
Christmas Ships sail for 55th Year

Preparations are underway for the 25th anniversary year of Walk and Knock, the community's largest annual food drive, which is run by volunteers from service organizations such as Lions, Kiwanis, Optimist, Rotary, and Clark County Amateur Radio Club. There is no paid staff. In order for the program to cover Clark County in a single day, volunteers are greatly needed for this year's event, which will be held on Saturday, Dec. 5.

"Last year, Inter-service Walk and Knock gathered over 140 tons of food and over \$35,000 that was used to purchase food," stated Joe Pauletto, the

event chair. "This year, we are celebrating 25 years of service and we are working to break our record of 155 tons."

DCFS Helping Families in Hazel Dell

The Division of Children and Family Services (DCFS) provides services to support families who are in crisis and services to care for children who are in foster homes. We work with children and families to identify their needs and develop a plan for services that will provided support for the family while assuring safety and well-being for children. Our services are designed to reduce the risk of abuse, find safe alternatives to out-of-home placement, and assure safety and permanency for children in care.

Over the past two-and-a-half years, DCFS has been partnering with the Hazel Dell community to implement Family to Family. Family to Family (F2F) is a child welfare program designed to improve outcomes for the children and families serve. The Hazel Dell community was identified due to data reflecting a high percentage of children experiencing removal from their home of origin and placed in foster care from your neighborhood. We have seen positive outcomes for the children and families we serve as a result F2F. In the spring of 2007, there were 101 children from Hazel Dell in out-of-home placement. Of these only 2 resided in the same zip code. This statistic has drastically improved. In January 2009, there were 83 children in out-of-home placement and 14 remained in their same zip code, showing us improvement with two outcomes. More children were able to remain in their birth homes, and children who were removed were placed in their own community.

While partnering with the Hazel Dell community a local committee has been established. The Building Community Partners (BCP) committee currently includes over 20 members. Last year DCFS co-located a Social Worker, Shelley Arneson, at Hazel Dell Elementary to serve families in the surrounding neighborhood. We also hired a Community Liaison, Jennifer Gorder, to expand F2F by building and maintaining relationships. Jennifer has

developed a website (www.hazeldellfamilytofamily.org) and a Hazel Dell-specific resource guide. The guide is available to the community describing the F2F activities, as well as programs and referral information.

In reaching out to our area of focus, DCFS hosted a luncheon for the Hazel Dell Faith Based Community this past June. Over 15 organizations participated in this event, working together to identify gaps in resources for children and families living in your community. We are in the process of scheduling a similar event in January 2010 to build upon the relationships developed.

Recruitment and retention of foster families in Hazel Dell has been a focus for the past two years. Through presentations and attendance at local events, we have been able to increase the number of family foster homes by 10%. Several family pizza nights have been held in the past year in hopes of developing foster parents support networks.

Currently, Jason Lee Middle School, Salmon Creek Foursquare, and the Hazel Dell Boys & Girls Club are conducting a sock and underwear drive for children in foster care. Vancouver School District Facts about the Replacement Levy for Maintenance and Operations

Vancouver Public Schools will have a replacement levy for maintenance and operations (M & O) on the ballot February 9, 2010.

State dollars comprise approximately 63 percent of the district's general fund budget. The local levy, federal money, and other sources make up the remainder.

Voters approved the current M & O levy in February 2006. It is set to expire in 2010. The M & O levy comprises 17 percent of the district's general fund budget—more than \$36 million.

The replacement levy would continue local funding for basic education and maintain current programs and services. Levy dollars are essential to pay for the following items:

- Teacher and support positions
- Classroom supplies, textbooks and equipment
- Instructional technology and software
- School safety and security
- Maintenance of buildings and grounds
- Staff training and professional development
- Support for programs of choice
- Extended day/year learning
- Education for students with special needs
- Extracurricular activities and intramural sports
- Technology support in schools
- Substitutes (teachers and classified staff)
- Portable classrooms
- Utilities, insurance and fuel
- Student transportation

Voters must reauthorize the local levy for each year of funding. In Vancouver, voters have approved the M & O levy for every year since 1964.

To be approved, the M & O levy needs a 50 percent majority of yes votes. In Clark County, elections are vote-by-mail. Ballots will be sent to voters on January 22.

Voter registration

To register and vote in Clark County, you must be a U.S. citizen, be a resident of the county, have your full civil rights, and be 18 years old by the

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day of the election. To vote in an election for Vancouver Public Schools, you must live within the school district boundaries.

Voter registration forms are available at all school offices and at the Clark County Elections Department (1408 Franklin Street). Or, you may register online if you have a valid Washington State driver's license or a state identification card (www.clarkvotes.org).

You may register to vote in Clark County up to 29 days prior to the election date if you are a voter currently registered in the state of Washington. Registration forms may be submitted by mail, online, or in person.

If you are not registered to vote anywhere in the state of Washington, you may submit your registration form in person at the Elections Department up to eight days before the election date. For more information, contact the Clark County Elections Department, (360) 397-2345.

What is a Neighborhood Association?

Every community has something that makes it special and sets it apart from any other area. A community is made up of a collection of neighborhoods and they are each unique and reflect the interests, concerns and the make up of that area. Each shares a common bond that brings them together to work on issues that impact the quality of life in their area. Typically Neighborhood Associations form around a single issue, like community safety, but can also mobilize to address other issues of concern to the people who live within their boundaries. The leaders of the Neighborhood Association are all volunteers and elected by their members. Some dedicate a lot of time to their association, while some give what time that can to work on a specific project or issue. Some Neighborhood Associations meet every month and some meet once a year, while others may meet three or four times a year. Some publish a newsletter like this one, while others may publish only periodic flyer meeting notices.

Neighborhood Associations vary in size. In the City of Vancouver there are some that have less than 300 people living in a small geographic area while in the unincorporated Clark County there are two associations each with over 15,000 people who live in a

fairly large geographic area. For example, NE Hazel Dell Neighborhood Association is 4.2 Sq. Miles and contains 16,000 people.

Most Neighborhood Associations are primarily composed of residential areas, but NE Hazel Dell, Salmon Creek and others also have large commercial districts, therefore the issues that surface will vary from the norm. Neighborhood Associations work closely with the Clark County Sheriff's Department using Community Policing to help make our community safer.

Neighborhood association leadership has a wealth of knowledge and experience working on a variety of community issues. They try to keep informed and knowledgeable about important happenings which includes residential development, commercial development, Traffic, road conditions, schools, parks, public issues, senior issues, youth activities, litter pick up, sewer district issues, Fire Department and Paramedics support, safety issues, environmental and ecological issues, clean water, design standards, codes and code enforcement. Neighborhood Associations reach out to build partnerships with local business, local government, non-profit groups, clubs and other organizations and individuals to achieve objectives that can't be done by any one group.

Neighborhood Associations work closely with local government, city and county, on a variety of issues impacting the livability and quality of life of our community. They serve as a direct information source and are available to help neighbors in need when they don't know where to turn for assistance.

To be a member of a Neighborhood Association you must live, work or own property within the boundaries. Meetings are public and open to anyone. They never turn down volunteers to help on projects, even if they are from the other side of the river.

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Neighborhood Associations are non profit organizations, have bylaws and are recognized by local government. They depend on donations and fund raising projects to pay for the costs to operate the organization. Most of the operating costs are for postage (mail newsletters), office supplies and miscellaneous expenses. Those that serve their neighborhood associations get a lot of personal satisfaction from helping people in their community and seeing the fruits of their labor through community projects make a difference in their community that will last for generations to come (for example the Metro Park District).

There is a large need for community volunteers. There are many ways to help your community and everyone has something to offer. Your Neighborhood Association is a good place to start no matter where you live.


Neighborhood Association Mission:
