Click It or Ticket! Message from the Long Beach Police

Keep you and your family safe and \$132 in your wallet by making sure everyone wears their seat belts for every trip. That's the message that the Long Beach Police Department is telling drivers. Fines and fees have increased from under \$100 to \$132 this year for first time adult seat belt violations. For children under 16. the fine is now \$435 for the first time

The L.B.P.D. will be aggressively enforcing the state's occupant protection laws. The Click It or Ticket campaign relies on heavy enforcement and public education as a means to help save lives on California's roadways.

"Seat belts save thousands of lives every year," said Police Chief, Anthony Batts. "Buckling up will not only save you a heavy fine, it can also save your life. We're not giving warnings. It's 'Click It or Ticket."

Currently California has a seat belt usage rate of 95.7 percent, but that still means over one half million people are not buckling up. Properly restrained drivers, passengers and children, have a 50 percent better chance of surviving a crash than unbelted occupants. Those ejected from vehicles in crashes or rollovers are up to 35 times more likely restrained occupants! than

"Buckling up just makes sense," said Christopher J. Murphy, Director of the California Office of Traffic Safety. "It takes only two seconds for an action that can make the difference whether you or your family gets home today."



These annual celebrations became known as 6th District Clean Up Juneteenth.
