Student Letter Gets Playground Set for Foster & Chickasaw



Kaylee Grant, a student at Stephen Foster Elementary, sent an impressive

letter to Councilwoman Green requesting funding to install playground equipment reporting that "all we have is blacktop with lines. It gets really boring playing the same games...I just wish I could be inside finishing my work." Her letter was submitted with a petition with more than 45 signatures from classmates and others in the school.

Green was impressed by the team-based approach the Foster students displayed to address problems with both school and neighborhood recess. Green expressed that she was encouraged to grant \$25,000 for the project when she was assured that the playground would be available also to Foster students and neighborhood children.

IS THERE ANY STIMULUS FOR CHICKASAW?

Key local officials are currently meeting to determine how to spend \$421 million to stimulate the Kentucky economies. To ask if there is any stimulus for Chickasaw is a relevant question. Chickasaw has its share of foreclosures, blighted properties and conditions that need immediate stimulus.

Chickasaw, a small but significant neighborhood in West Louisville, has gone unmentioned in local stimulus initiatives. For example, both Shawnee and Park du Valle neighborhoods, that border Chickasaw, are continually targeted for revitalization projects. The Shawnee is a recipient of the *Weed & Seed* grant program for area restoration, community policing, and crime reduction. The Louisville Metro *Neighborhood Stabilization Program* that targets the Shawnee, Portland, Park du Valle, Smoketown/Shelby Park, and Newburg neighborhoods provides for redevelopment of blighted properties and home ownership assistance.

Chickasaw, traditionally a stable neighborhood, has decelerated due to the grim economy and area blight and infrastructure needs. Creating opportunities for area young adults and youth is paramount, as well as support activities for seniors and community. Nevertheless, Chickasaw is first stimulated when residents take action to change and maintain quality living.
