PLANITULSA UPDATE


Over the last two years thousands of Tulsans helped produce a groundbreaking comprehensive plan for our City.

COOPER NEIGHBORHOOD CRIME PREVENTION

Hello again to all of the residents, friends & family in the Cooper Neighborhood

Association. It has been an interesting fall and winter to say the least and, to throw in weather and politics, makes it hard to keep track of it all. Most importantly, we want to reassure everyone involved in your Association that we, as a police department, are still responding to basic, fundamental "public safety/police" core services without any problems and just as we have in the past. Even though it is extremely unfortunate that we have lost many very valuable, highly-intelligent, and outstanding young officers recently, we want all of our Cooper Neighborhood residents to know that we are still out here "taking care of business" and doing our jobs!

Along those lines, please remember that the "Spring Break" recess will soon be here. This will mean that numerous school-age & adolescent kids will be out of school for a while and "out and about" in all neighborhoods. Help your District Officers if you see anything "suspicious" (e.g., kids running & hurriedly climbing fences in your backyards, unfamiliar children/kids peeking into your neighbor's house windows, etc). Do NOT dismiss these suspicious actions as possibly bothering the police -you may just be the only one who has the valuable "tip" to help us catch a serial residential burglar! Don't hesitate to call 911 when you see these things.

Other recent "trends" include the thefts of general utility trailers. These trailers include single and double-axle, uncovered/covered type trailers that people use to haul a variety of items (i.e.: tree limbs, brush, ATVs, etc.) If you or your neighbor has such a trailer, please be aware of this problem. Most trailers are left unsecured and are easily stolen. Many have been secured and locked up by their owners, only to see them stolen as well. Please secure, and lock-up any parked trailer to the best of your ability and, if possible, apply a permanent identification number of some sort somewhere on the trailer. If the trailer is ever spotted by law enforcement, it can be identified or traced back to you, once it is located or recovered.

Until next time, keep an eye out for your neighbor, and live safe!

NEIL'S GARDENING TIPS

MARCH Cheer up! Spring's around the corner. Apply Preemergent herbicides to prevent crabgrass and other weeds in February and no later than March 15. Preemergents need to be applied before weed seeds germinate. Note: Applications may be applied later than March 15 if the soil temperatures have remained below the 50 to 60 degree germination temperature of crabgrass. A half inch of water or rain is required to activate the preemergent. Do not apply preemergent if you plan to over seed your lawn. For a better understanding of preemergents see, "Selecting and Using Preemergent Herbicides"**

Fescue, bluegrass .. apply one pound of actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. using a complete N-P-K formula in a 3-1-2 ratio. Slow release fertilizers are NOT recommended for use on fescue lawns.

Dormant fruit trees and other plants and shrubs at risk for aphids, scale and spider mites should be sprayed now with an all-purpose horticultural oil. Spray per label on a calm day with temperatures above 40 degrees, but not within 24 hours of a hard freeze.



If you missed planting trees and shrubs last fall, now is a good time to plant them. Late winter and early spring is the only time you should plant bare root trees and shrubs; this gives them a head start on the summer heat. The saucer technique, see "How to plant Trees in Clay Soil" **, is the preferred method for planting trees in the predominately clay soils found in our area. Research has shown that young trees will grow two to three times faster in the early years if a two to three foot band of mulch it applied around tree. Mulch reduces competition from weeds and grass, maintains cooler soil temperatures and conserves moisture

APRIL Fertilize warm season grasses when they start to green up in April. Quick release fertilizers, apply one pound of actual Nitrogen per 1000 sq ft three to five times per year and water in to prevent burning of the grass. Consider using a sulfur coated urea

(e.g. 46-0-0), a slow release form that reduces run off in spring rains. Apply 1 2/3 lbs of actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. two to three times per year during the growing season, refer to the label.

Remove the spent bloom on spring flowering bulbs and allow the foliage to die back naturally to insure great blooms for next year.

MAY Plant summer bulbs, e.g. cannas, dahlia, elephant ear and gladiolas. To prevent rotting wait until the ground temperature is above 60

degrees to plant caladium bulbs. Wait till the soil warms up to plant zinnias, periwinkle and other heat loving plants.
