Total Present: 48, with 29 signing the attendance sheet.

Chair, Adrienne Maurer called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Introductions followed.

Minutes were approved as written.

The Treasurer's Report with a balance of \$514.11 was approved as read.

Ken Nicolet, FW SW Advocate, introduced the FEMA Inter-Government Affairs representative, Mary Ellen Mango, who will be in Fort Wayne until 6/22 working with city FEMA issues from recent storm problems.

He announced the city is getting increased family pool questions and fireworks calls now that warm weather has arrived. Ken said the 5th District is getting many street improvements, as well as 6 ½ miles of street paving in the Aboite annexed area. The Police Dept. Bike Sale will be May 30th at 9 a.m. at the St. Marys Ave. police location.

Ken said the Buckner Farms Park 1st phase of 200 acres is done with a pavilion. 2 playdrounds. a

splash pool and picnic area.

The annual Child Safety Fair at Safety Village will be May 23, Sat., 10 - 4 pm., with many activities, free hair cuts, a raffle of a mini-van, and fire trucks and safety vehicles will be on display.

FWPD Deputy Chief Doug Lucker announced April crime is down 21.3% from last year. Three problem criminals are now in lock up. Open garage thefts are up. He warned a scam of a couple with out of state license plates going to residents saying their vehicle broke down and asking for money to pay for a tow truck. The FWPD is working on drug houses in the quadrant, and crowd gathering problems springing up again in Foster Park so more police patrol is planned there to curb violation of park regulations. Al Mol stated people have even set up "picnics" on the golf course while it's in use.

Marge Johnson gave the BZA report of 2 items.

(1) Case 13-2009 of Hamlets Corp. for a permanent construction in the middle a residential neighborhood at 9909 Woodland Ridge was delayed until June 18th, and SWAP distributed a petition to neighborhoods urging denial so this variance does not set a precedent for future variances in residential neighborhoods.

(2) On June 8th, Monday, at 6 pm in Room 126 of City-County Bldg. there will be a public hearing on a proposed planned residential development at 1900 block of Reservation Dr. and Bluffton Rd.
