EARTH DAY RECYCLING REMINDERS

Some EPA Recycling Facts:

Each of us uses approximately one 100-foot-tall Douglas fir tree in paper and wood products per year. Recycling 1 ton of paper saves 17 mature trees, 7,000 gallons of water, 3 cubic yards of landfill space, 2 barrels of oil, and 4,100 kilowatt-hours of electricity - enough energy to power the average American home for five months. Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run a 100-watt bulb for 20 hours, a computer for 3 hours, or a TV for 2 hours.

Kansas City's Recycling Program

Recycle these items in your bin:

Aluminum cans and other metal cans

Plastic bottles with a neck #1 and #2 (look for the number inside the chasing arrow symbol), such as water and soda bottles, milk jugs and detergent bottles. Please remove lids and rings.

Plastic containers #3 thru #7 (look for the number inside the chasing arrow symbol), such as yogurt and margarine/butter tub containers.

Office paper, junk mail, newspapers (without plastic rain bag), phone books, catalogues and magazines.

Cardboard (thick corrugated and thin cereal boxtype)

Paper/Hardback books

Pizza delivery boxes without food

Cardboard egg cartons (Styrofoam egg cartons not accepted curbside but are accepted at Metro North)

Shredded paper in a paper bag that is labeled as shredded paper

Don't put these in your bin:

Glass, plastic bags, styrofoam ,styrofoam egg cartons, motor oil bottles and other automotive product bottles, containers for household hazardous material, paper towels, tissues or napkins, plates or cups, aseptic and waxed containers, like milk cartons or juice boxes, gift wrap, photographs, blueprints and hanging file folders, bags that contained pet food, fertilizer, charcoal or kitty litter.

How to participate:

Participation requires the use of a recycling bin. This is required, because it signals the truck to stop. If you would like an extra bin, or need a replacement bin, please visit your local participating Westlake Ace Hardware or Price Chopper store. Bins are \$9 each.

Recycle:

Take your recyclables to the curb every week on the same day as your trash pick up. Every can, every day: Always remember to recycle your high value materials, like aluminum cans and newspaper!

Too much for the bin?

Set extra recyclables in cardboard boxes, paper bags or plastic tubs next to the bin. If you have more than two bags of trash, purchase trash tags for the extra bags at Westlake Hardware or Price Chopper.

BOARD NOTE

We are trying a new idea for our newsletter. Starting with this issue we will feature an article written by our various board members. It is our hope that, through this effort, you will come to know our board members a bit better. One rainy morning last August in Happy Rock Park I noticed a hawk in a tree not far from Shoal Creek. Actually the hawk was heard before it was seen. His cry was urgent, persistent and anxious - a sad variant of the piercing scream of a soaring hawk. Looking up I saw a big, wet, darkly feathered creature. He periodically hopped from branch to branch as he continued whining. It occurred to me that this might be a fledgling hawk demanding that his parents feed him. His parents were not seen.

On several mornings after that I was entertained by a pair of juvenile hawks learning to fly. They must have been staying close to the nest and their parents. They flew to the softball diamonds and sat on top of the batter's cages. They were being bullied by some crows and there was lots of cawing, squawking and crying. The hawks were outmatched and gave up their perches twice to flee their tormenters. They were learning to fly but they weren't soaring just yet and they had not come into respected raptorhood.

The hawks were probably red tailed hawks. A nesting pair of red tailed hawks will usually raise two young. The young fledge at about 45 days. When they leave the nest they can't fly for a while and the parents must feed the fledglings until they are able catch their own food. A couple of months later I observed two hawks gliding on air currents with all the grace and assurance of adult raptors.

I'm hoping the hawks will return this year to raise another family. Red tailed hawks tend to use the same nest year after year. They add leaves to the nest and it can become quite large. So if you discover their nest or have the opportunity to be entertained by our red tailed hawks please let me know.

Shortly after writing this article I saw a red tailed hawk in the park. At first as it flew from tree to tree I thought it might be an owl but as I walked across the playing field on the west side of Antioch the big bird flew away and it was easily identified as a hawk. As it flew off another hawk joined it. If you look west toward the Prospect bridge you can see what may be a hawk's nest in a big sycamore tree

NEW HAPPY ROCK PARK WALKING TRAIL

Some neighbors have asked about the bridge construction at Happy Rock park. Gladstone and Kansas City are working together as partners in the MetroGreen initiative. MetroGreen is an interconnected system of public and private natural areas, greenways and trails linking communities throughout the Kansas City metropolitan area.

The 1,144-mile greenway plan covers Leavenworth, Johnson and Wyandotte counties in Kansas and Cass, Clay, Jackson and Platte counties in Missouri.

The concept of a metro greenway system is not new. MetroGreen extends the "parkways and boulevards" concept of the 1894 Kessler Plan for Kansas City, Missouri; builds on existing local greenway plans and systems; and is the next step in a project begun in 1991 by the Prairie Gateway Chapter of the American Society of the Landscape Architects. The new walkway will extend from

NE 72nd, north along the west side of N. Antioch, over the bridge, through the west section of Happy Rock park and will eventually extend under the M1 overpass to connect with the trails that will be included in the new housing addition, Parkway Village, on the west side of M1.

SPRING VEGETABLE QUESADILLA

Ingredients

Quesadillas:

3 tablespoon olive oil

1 cup julienned yellow onion

1 cup sliced asparagus

1 cup diced zucchini

1 cup frozen corn, thawed and drained

½ cup small diced yellow pepper

1 cup grape tomatoes, halved

1/4 cup thick and chunky salsa

1 tablespoon minced garlic

½ teaspoon each of dried oregano, salt and pepper

4-10 inch flour tortillas

1 ¼ cups shredded Mexican cheese blend

Chipotle-Lime Sauce (recipe below)

Directions

- 1. Heat1 tablespoon olive oil in a large sauté pan over medium-high heat.
- 2. Add onions and sauté, stirring occasionally until golden brown.
- 3. Add asparagus, zucchini, corn and yellow pepper; cook until vegetables are lightly browned.
- 4. Stir in grape tomatoes, salsa, garlic and oregano.
- 5. Remove from heat, and season with salt and pepper to taste; let cool.
- 6. To assemble, place tortillas on a

flat surface; evenly spread vegetable mixture on half of each tortilla and sprinkle vegetables with cheese. Fold tortillas in half over vegetables.

- 7. Oil a flat griddle with remaining oil and heat on medium. Place quesadilla on griddle and cook 2 -3 minutes per side.
- 8. Cut each quesadilla into wedges. Serve with Chipotle-Lime Sauce and garnish with cilantros prigs, if desired.

Chipotle-Lime Sauce

1 cup light sour cream

3 tablespoons fresh lime juice

1/4 teaspoon sugar

 $\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon chipotle chili powder
