To enjoy these, one of kind beauties, you have to slow/quiet down and know where to look. How many of you have noticed the "maguey" stock growing behind 4932 Lantana, for the last two weeks, and now visible from the street? Now it has reached maturity and a height of estimated forty (40) feet up in the air. On a sunny afternoon, two days ago (06/03)

the Cooper's Hawk, pictured, made a point to stop by, perch and rest for about an hour, until the famous crows came and chased it away.



The Maguey plant (the spiky head pictured at the bottom) is the raw material from which "tequila" is distilled and rarely flowers like this, this is the first time in 17 years for this particular plant. Just think: how many of us will be around for the next cycle? Is there a botanist in the house to enlighten us about this marvel of nature? Our neighborhood is very special and unique among many. It requires a particular type of resident to dwell on the canyon rim to abide, love and care for it.

EXTREME HOME MAKEOVER

The Seventh Annual College Avenue Baptist Church Extreme Home Makeover took place, across Mid-City, this last, Saturday, May 1st, 2010. The Makeover scheduled 33 homes for repairs and harvested the kind help and labor of 232 volunteers and served 285 lunches to volunteers and homeowners. Here it goes. He was chased out of the dumpsters at 4898 Lantana. As the voices got louder, other neighbors went out to the street. Then, he was chased out of 4932 (the house for sale) as he was trying to push open the back door over the deck. One of the neighbors went back into his home to get a camera. By then the man was diving into the dumpsters at 4938 Lantana. When the picture below was taken, he was diving for

recyclables in the black binds, in a non-trash day? Perhaps, but please think: how much recyclables can he store and carry in the baby stroller? This is not the first time that this man and others have been chased out of neighbors' front/back/side yards. Perhaps you have not experience the weird feeling it gives you when you find them right where you don't expect them. What is this man doing coming into people's properties and trash containers? ...Is it more like: casing, ID theft or any other? You try to explain and excuse the behavior... and then decide.



SAFETY HAZARD!

The S curb around the pork-chop has always been a pain to the residents of Auburn/Wightman. It does not only twist but it goes up a very steep hill in visually challenging conditions. It was the traffic issues (serious accidents, kids/adults hit sent to hospitals, side-mirror swiping, cars driving into properties, speeding, etc) generated by this location that created the catalyst and compelled the residents to organize the Neighborhood Association in 1997. The advent of the One-way Loop (Auburn/Wightman) provided a real solution to many of these issues and it has worked well. ...Until now that brainy humans tend to provide their own adrenaline rush by doing things like the one pictured below:



Last Thursday night (06/03/10) a resident called to report a near miss at this location and went on to find out which household had placed the

trashcan so far away from the curb. Dark and late, he had no answer to his quest. The following day (Friday, about 4:30 PM), another resident called: same thing, a near accident about to happen when cars suddenly stopped or veer away to avoid the cans. 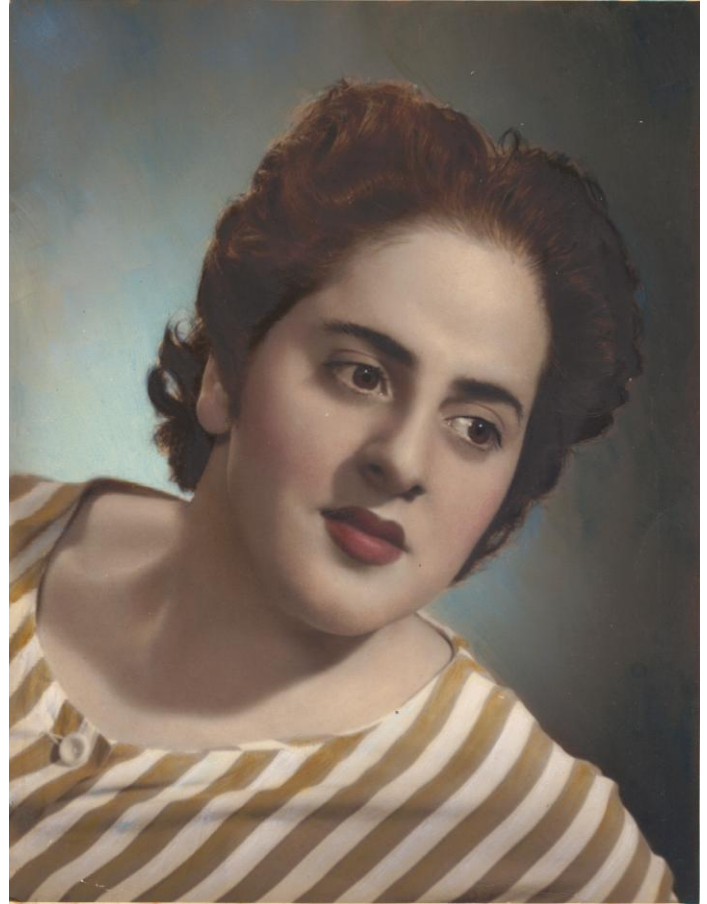

Eleanore May Najimy Andrews

August 21, 1925 - April 12, 2010



My Mother, Eleanore May Najimy, arrived in, now, Fox Canyon, San Diego, on November 8, 1948 with her Father, Mother and Sister, from Pittsfield, Massachusetts. My grandfather, Shaheen Najimy, was a savvy businessman who loved to purchase lots of real estate. Soon after coming to San Diego (1948), he bought a house for his family at 4879 Auburn Drive where they lived for two years before purchasing our present home on Reno Drive in 1950. At one point, my grandfather wanted to purchase all of Mission Valley when it was only developed by dairy farms and transit with a two lane road all throughout. I remember my grandmother's strong opposition to the transaction as being wasted land and not a good purchase. But he went on to own and entire block of business property fronting University Avenue between 40th and Central, now the I-15. The frontage on University had 8 stores, all his. In the interim, my grandfather went on to build the rental duplexes on Estrella. My grandfather gave my mother the house on Auburn Drive when he bought this house on Reno, in turn she gave the house to her brother who had just been married. My uncle and aunt had four kids and one of them, who grew up in that house, is my cousin **Kathy Najimy**, as a famous actress, she appeared in Sister Act 1 & 2, Hocus Pocus, and was the voice of Peggy Hill in King of the Hill, among other things. Back in Pittsfield, before coming to San Diego, my grandfather owned a grocery store where my mother worked when she wasn't in New York. My mother studied the Violin and took Singing Lessons (opera) in New York City before they came to San Diego and here, she kept up her singing in the 50's and 60's. While living on Auburn Drive my mother met my dad and became Mrs. Eleanore May Andrews. I don't remember what year they married. Mom and dad had four kids, my sister on February 15, 1955.

Neighborhood Matriarch, dear and beloved Ms. Burger, just went to meet her husband in companion with the Lord. Today (06/05/10) we received the saddening news and dreaded phone call at 10:00 AM, this morning.

She died not long after birth. I, Eugene (Gene) Walter Andrews Jr., came along on March 2, 1956, my brother on November 28, 1958, he died not long after birth, and my second brother, Michael Anthony Andrews, who is with me now, on August 17, 1961. So at 85, my mother is with my sister and brother, now. My dad, the old geezer is still here, he turned 90 on May 21 and lives in North Park with his third wife. On April 9, 2010 life was about to make a horrible change for my brother and me, as my mother had suffered a massive stroke and on Monday morning April 12, 2010 at 9:50am we got the call from the hospital telling us that my mom had passed.

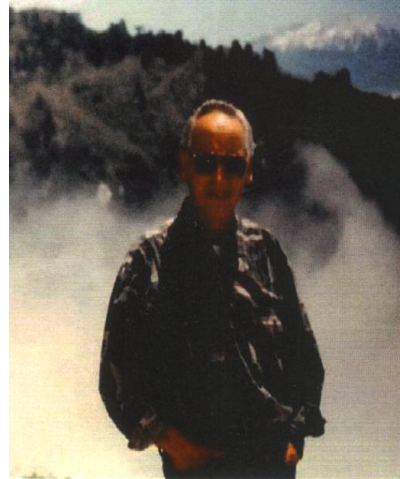

William Albert Punak
December 11, 1935 – October 14, 2009



William Albert Punak was born on December 11, 1935 in Winnipeg, Canada to Nicolas and Anna Punak. Bill's father, Nicolas, was born in Vienna, Austria. A multilingual, Nicolas had a strong command of Ukrainian which Bill's sister Sonia also speaks. The Punak family, including his father, mother and sister Sonia, moved to Vancouver, Canada in the '40's and then to San Diego, in 1951. While he was still in high school, Bill designed and helped build a house for his family. Bill's sister, Sonia, still lives in the Lantana Drive house today. After high school, Bill became a journeyman carpenter in San Diego and then moved to northern California to work as a lumberjack in a comp near Mount Shasta. Bill became a master craftsman with almost any material he worked with, and this ability became a hallmark of his entire life. In the early sixties, he moved to Dana Point to live with his friends Richard Balkwell and Luke Brubeker. There he took advantage of the good local surf and weather. Bill was an accomplished surfer. In 1963, he and Richard sailed a twenty-four foot boat to Hawaii, a journey that lasted about 35 days. He loved Hawaii so much that several months later he returned for a convention where he met his future wife, Anita Penner. Bill and Anita were married on November 16, 1963. Bill designed and built a house for his family in Capistrano Beach, in 1969, where he had three children, Stephen, Mark and Rebekah. After Bill and Anita separated in 1987, he moved to Yucca Valley, California. It was in the high desert that Bill discovered the Twenty-Nine Palms Soaring Club and learned how to fly glider planes. The glider club was a close knit group of friends that became like a second family to him. Bill was an active part of Fox Canyon. He attended association meetings and also marched with his neighbors to City Hall in support of the Ontario Avenue street connection and the Fox Canyon Parks issues. Bill was fun to be around and took to teach his neighbors about supporting neighborhood issues when those issues have a direct negative consequence upon private lives. We all can remember the stories he shared about his trips to Costa Rica where one of his sons has



made a permanent home. He also never stopped short talking about Becky and her law studies. Bill loved to fly, ski, surf, sail, cook, talk, tell jokes, take pictures, spend time with his children and grandchildren, and work with his hands. He was very much loved and we will miss him along with his sister Sonia and the rest of the neighbors. Bill Punak leaves six grandchildren, Nadja, Natassja, Gunnar, Karina, Savannah and Macey.

CROSSROADS PAC ELECTIONS

On Thursday, June 24, 2010, the 15-member Crossroads Redevelopment Project Area Committee (PAC) will hold its annual election at College Avenue Baptist Church, Visitor Center Building, 3rd Floor, located at 4747 College Avenue. The election will be from 6:30pm to 8:30pm. Interested members of the community are urged to participate as voters and as candidates.

The PAC is the official community organization comprised of elected community representatives who advise and consult with the City of San Diego Redevelopment Agency and also provide community input and recommendations regarding redevelopment projects within the project

area, particularly those projects that affect residential uses. The PAC is structured to have representatives from local renters, homeowners, businesses, property owners, and community organizations. Candidates and voters must be at least 18 years of age and must reside in the Crossroads Redevelopment Project Area, or own a business or property located in the Project Area, or have representation status from a community organization serving the Project Area. Candidate information must be submitted by 5:00pm on Monday, June 21, 2010, to be eligible to run for a seat. Voters should bring the proper documentation with a valid photo identification to the election to vote.

Seven (7) seats are open for election: two (2) residential tenants; one (1) residential owner-occupant; three (3) business/property owners; and one (1) at-large community organization representative.

To kick off the 2010 Special Olympics Summer Games, Cindy Block, representing her husband, Assemblymember Marty Block (AD-78), yesterday joined with law enforcement officers, Special Olympics athletes and representatives from local government agencies to participate in the Special Olympics Torch Lighting Ceremony and Law Enforcement Torch Run. The annual torch relay began at the Chula Vista Police Department Memorial Wall. Participants carried the "Flame of Hope" and made their way through San Diego, spreading the messages of optimism and athletic competition that these games bring to California. Representing Assemblymember Block at the torch ceremony and in the relay, his wife Cindy carried the torch for the Pacific Highway portion of the run. The Law Enforcement Torch Run consists of three distinct legs and features three torches that officers and representatives carry on separate paths throughout Southern California. All three will descend upon the campus of California State University, Long Beach, home of the 2010 Special Olympics Summer Games on June 12 and 13. The three torches will be unified into one torch that will be used to light the cauldron at the Opening Ceremony to symbolize the start of the Summer Games. 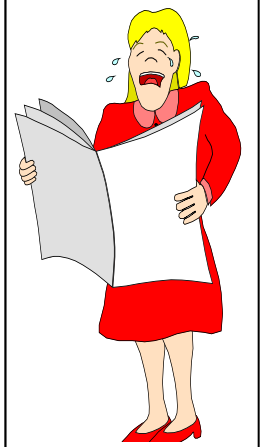
