For that reason I will host a Community Budget Town Hall on Saturday July 11th at Silverado Park from 9:30 am to 12:00 pm. I encourage you to attend your Neighborhood Associations meetings where you will have an opportunity to speak to my staff or me about the budget. Between work, home restoration, vacation and everything else going on in wonderful Wrigley it's been busy. One thing I have been good about is keeping up with the garden.

This summer will not (I will say it again) - will not be a repeat of last summer. If you remember last summer was a sad state of affairs. I had few tomatoes, shriveled squash and lots and lots of bugs. This spring we did things a little different.

We took note from our neighbor and planted not only our raised beds but also the south side of the house. In Long Beach the south side gets all the good sun. This season we are successfully growing white corn, summer squash and a little striped eggplant that I was gifted at the co-op exchange.

This month it's the perfect time to reap everything you should have planted already; sorry I was not

here to help with that planting season. If you think you missed it don't worry. The growing season in Long Beach is really long. It's not too late to plant tomatoes, beans, radish or beets.

At our house in July, the tomatoes, eggplant and squash will still be coming in heavy. Please don't forget to pick your veggies. Don't let them rot on the vine since rot can spread from plant to plant. Plus if you pick your crop it will encourage the plant to produce more.

Good luck with your summer crop. I hope to see lots of great stuff show up at our exchange table on the first Monday of every month.


The Wrigley Association is one of the oldest and largest neighborhood associations in Long Beach.

Commander Luman and Staff would like to invite you to our next Commanders Leadership Forum on July 08, 2009 at 6:00PM

On May 21, 2009, at approximately 6:00 a.m., Long Beach patrol officers responded to the 800 block of Termino Avenue regarding a burglary in progress call. Their investigation led to the arrest of Jason Elliott, a 19-year-old Long Beach resident.

During the subsequent investigation, detectives located additional evidence linking Elliott to an automobile burglary that also occurred in the pre-dawn hours of May 21, 2009 in the 3600 block of East Anaheim Street.

Detectives have several other items, believed to been stolen from Long Beach residents in either residential or automobile burglaries. Both of these cases have been filed with the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office.

Detectives from the Long Beach Police Department believe there are additional victims and are requesting the public's assistance in locating them. If you or someone you know have been the victim of theft on or around May 21, 2009 please contact Detective Don Collier of the Long Beach Police Department's Robbery Detail at 562-570-5537.

On Saturday, June 6, 2009, the Long Beach Police Department conducted a Driving Under the Influence / Driver License checkpoint at Pacific Coast Highway and Daisy Avenue. "Drunk Driving - Over the Limit-Under Arrest" is the campaign for 2009. Long Beach Police Explorers and Long Beach Search and Rescue aided the Police Officers at the checkpoint.

The checkpoint operated from 6:00 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. During the eight-hour operation, 1,783 vehicles passed through the checkpoint with 488 being screened. Of the vehicles screened, 5 people were arrested for driving under the influence, 23 vehicles were impounded because the drivers were unlicensed or had a suspended license, and 48 drivers were issued traffic citations.

Checkpoints are a vital component in the fight against both impaired and unlicensed drivers. Nationally, impaired driving caused by drugs and/or alcohol causes one death every 33 minutes. Sobriety checkpoints have been proven to reduce impaired driving related collisions by removing these drivers from our streets. The average American has a 30% chance of being killed or injured by an impaired driver. This operation was funded through a grant from the "California Office of Traffic Safety", through the "National Highway Traffic Safety Administration".

On June 12, 2009, the Long Beach Police Department's Youth Services Division conducted a Tobacco Decoy Program as part of ongoing efforts to educate and support merchants who resist the sales of tobacco products to minors.

The operation targeted a total of 20 businesses, with 15 of them in compliance by refusing to sell tobacco to a minor, and five who did sell tobacco to the minor decoy and were cited.

The Long Beach Police Department would like to thank all merchants in our city who remain in compliance by not selling tobacco products to minors. Their continued support and effort to maintain the quality of health for our youth is commendable.

Summertime and the Living is Easy

There's nothing like summer to get people excited about summer outdoor decorating. Our climate affords us a long season. It's time to get outside and enjoy the wonderful weather and beauty of nature.

One of the wonderful things about summer weather is that it lets you expand your living space without a costly home renovation or addition. In many cases, you don't have to do much decorating at all. All you really have to do is sweep off the front porch and move a comfortable chair outside. Others of you may want to create a room outside, and the newest products for outdoor living can help you do that at a minimal cost.

Comfortable outdoor furniture is a must, but doesn't have to be expensive. Two lounging chairs and a table with four chairs for eating will really make your outdoor space comfortable.

Many products are available in a wide range of prices and come ready-to-assemble. You can go to your local discount store and find very inexpensive pieces that will last a year or two and give you good wear. Or you can make a modest investment in cast aluminum or wrought iron pieces that will last longer. Any of these needs to be brought inside in the winter to give you the longest life, but they're made to stay outside for the summer months.

More substantial furniture pieces made of teak, redwood, or the new, less-expensive eucalyptus will give you many years of service if treated properly.

If you're looking to save on the pocketbook but not the quality, you can put some models together yourself with glue and a dowel system.

No matter what kind of wood you select, you should have a place indoors to store it through the winter.

Wicker furniture looks wonderful and classic outdoors, but does not wear well in the elements. Cushions must be brought in from the rain and the wicker will deteriorate in the hot sun and humidity if not cared for properly. New all-weather wicker furniture may be the answer and is made by a number of companies.

A glass- or porcelain-topped table will hold up well throughout the season. Top it with an umbrella to keep the sun off. You may want to look at a fade-proof umbrella. Some new umbrellas are enhanced with solar-powered LED lights strung up the inside on the spine. They give a wonderful light for 8 hours after dark and are easy to maintain.

To enhance your outdoor space, flowers and plants are a must! Classic terra cotta pots can be put anywhere to create a border around your outdoor space. New materials are being used to make pots lighter and easier to move around. Lightweight metal, PVC and plastic can be made in any size and shape, are lighter than terra cotta, and can be moved more easily. If you don't like the exterior finish you find, try rag painting or spray painting them to the color and finish of your choice.

The 2nd annual Wrigley River Run & Tadpole Trot Presented by the Naza Family Foundation was a great success. More than 500 people signed up to participate, tripling in size over 2008.

There was great coverage of the event on Long Beach Report, in the Press Telegram and in the Signal Tribune.
