Instead of having the towtruck come into the lot to load the car, the car was taken to the parked towtruck, across the street. The situation was that bothsides of the street had "NO Parking" signs, due to the curb work done on the east of Euclid. So, what necessitated the towtruck to park against the way to load the car? The white pickup truck in the picture above was double parked (emergency lights flushing) to alert motorists, approaching from the east on Dwight, of the plug ahead. EMERALD CALLS ETHICS RULING A VICTORY

San Diego City Councilmember Marti Emerald is pleased with the unanimous decision by the San Diego Ethics Commission clearing her on charges that she deliberately violated the city's Ethics code.

The Ethics Commission staff accused Councilmember Emerald of deliberately concealing two campaign debts after her November 2008 election win. The bills totaled \$50,000.

"this was the whole reason for our Ethics Commission hearing," said Emerald. "We reported to the Ethics Commission more than a year ago that we made two accounting errors and worked with staff to correct them. But the staff later claimed the mistakes were deliberate and refused to negotiate with us. We had no choice but to take our case directly to the Commission for an Administrative hearing."

After two days and 10 hours of testimony, the five Ethics Commissioners agreed with Councilmember Emerald. During televised deliberations, seen live on City-TV, all five Commissioners spoke directly to the issue of concealment, with each one stating that there was no evidence of intent to conceal. Instead, the Commissioners concluded that violations were inadvertent errors. The commissioners also said that Emerald Campaign Committee cooperated fully with the investigation.

The Councilmember will pay a \$3,000 fine for the inadvertent violations. Emerald said, "The fine is fair, I'm just glad this matter is resolved."

SAN DIEGO- Assemblymember Marty Block (AD-78) will join local education and community leaders at a community town hall forum tomorrow to update, discuss and offer proposed solutions to the recent decision by San Diego State University (SDSU) to deny admission to 1,740 local students who met admissions criteria established by the university. The forum is sponsored by the United African American Ministerial Action Council (UAAMAC), an organization focused on the development of public policy initiatives that are crucial to the African American community.

\$3 MILLION UPGRADE FOR SAN DIEGO STREET LIGHTS

SAN DIEGO - Senator Christine Kehoe (D-San Diego) announced today a \$3 million state loan to the City of San Diego for purchasing energy-efficient street lights.

"The loan from the State Energy Commission will allow the city to convert 5,700 sodium vapor street lights to induction lights, which last four times longer, use 50 percent less energy, and better illuminate roads and street signs," Kehoe said. "The project is estimated to save the city \$350,000 in

energy and maintenance costs each year while removing the equivalent of 860 tons of greenhouse gas emissions. This benefits the environment, the city, and taxpayers."

The California Energy Commission issued the loan, and San Diego Gas and Electric will provide an additional \$129,000 in cash incentives. The city must repay the loan with interest, and expects to do so in about eight and a half years.

The state loan program was established in 1978 and has provided more than \$250 million to 750 recipients, including local governments, school districts, hospitals, community colleges, and public universities.

EFFECTS OF THE OIL SPILL

(April 29) -- With oil from a destroyed rig gushing into the Gulf of Mexico at an estimated rate of 210,000 gallons per day, the effects on wildlife will almost certainly be profound.

The April 20 explosion of a BP rig killed 11 people and eventually led to the platform's sinking about 50 miles off the Louisiana coast. But now the ensuing spill threatens 445 species of fish, 45 species of mammals, 32 species of amphibians and reptiles, and 134 species of birds, the [Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries](#) told AOL News. And when the massive oil slick makes landfall in Louisiana on Friday, it will hit 10 wildlife refuges or management areas, such as the Gulf Islands National Seashore.

"The challenge with this type of oil is it's going to float, and, depending on what the wind and waves do, it may stick around for a while," National Oceanic Atmospheric Association spokesman Tom Brosnan said at a news conference today. "And as you get closer to the shorelines, you tend to find richer life." (Picture by Getty Images)

Sea Creatures

Already a critically endangered species, the **bluefin tuna** comes

to the Gulf of Mexico between April and June in order to spawn. Its eggs' viability would be plummet upon coming into contact with oil. Mammals that must surface for air, such as the **bottlenose dolphin** and the **sperm whale**, are likely to encounter patches of floating oil in the process.

Bivalves like **oysters** will be especially sensitive to the spill. "Mainly that's because they can't move," Karen Foote, a marine biologist at the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, told AOL News.

Known as a "sea cow," the endangered **West Indian manatee** migrates along the Gulf Coast in search of warm water. Eating sea grass and other plants it finds in the shallows, the mammal may find its food sources contaminated when oil reaches the shoreline. (Ernest Coleman, AP)

Like other endangered species, the West Indian Manatee may see its food supply dwindle when the spill reaches the Gulf shoreline.

The **Gulf manhaden** represents the third largest fishery in the United States. Because it is a filter feeder -- meaning it circulates water through its system in order to strain out food -- the oil poses a severe threat to its health, and also to the fish oil business it supports, the [Telegraph](#) reported.



Land Creatures

Several bird species frequent the gulf region, some stopping to lay eggs and others simply to feed. Along the Louisiana shoreline, for instance, 5 million migratory birds stop and nest in the network of coastal marshes each year. According to [LiveScience](#), when oil coats a bird's feathers it is no longer able to repel water or trap air, resulting in the bird's death by hypothermia. Louisiana's state bird, the **brown pelican**, is no longer on the endangered species list but has just begun its nesting season on the barrier islands. As many as 96 species of migratory songbirds, such as **warblers**, **buntings** and **swallows**, make stops along the gulf shore on their annual journey from the United States to Central and South America, [CBS News](#) reported. HALTING OFFSHORE DRILLING

BATON ROUGE, La. (April 30) -- The White House said today it is halting all new offshore drilling in U.S. waters until there's an "adequate review" of a massive 600-mile-wide oil slick that has begun to drift into Louisiana's wetlands. Florida's governor declared an emergency in six Panhandle counties, and BP pledged to reimburse people whose property is damaged by the spill.



Winds, high tides and waves through the week-end were forecast by the National Weather Service, forces that could push oil into lakes and inlets around

southeast Louisiana. Thunderstorms are expected today, along with seas of 6 to 7 feet that pushed tides several feet above normal.

Forecasters say the spill could reach Mississippi within a day, Alabama in two and Florida by early next week. "The oil slick is generally moving in a northerly direction and threatens Florida's coast," Gov. Charlie Crist said in his [emergency declaration](#) that seeks to ensure a fast response in his state to the spill. The federal government is defending its response to the spill, which began with an April 20 blast on one of BP's offshore rigs that burned for two days before sinking. Rescuers saved 115 workers, but 11 are presumed dead. It wasn't until Thursday -- nine days after the explosion -- that the White House declared it "a leak of national significance."

White House senior adviser David Axelrod told ABC's ["Good Morning America"](#) today that President Barack Obama has decided there will be no new domestic offshore drilling until an investigation of the Gulf of Mexico oil spill is complete.

On Thursday, June 24, 2010, the 15-member Crossroads Redevelopment Project Area Committee (PAC) will hold its annual election at College Avenue Baptist Church, Visitor Center Building, 3rd Floor, located at 4747 College Avenue. The election will be from 6:30pm to 8:30pm. Interested members of the community are urged to participate as voters and as candidates.

The PAC is the official community organization comprised of elected community representatives who advise and consult with the City of San Diego Redevelopment Agency and also provide community input and recommendations regarding redevelopment projects within the project area, particularly those projects that affect residential uses. The PAC is structured to have representatives from local renters, homeowners, businesses, property owners, and community organizations.

Candidates and voters must be at least 18 years of age and must reside in the Crossroads Redevelopment Project Area, or own a business or property located in the Project Area, or have representation status from a community organization serving the Project Area. Candidate information must be submitted by 5:00pm on Monday, June 21, 2010, to be eligible to run for a seat.
