





### February is National Litter Prevention Month

WANA salutes **Friends of Long Beach Animals** (FOLBA) for its many accomplishments. The organization is run entirely by volunteers. All program costs are raised through dues, donations, fundraising events, grants, gifts and bequests.



In 1998, FOLBA recognized the importance of sponsoring a public awareness campaign to stop pet overpopulation and introduced the City's first Spay Neuter Incentive Program (SNIP). FOLBA's program offers low cost and/ or free vouchers to local residents requiring financial assistance. Thus far, the SNIP program has resulted in more than 13,057 animals being spayed or neutered since the program began.

FOLBA began offering humane education classes at local parks. In 2001, these classes were approved by and are currently held in the Long Beach Unified School District, at no cost to the schools. Additionally, FOLBA pays certain veterinarian bills for stray animals in the care of Long Beach Animal Services on a case-by-case basis. FOLBA also accepts donations for toys for the dogs and cats sheltered by the Long Beach Animal Care Services at the P.D. Pitchford Animal Shelter. Donations to FOLBA's Shelter Animal Toy Program go towards purchase of KONG Classic dog toys and Kitty Woofer balls.
