## **Christmas Lights Vandalized**

We had a least one report of Christmas lights being vandalized the night of the neighborhood competition along Coolidge. Someone kicked a huge hole in a snowman and destroyed lighted snowflakes around the scene. The breaker was flipped and the rest of the lights were turned off. The house is painstakingly lit each year for the benefit of the children in the neighborhoods and not the competition. It's sad to see this happen within our neighborhood.

#### **Park Pavilion**

There has been some recent damage to the park pavilion. I noticed several areas where someone has scratched stuff into the concrete seating areas. Also, someone colored the hair of one of the friezes installed on the pavilion's columns. Arlington Community Services responded and got most of it off after a couple of tries.

#### Robbery

On Dec 5th a residence on Wilson was robbed after the front door was busted. This happened between 9 and 11:45 in the morning. Since this happened during a time that the resident normally leaves, the house may have been cased. Only a stack of Christmas packages wrapped to be mailed was taken. Though the place was searched somewhat, no electronics or jewelry was taken. The door had two bolts, but the woodwork was destroyed. The house did not have an alarm but the police were called afterwards.

#### **Potential Intruder**

On Dec 3rd at about 4 am, someone approached the front door at one of the duplexes on Lower Franklin. A sensor light came on and the dogs barked alerting the potential robber. He fled, but one of the dogs gave chase for awhile. The family was home and thankful that nothing bad occurred.

#### **Panhandling**

There was a recent article in the Fort Worth Star Telegram about an increase in panhandling in Arlington neighborhoods. These were reported by active HOAs/COPs. People have been requesting money and even rides to the hospital and have been coming to doors at night as well. Please be aware of these possibilities for our neighborhood. There was a large black male seen in our neighborhood on Wilson the other day by a neighbor. The man was walking between houses. He was approached and told that he was being watched. He was later seen at the apartments on Van Buren. Just a note to be extra observant in the hard economic times, as people may become more inventive and aggressive in taking advantage of opportunities. Please call 911 to keep the police informed and help us help move these people out.

Also report such activities to me (Les Perrin) so I can pass along the information.

#### **Activity on Adams Ct** – reported by Sheryl Fritz

On February 11th, the following occurred at 2204 Adams Court:

A car came down Diane Regis's driveway and several young men jumped out and ran to the corner of her yard and jumped over the fence; they were being pursued by the police and an officer jumped over the fence after them.

Bud Fritz was just going out for a walk when he saw the first car pull in really fast. Almost immediately, there was a police car in the Regis's drive blocking the other car and still more police kept coming. There were eventually 8 cars in the cul-de-sac and at least 12 officers! It was really heartening to see such a response. One car left to search and came back with one suspect. He was a young white man who is a senior at Lamar High. Two other suspects, both young black men, got away.

It turns out that the car was stolen and this group has allegedly been committing malicious damage (breaking car windows and tearing down mail boxes). The police had been on the lookout for them for a couple of days. One officer was driving down Washington and happened to see the white car go past him. He turned around to pursue them and they turned on to Adams and then into the court and down Diane Regis's drive.

The police eventually brought a wrecker to get the car out of the driveway. It's a wonder they didn't crash into her fence! Perhaps if our neighbors in the apartments see such a good response from the police, it will discourage them from preying on our neighborhood!

## Spring Gardening Tips for Parkway Central - Harry & David

Latures during a large part of the winter, we do have some periods of cold weather. If you have outdoor plants/perennials that you care about, it's a good idea to cover them when temperatures dip into the mid-20's overnight and rise again the following day. Providing a heat source under the cover improves protection when there are more severe freezes or prolonged temperatures below freezing.

One of the safest and easiest methods is to drape the plant with miniature holiday lights that you have left over from the holidays. Not enough heat is generated to damage the plant, but the heat that is given off by the small bulbs can make a big difference in the plant's survival. If you choose to use lights, remember a cover is still necessary to trap and hold in the heat.

## **Get Ready to Plant!**

February and early March is a good time to purchase seeds of warm weather annuals locally. It's also a good time to gear up for planting perennials in late March. If you've recently purchased a new house or want to revamp an existing one, now is the time to sit down and design how you want it to bloom, plan your purchases accordingly and plant at the right time.

## **Spring Bulbs!**

If you haven't already planted your

refrigerated bulbs, DO IT NOW OR THROW THEM AWAY. If you're planning a new garden and are purchasing new bulbs, get them in the ground soon after purchasing. Late February and early March are good times for tulips, for example, if you want early spring blooms.

## **Beware of Soggy Boggy Beds!**

Rain is usually generous at this time of year in North Texas, so watering

chores are normally minimal. If beds seem to be staying too wet, pull back the mulch or ground cover to allow water to evaporate. Sometime this year, rework your beds and elevate them to improve drainage.

#### **Nourish and Flourish!**

February is also a good time to fertilize your flowering plants. Use your choice of soluble or granular fertilizer formulations according to label directions. Pansies are especially heavy users of nitrogen, so keep a close watch on them. This is also the time to

apply specialized pre-emergent granular aids according to label directions in the beds of established annuals to prevent weeds in the coming season.

## **Vegetables and Herbs:**

Springtime planting is here for your health and food gardens. Decide now what you want to grow, how much to plant and where everything will go. (Go easy on the cucumbers — they're very prolific and you'll usually get many more than you can eat or give away!) Vegetables to plant in February and early March include beets, carrots, collards, corn, Irish potatoes, lettuce, mustard, peppers, radish, snap beans, shallots, tomatoes and turnips Keep in mind that some cool-season vegetables like carrots, cabbage and Irish potatoes won't mature until late April or May. Don't use up too many beds for these or you'll have little or no room to plant next month, when you should be planting your warm season vegetables.

#### Don't forget...

That newly seeded beds may need extra watering — almost every day — until the seeds come up. Give your plants some extra coddling and watch them flourish!!

It won't be long until the warm weather is here. With a little extra work and planning now, your summer will be filled with beautiful flowers, plants and delicious fruits and vegetables.

## A Man, A Warrior, A Truly Missed Neighbor

erb Neathery, a 30 year resident of Parkway Central, passed away December 12th, 2008. His life was honored and celebrated by his many friends and family at a memorial service at Wade Funeral Home and a reception at Rolling Hills Country Club where he was a member. His life was one filled with many accomplishments and honors.

Herb was born in Hoopeston, Illinois on January 17th, 1930. He grew up there attending John Greer High School where he was named best overall athlete ever to come from Hoopeston. He was a called a "legend". Herb excelled in all the sports he participated in: Football, basketball, baseball and track, but it was football that he made such an impact for both his high school team and then for the Fighting Illini of the University of Illinois. In his senior year at John Geer High School, Herb rushed for 14 touchdowns in eight games averaging 8.8 yards per carry.

After high school Herb received many scholarship offers, but chose to attend the University of Illinois after his father told him, "to sit on the bench at your state university would be more rewarding than playing for Ohio,

Indiana or Northwestern". While at Illinois his 1951 team went undefeated after Herb intercepted the ball on the 1 yard line clinching a 3-0 win over Northwestern. This win took the Illini to the 1952 Rose Bowl Championship game which they won handily 40-7 over Stanford.

After college Herb was drafted by Paul Brown's Cleveland Browns team but instead chose a career in the United States Air Force – a career that lasted 30 years. During that time, Herb was stationed throughout Europe, where he

married Lynn in January of 1957. In Europe and the United States he was flying jets and commanding squadrons in the Tactical Air Command and the Air Training Command. Herb served in Southeast Asia during the Vietnam Was as a forward air controller with the 173rd Airborne. Upon returning to the United States Herb commanded the Pilot Training Squadron at the United States Air Force Academy and then the Armed Forces Courier Services in Washington D.C. Herb's final assignment brought him to Texas where he was commander of the Southwest Region 7 Civil Air Patrol at the Dallas Naval Air Station in Grand Prairie.

During his 30 year career, Herb received many military decorations including the Distinguished Flying Cross and three Bronze Stars. Upon his retirement in 1983 Herb enjoyed 25 years of golfing and traveling with his buddies from Rolling Hills Country Club and his Sigma Chi brothers. He will be missed by all.

Herb is survived by his wife of 52 years Lynn, their three daughters Jill Rizzo, Brooke Hayward and Lee Vincent, six grandchildren and his sisters Sue Regan and Charlotte Sweeney.

large tree root. The entire tree may have to removed.

All of the electrical conduits should be installed soon and the additional new moon lighting

will be installed shortly thereafter. The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) will also cover the cost of installing electricity in the pavilion.

Since the completion of the pavilion, our neighborhood has used it to celebrate its National Night Out and Santa Claus party. Mission Arlington has also been putting it to good use. On Sunday afternoons at 2:00 p.m., they bring children from the Springtree and Forest Hills Apartments to the pavilion for Bible study and refreshments. Afterwards, the volunteers serve as supervisors while the children play in the park before being escorted back home.

On Mondays, Mission Arlington conducts an after school program in the pavilion at 4:00 p.m. The mission volunteers provide refreshments and help the children with their homework. They usually have between 50 to 70 children who attend, ranging in ages from prekindergarten through middle school. On President's Day, which was a school holiday, they had a party in which they provided refreshments and helped the children make valentine cards.

The work in the park is going according to schedule and the Park's Department expects everything to be finished in time for our neighborhood children's Easter egg hunt in April. The Easter Bunny should find the pavilion to be a neat place to hang out!

## **About Fences** – Jerry Thiel

ere are some things you should know about your fence. A building permit from the City is required if you erect a new fence or replace more than 50% of an existing fence in the course of repair. There are penalties for not having a permit, so make sure that your contractor or you have obtained one. For more information, call the city at 817 459-6502 or go to the web site www.arlingtontx.gov/build.

Pools of any kind as well as hot tubs and spas must be fenced. The height must be at least four feet and there can be no space through which a four inch diameter sphere would fit. Gates must be self closing and latching.

The City has nuisance ordinances regarding dilapidated fences that could result in a citation and fine. The definition of "dilapidated" was recently broadened. If any section leans by more than 15 degrees, and/or in any eight foot section 10% of its pickets or other structural components are missing, rotted, split, broken, etc. it is dilapidated. In addition, a code enforcement officer may now declare a fence dilapidated if the state of repair is such that it causes a safety or health concern, is improperly positioned, or deemed deleterious to the livability of the neighborhood. Lean can be easily checked with a plumb line and tape measure. Displacement from vertical in the length of the plumb line (L) should not exceed 0.268 x L.

The PCHA Deed Restrictions (section 3.6) state that no fence shall be any nearer the street than the minimum platted building setback; that fences must be of masonry, wood, wrought iron, or combination thereof (no chain link or wire); do not exceed eight feet in height; and that they shall be maintained in an attractive manner.

ee Rivers and his wife Joan joined the other residents of Parkway Central in the spring of 1990. Their cat, Bow, was added to their household a few years later. It took the issue of gas drilling the summer of 2007 for Lee to volunteer.


You no doubt saw and heard him spearheading our Association's efforts as Chairman of our Gas Drilling Committee. In late 2007 the initial and best offer at the time from Marsh Operating Company was a \$5,000 signing bonus and 12% royalty. After talking with at least three other gasdrilling companies over the next six months, and a homeowners group to our west, our Gas Drilling Committee listed the positives and negatives for each offer and presented the status to the Board of Directors. Of all of the offers and requests, only one vendor had a city approved pad site and they also made the best offer. That was Marsh Operating Company, who had also signed the Rolling Hills Country Club, the location of their pad site. An Association-wide meeting and vote resulted in the selection of immediate signing with Marsh. Signing began in late May of 2008. (See the Gas Drilling Update, for the latest information.)

The Rivers were both born in and graduated high school in Pennsylvania. After graduating from State College High School in 1958, Lee spent two years at Penn State University. He then joined the U.S. Army for three years and returned to State College, Pennsylvania to finish his degree at Penn State, graduating in March of 1966 with a B.S. in Psychology and began working for HRB-Singer, a research company located in State College.

After a year with HRB, Lee was enticed away by a former professor to go to Tallahassee Florida and acquire a

Master's degree in Educational Systems from Florida State University. With an educational stipend from the Army and from the University, he was able to devote full time to the required studies and he received his MS in August 1968. He continued his studies to pursue a PhD and achieved this goal in December of 1972. Lee returned to HRB and found Joan working there. In 1974 they were married.

Their life together began in State College, but soon found them in San Antonio and then in San Diego for Northrop Worldwide. Lee continued working in San Diego for Telemedia. When Hughes Electronics and later GM/Hughes came calling, Lee and Joan moved to Long Beach and then Arlington. For the last few years before retiring, Lee worked for Central Market in Fort Worth where he was a "foodie." Lee and Joan have three children – a son in Coppell, and a son

You will often see Lee and Joan walking along the streets of Parkway Central—say hi the next time you see them.


## **GAS DRILLING UPDATE** – Lee Rivers

There is definitely going to be a delay in the start of gas drilling in our area. In a January 30 article in the Star Telegram, Mr. Fuquay reported that the Chairman of XTO Energy predicts an energy rebound in late 2009 or early 2010. It was stated that natural gas peaked in 2008 at \$13.58 per million BTU and dropped to \$4.50 as of January 29. Therefore, it is understandable that the Carrizo/Marsh team will be moving slowly with the hope that the gas prices go back up. It is to our advantage that they delay the start of drilling as much as is needed to arrive at a better gas price.

The Carrizo/Marsh team is presently awaiting a firm commitment from a gas pipeline company to build a pipeline to the northwest corner of the Rolling Hills Country Club. It is doubtful that the pipeline will be operational before the end of 2009. Most likely it will be in the first quarter of 2010.

The January 27 Dallas Morning News contained an article outlining the first royalty check from the six natural gas wells on the UTA Arlington campus drilled by Carrizo. These wells were some of the best performing wells that Carrizo has drilled. It is a good indication that our area may also come up with a great producing set of wells.

Your Board of Directors will keep you informed of any changes and/or the beginning of drilling and its implications
