members present were Larry Ambrose, Katie Fisher, Steve Nissen, Anthony Thomas, Don Tressler, Brad Zeig, and Penelope Zeller. Also present was Zoning and Planning Committee Chair Mike Henry and President's Dinner Committee Co-Chair Susan Morrison.

A motion to approve the minutes of the November 10th meeting was made, seconded, and passed by acclamation.

Steve presented the November Treasurer's report. The ending balance for all accounts was \$14,055.56. Steve believes we could make better use of the money INC has in its accounts as some of the certificates of deposits (CD) have a low return. In addition, there is as much as \$15,000 in checking accounts. He would like the Committee's authority to exercise due diligence in getting the best returns and placing funds in varying short term CDs. There was a motion to move \$2000 from checking and \$6,000 from savings into CDs.

Susan Morrison reported on planning for the Thursday, January 29th, event at the Doubletree Hotel at Martin Luther King Boulevard and Quebec Street. The Mayor has agreed to speak. Regarding other possible program presenters, Karen has checked out a couple of comedians. The Executive Committee members are pursuing these leads in hopes of finalizing the program soon. January 9th is the deadline for award nominations. Members agreed to call RNO presidents and ask for nominations to be sent to Karen. The Committee voted on the final menu selections for the Dinner. The bill of fare will be:

- Spinach salad with red peppers, goat cheese, and pine nuts
- Roasted beef shoulder tenderloin with rosemary infused Madeira demi-glace served with Boursin mashed potatoes and seasonal vegetables
- Chocolate truffle

Zoning and Planning Committee Chair Mike Henry made a request to Karen for the Executive Committee to approve a motion that required urgent action. Based on INC Bylaws Article III, H.2., "When timing requires immediate action, any INC Officer may propose that INC take a position or choose to act on any matter by making a recommendation for "exceptional action" to the INC Chair." A request for

"exceptional action" was made on the motion detailed in the letter on page 6.

The general membership will be polled by e-mail of the proposed action requesting a reply within 24-hours recommending approval or disapproval of the action.

Regarding the Dollar Dictionary Drive (DDD), Karen retrieved the source files from Signal Graphics and will update the brochure. The DDD owes INC accounts \$2,785.92. However, there is a left over inventory of \$3,560.20 of Dictionaries and Thesauruses from purchases this year.

Larry reported that the Parks and Recreation Committee will meet in January. Larry Ambrose has been involved in issues in reference to all of Denver's parks being cut off from Denver water. Katie and Larry affirmed that the Parks and Recreation Committee will spend time this next year studying the facts of this and other issues.

There was a motion to establish an award in the name of Nancy Jackson to be given annually to a person who has made an outstanding contribution to the Dollar Dictionary Drive. The motion passed by acclamation.

The U.S. Census has asked INC to participate in the 2010 census. There will be a series of three meetings to establish committees.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

RE: Comments on Building Denver's Future – Denver Housing Plan 2008 – 2018

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Please be advised that the Delegation of Inter-Neighborhood Cooperation voted 25 in favor, 0 opposed, and 2 abstentions in favor of the following motion from the INC Zoning and Planning Committee:

INC recognizes the need for affordable housing in Denver and generally supports the recommendations in the Final Report of the Denver Housing Plan Task Force entitled *Building Denver's Future – Denver Housing Plan 2008 – 2018*, but wishes to make these comments:

- Blueprint Denver must be recognized and respected in planning for Denver's future housing needs. Blueprint Denver was not mentioned in the Report.
- Planning for affordable housing must be closely integrated with the city's neighborhood plans, small area plans and transit-oriented development plans.
- 3. The city's Housing Plan should contain a commitment to improve the information given to RNOs and the meaningful participation of residents regarding housing issues in Denver, including, in particular, notification to RNOs of the proposed use of public funds to construct or acquire housing units. Currently, RNOs receive very little information and the Task Force's plan makes very little mention of the need for such neighborhood information and participation.
- 4. City agencies and RNOs should work together to "deconcentrate poverty" so that housing for the poor and other special populations are not over-concentrated in any parts of town and to encourage "good neighbor agreements" between providers of such housing and neighborhood organizations.
- The Office of Economic Development, Denver Housing Authority, Community Planning and Development, and City Council should all work together to implement a collaborative and nonconfrontational culture of meaningful citizen involvement in housing issues.

Stimulus for Denver Area

The Mayor and Governor push for a stimulus to the Denver area. Plans include speeding infrastructure improvements and creating a community-generated economic stimulus package. Colorado Governor Bill Ritter, Denver Mayor John Hickenlooper, and area business leaders have announced state and local efforts to stimulate the economy by accelerating infrastructure projects and initiating rapid development of a business-led economic stimulus package to be introduced early next year.

Hickenlooper announced that Denver will accelerate some of the 200 Better Denver infrastructure projects – approved by voters in 2007 – that are in various stages of planning, design, and construction. The City will seek to complete all of the projects within three to four years, creating vital jobs for Coloradans and opportunities for Colorado contractors.

This week, Governor Ritter sent the Obama administration stimulus suggestions for transportation and energy infrastructure projects to create new jobs in Colorado. In addition, The Governor has proposed a \$12 million job-

creation, job-training/retraining, and business-assistance package and announced \$200 million to start construction on higher education and other infrastructure projects.

Hickenlooper introduced the team representing local industry sectors that will lead the development of Denver's multi-sector economic stimulus plan:

Hickenlooper and Ritter also appealed to Coloradans help stimulate their local economies by supporting local businesses.

Award Nominations

INC bestows a new award, the Nancy Jackson Award, that goes to a person who has made an outstanding or innovative contribution to the Dollar Dictionary Drive. (The contribution can be financial, personal time, public relations, or other.)

The remainder of the awards are named in honor of noted, former INC participants - all now deceased.

The Virginia Oredson award is given to a person who has encouraged Denver neighborhoods or citizens to work together in a common effort to solve community problems, has established a record of selfless community service and has encouraged, and has motivated others to volunteer their services to engage in community improvement.

The Bill Gross award is given to a person who has a strong record of working with neighborhoods to better public safety in the community and has made Denver a safer place in which to live.

The Walt Kembel Award is given to a person or group who is/are an INC delegate/s or a member/s of an INC RNO. This person or group will have contributed to INC during the past year over and above normal expectations to develop and promote the organization or has moved INC forward or in new directions in creative or unexpected ways.

Then there are the "Neighborhood Stars" Good Neighbor Awards. Neighborhood Stars are nominated by the Board of an INC-member RNO. A Neighborhood Star is awarded to a person who has worked individually or with a group to make "Denver a Better Place to Live" or worked individually or with a group over the past year on a cause or a project that has improved the appearance or the quality of life in their neighborhood. A Neighborhood Star can be anybody who lives or works in the neighborhood and does *not* have to be a member of an RNO (or any organization, for that matter). A Neighborhood Star can be the kid who shovels an elderly neighbor's walk, the person who picks up trash at the park playground during his daily walks, a super neighborhood-friendly business owner, a tutor/mentor, or other.

If a person deserves these awards, let us not let them down. Nominate a deserving person right now! These awards are presented at the upcoming Presidents Dinner and the submission deadline is near (9 January). Send your nominations to the INC Chair, Karen Cuthbertson. The non-profit Metro Denver Sports Commission's (also known as Denver Sports) purpose is to create a legacy of economic and social vitality through sport. Through collaborative efforts around sporting events, the Metro Denver Sports Commission attracts, facilitates, and supports

- Economic vitality by attracting major events that generate a significant economic impact on the Metro Denver area
- Social vitality by promoting youth access, participation, and volunteerism in sport.

An example of a sponsored sports event is SportAccord. In March, Denver will be the host of an annual international sports convention that brings over 1,500 of the top Olympic and amateur sport leaders in the world. Representatives from more than 100 International Sports Federations, the International Olympic Committee Executive Board members, sponsors, bidding and host cities, broadcasters, and Games Organizing Committees will come together in an exclusive and authoritative networking environment.

In total, an estimated 3,000 people will head to Denver in order to attend this prestigious event, which is being held for the first time in the Americas. Madrid, Lausanne, Berlin, Seoul, and Beijing are all previous host cities. The 2008 event was held in Athens. Denver will also mark the first meeting of the International Olympic Committee's Executive Board in the United States, outside of an Olympic Games.

What is sport accord? It is a 5-day gathering of 1,500 leading representatives from international sport. The annual convention encompasses the Congress and General Assemblies of over 100 international sports federations. The mission is to offer the sports community a powerful opportunity to come together on a global scale, in an exclusive and authoritative networking environment, to build relationships, share knowledge and develop ideas.

How can you help? Bi-lingual volunteers are needed. The official languages of the Olympic movement are English and French. Though a large percentage of delegates speak English, the greatest need for bilingual skills is in French, followed by Spanish. Each volunteer will also need skills in other areas. Greatest needs for languages include: French, Russian, Spanish, Japanese, German, Chinese (Mandarin and Cantonese), Italian, and Portuguese.

Other skills needed (for both bilingual and non-] bilingual volunteers): Greeters/Hosts, Hospitality Registration, Transportation host and Drivers, Support – Office, PR, Media/Press, and IT, Directional assistance, Morning Run coordinators, and Special Events – transportation/ushers.

When are you needed? March 21st to 28th.

Recycle your Tree


This January 5th through January 16th, Denver Recycles' annual Treecycle program will be recycling thousands of Christmas trees into mulch again this holiday season.

It's as easy as can be!

- 1. Remove all tinsel and decorations from your tree. No artificial or flocked trees, tree stands, or trees in plastic bags. Christmas trees only!
- 2. <u>Manual and barrel customers</u>: set your tree out on your trash collection day near your normal set-out location during the two week period starting Jan. 5th.
 - <u>Dumpster customers</u>: set your tree out on January 5th or 12th and it will be collected during that week.
- 3. Be sure your tree is set out by 7 a.m. and at least four feet away from any containers, bags, dumpsters, or other obstacles.
- 4. Do not place trees in the dumpsters.
