

A PVOBW member asks:

"Jerry; Now that Mercury Mine is back to school, the high speed vehicle traffic is also back. I'm not sure if speed humps/bumps are available through block watch grants. If they are, I would be happy to write the application and spearhead the detail work. We're on Cinnabar which is a popular cutthrough street for parents on their way to and from Cheryl to 28th St. Let me know if you are interested. Take care." -Rick

Jerry Cline replies:

Humps & Bumps

"There are speed bumps that are industrial plastic and easier to install and speed humps which are like those on Cheryl.

Speed bump expense information is available via the Block Watch Grant List:

http://www.phoenix.gov/STREETS/speed-hmp.html"

I asked for anyone interested in speed bumps last year as we wrote this year's grant, but there was no interest.

The Grant writing process begins Jan 02 (forms become available online).

Grants are analyzed by the Block Watch Grant Oversight Committee (in full disclosure, I am a Block Watch Grant Oversight Committee committee commissioned member representing Council District 3).

Money becomes available after July 01 A lot has to be done, including city in-

spection, neighborhood surveys and general agreements.

I located the forms URL so you can follow through as you proposed, and I will assist where I can.

Be aware, it could take a couple of years, this is the government and it takes time to get all the ducks lined up.

Before you go to far, spend time walking Cheryl and observing the traffic. Note the noise, slow down, over the hump, speed up, slow down, over the hump, speed up... I was considering them for 30th St, but decided the noise is not worth the difference.

Alternatives:

I will be purchasing a RADAR gun with grant money.* It also requires 4 PNP members for a squad: Operator, Observer, Photographer and a note taker. Tickets are not given, but reports with photos are presented to our Phx PD Community Action Officer (CAO).

When more of you join in and become PNP members trained by Phoenix Police officers to be a Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol (PNP) members, then as teams, you would be enabled to work with other PNP members here in PVOBW you could create teams to cover your street on planned days and hours and know how to control your streets.

Instead of requesting crosswalk guards to do your work for you.

Preemptive planning

For example, 30th St between Northern and Onyx at 31 Pl, gets all of the cut-through traffic from the business' on Northern Rd. This includes their employees going to work, to lunch and back, and then to home in the latter part of the day. I have a plan that would include the above mentioned PNP members to directly control this situation proactively and the same could be done for Mercury Mine School and other similar problems.

As an "attention getter" we will use the RADAR gun and a camera to photograph this illegal activity (illegal, because Northern is the collector street, and 30th St is not to be used as a cut-through street). Standing by the freeway wall at the south end of 30 St, from about 11:30am to 1:30pm, we will photograph and annotate every car coming from the businesses and turning onto 30th St. We will also do the same for all traffic driving south on 30 St and then turning into the businesses. We have SW radios to communicate so by posting folks at different locations, we can "see around corners".

In addition. Northern is a two-way street.

but many who drive it think it is a two-lane one-way frontage road. The speed limit is set at 30, but traffic is too often 40-50.

We will then create a letter signed by all of us PNP members, to be hand delivered by us, and officially announcing that our neighborhood would appreciate their cooperation in rerouting their employees and clients, FED-EX, UPS and other deliveries around Northern, and not down 30th St.

We will watch the effect, then if necessary do the RADAR / Photo routine, but with some of us PNP members standing on 30th St with signs stating, "NOT A CUT-THROUGH STREET", 25 MPH, "WE HAVE YOUR PLATE NUMBER"

The same could be done on Cinnabar as it relates to the traffic and the school.

A similar routine, as applicable would work on any street.

Working together is win-win, and the process and rewards are enjoyable!

We can solve this and other local problems, but we will need help from all of us. Together we are strong, alone we are weak. To start, I will be contacting, educating, and getting the following alliance to assist in our quests: Councilman Bill Gates, Neighborhood Services (Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department (NSD), Phoenix Streets Dept, Phoenix PD, Az Dept of Transportation.

Reply messages to and from the PVOBW Email:

Jerry; A couple of words about the speed bumps on Cheryl. I live on Cheryl and consider them a blessing. I've never noticed any noise but guess that's more to do with living in a block house than lack of noise. What I have noticed is that the bumps make 99% of cars slow down so that I can back out of my driveway safely. I encourage my neighbors to consider them strongly as safety features for driving, walking, children playing, pets crossing the street etc. Again, I've never noticed any noise but even if there were a bit more engine acceleration noise, it is far outweighed by the positive effects of making drivers slow down.

Personal Safety

Slightly rewritten with main theme and ideas from Community Action Officer (CAO) Karen Freund, Cactus Park Precinct #900. – Jerry Cline

A key component of personal safety is to be aware of your surroundings. Keep your head up with your eyes scanning for anything out of the ordinary. Is someone approaching you? Is someone standing near your car as you walk towards it? Does something Just not feel night? Listen to your inner voice and be alert to better understand what may different than normal.

When out walking, walk facing oncoming traffic. Not only can you see the vehicles approaching you, but it enables you to be more aware of the actions of the occupants. Look at people walking near you. If you make eye contact, they assume you will be able to identify them and may not bother you. Cross the street if you're not comfortable, but avoid areas with thick vegetation, or any location where someone could be hiding to gain an advantage.

Ladies:

- Don't carry large purses.
- Carry only what you need.
- Keep it close to your body or out of sight.

Ladies and Men:

If someone demands your wallet, don't just hand it to them. Throw it! And THROW IT HARD! And in the opposite direction, giving you time to run from the situation

Parking lots and areas where you may feel exposed

- Park in a well lighted area and have your keys ready as you approach your vehicle.
 If someone is standing near your car and you don't feel comfortable, go back in the store and have an employee walk you your car.
- Hold your keys so at least one of them protrudes between your fingers as you make a fist, while holding the keys. A quick jab or "slicing" motion with your extended arm can do damage to an attacker.
- A main deterrent Is to present yourself as an image of someone who is alert, selfconfident, and aware of their surroundings.

From the Attorney General's Office

Storm Repair Scams

From the AZ Attorney General's office re; about possible storm damage repair scams, now and in the future.

- Shop around. Ask for written estimates from at least three people.
- Request a list of references and check them before agreeing to hire anyone.
- Check with the Arizona Registrar of Contractors www.azroc.gov to make sure the contractor you are considering has a license.
- Make sure the scope of the project, the price and any other relevant terms are spelled out in a written contract.
- Never allow yourself to be hurried into making a decision. No reputable contractor will try to pressure you into hiring them.
- If residents are approached by people who appear to be repair scam artists, please report them to the Attorney General's Office by visiting the Web site at www.azag.gov and submitting an online "Consumer Complaint" or calling the Office at 602.542.5763 in Phoenix; 520.628.6504 in Tucson; or 1.800.352.8431 outside the Phoenix and Tucson metro areas.

Phoenix Now Offers Optional Paperless Billing

Phoenix water, wastewater and trash customers now have the option of receiving a monthly e-mail notifying them that their municipal services bill is available for viewing and payment online.

Customers can visit phoenix.gov and click on "Sign Up for Paperless Municipal Billing."

If a customer signs up for paperless billing, they no longer will receive a hard copy of the bill through the mail, but can view it online, then pay online or by phone using a credit or debit card, and by AutoPay (a monthly automatic withdrawal from a checking or savings account), or they can pay in person at a Water Customer Services Pay Station or Chase Bank branch.

According to Councilwoman Peggy Neely, chair of Phoenix's Transportation, Infrastructure and Sustainability Subcommittee, "Paperless billing is a great way to save time and money, as well as help the environment. It also will help keep Phoenix's water and wastewater rates among the lowest in the nation and Valley."

To sign up for paperless billing, all customers need is their account number, service address, and Personal Identification Number (PIN). Links to the city's newsletter, Notes, as well as the annual water quality report will be included in the paperless e-mail notification.

20,000+ Phoenix Students "Walk to School & Learn Safety

More than 20,000 Phoenix students, the most student participants from one city in the nation, will take part in "Walk to School" events throughout October to highlight pedestrian safety, healthy habits and clean air.

The students, along with parents, teachers and community leaders and police officers join schools around the world to celebrate International Walk to School Day Oct. 6. The month-long events in Phoenix begin before school with parents, community leaders and Phoenix police officers walking students along a designated safe route.

"Throughout the year we work with schools around the city to identify safe routes for walking and bicycling to emphasize the importance of pedestrian safety, physical activity and clean air," said Donald Cross, program coordinator, Phoenix Safe Routes to School.

The events are organized by the city's Street Transportation Department as part of the city's Safe Routes to School program.

During the Walk to School events, students are reminded to:

- Always cross at a traffic signal or marked crosswalk
- Stop before stepping out into the street and look left, right and left again before crossing
- Never step off a curb unless certain that eye contact is made with the motorist
- Always wear light-colored clothing when walking at night
- Where there are medians, use the twostep crossing process by crossing the street one half at a time.

Walk to School Day" was established in the United States in 1997 by the Partnership for Walkable America. The city of Phoenix works with more than 450 schools through the Safe Routes to Schools program, a collaborative effort involving parents, community leaders, school staff, children, Phoenix Police and Fire departments and others.

Back to School: Credit Cards on Campus

As college students across the country go back to school this fall, so do the credit card companies. Even though credit cards are currently not being marketed as aggressively as in years past, credit card companies will be setting up shop in bookstores and student unions offering food, clothes and other goodies in exchange for a credit card application. In just a few minutes, a student can get a free lunch and, in some cases, cause lasting damage to his or her credit report. Once a student gets a credit card, contract terms can quickly change and just one late payment can cause interest rates to be doubled.

Q: How can I protect myself?

A: Resist the temptations from credit card marketers and follow these five tips for a secure financial future.

Don't fall for the free pizza.

- Just because a credit card is marketed on campus, doesn't mean that it is the right card for you. If you need a credit card, shop around for the best rates.
- Don't apply for every card. Remember that every time you fill out a credit application someone is pulling your credit report and too many credit checks can actually lower your credit score.
- Beware of promotional rates. Many cards start out with low rates but eventually move up to high rates. Read the fine print and make sure you know when the higher rate begins.
- If you receive a phone call or email asking you to apply for a card or provide your credit card information, confirm that the solicitation is from a reputable company. Often, scam artists try to gain your trust by claiming to be from a well-known organization.
- After you are solicited, call the organization yourself with the number listed on the company's website, in the phone

- book or on your credit card statement to confirm before giving out any financial information.
- If you do decide to get a credit card, do not charge more than you can afford to pay back in full each month. Over time, interest rates and fees add up and not paying back the balance on your card can negatively affect your credit report.

Q: Doesn't the Credit CARD Act of 2009 (Credit Card Holder Bill of Rights) put limitations on credit card companies?

A: Yes, the Credit CARD Act of 2009

— better known as the credit card bill of rights — protects college students by placing restrictions on contract terms, interest rates, fees and even how credit card companies market to students. However, these restrictions do not take effect until February 2010, so students need to be careful when starting school this fall.

Some of the most important consumer protections provided by the act are:

- Credit card companies will be severely restricted on when they can raise your interest rate due to a late payment.
- Universities will be required to disclose marketing agreements with credit card companies.
- Credit card companies will be prohibited from offering free merchandise to students in exchange for signing up for a credit card when the offer is made on or near campus or at a college event.
- Anyone under 21 years old will need a parent, guardian or spouse over the age of 21 to co-sign their credit card application.
- Credit card companies will be required to clearly spell out contract terms and post

 - manner did they leave? vehicle or foot.
- WHO
- did it? Suspect description.
- WHERE
 - did the suspect go? Direction.
- WHAT
 - did the suspect obtain? Type & quantity.
- WHC
- is calling? Name, location, phone #.
- The Operator will ask the caller to remain on the phone until Officers arrive on Priority 1 calls only.

Common Entry Methods Used To Break Into Homes

- Door kicks: A burglar can be in, and out of your home in two minutes.
- Window entries: A burglar can make a complete sweep of your home and personal property within five minutes.
- Arcadia doors: A burglar can easily lift an arcadia door from its track or break it quickly with a swift hit from an object
- Attached sheds or available ladders may give burglars easy access to the attic.
 Once in the attic, they kick through the ceiling to gain entry.

- Garage doors: Open garages give burglars a visual inventory of your valuables.
- Keep all windows and doors locked.
- Never leave bicycles, tools, or other items unsecured or visible in yards and driveways.
- Always lock parked vehicles.
- Never leave keys in vehicles.
- Never leave your vehicles running unattended even for a few minutes.
- Never leave cellular phones or other valuables in vehicles.
- Never leave personal items visible in vehicles.
- Instruct your children to never open the door to a stranger.

Tips: Help Keep Neighborhood Home Values Up

It's true that in Arizona home property values have generally gone down over the last two years. Still there are ways to help protect your own neighborhood property values and to see a bigger increase when the market does turn around.

I have been selling real estate for over sixteen years. Often times when I drive through a neighborhood and there is a sprinkle of homes that do not have well kept exteriors I wonder if the owners are aware that they are more than likely hurting their own property values and the neighborhood property values.

Even if you do not plan on selling your home anytime soon or ever, I'm sure it's still important to you to preserve your neighborhood and your own property value. Here are some tips that might help:

- Have your lawn clean cut, cleaned free of weeds, dead vegetation and trash.
- Have rocks blown clean.
- Sweep driveways and sidewalks of debris, remove oil stains and marks.
- Have exterior of home clean and appealing including, paint, window coverings, gutters and garage door(s).
- Plant attractive flowers or plants to give our home a lush look.
- Remove holiday lights and decorations once the holiday has past.
- Store all utility vehicles, nonworking vehicles, campers, box trucks and trailers behind gates or in designated parking areas. For questions about vehicles parked on the property call the City of

 If you live next door to a vacant home try to help keep debris and weeds free from that yard. You could also call the City of Phoenix Neighborhood Services with concerns and questions. Vacant homes are often vandalized. Keeping homes looking well kept and lived in is important.

It is nice and it's convenient that we live in a neighborhood without a home owners association. Still it is wise for all of our property values for us to work together and keep our neighborhood beautiful and welcoming, so that buyers are attracted to buy other homes in the area quickly which helps keep our property values up. A good idea is to always keep in mind where you would like to live if you were purchasing a home.

The second person could have the 'clipboard' and write down license numbers. I think that maybe just the site of people in those jackets armed with signs and clipboards, would be a deterrent in and of itself and would require less people and less 'education' to get the job done.

Just a thought. Wish I could volunteer if it's adopted, but I am out dropping kids off at school at the times I would be needed. Wish I could clone myself sometimes!

I would like to see speed bumps on 30th St and also on Turquoise. I also think they should be 2 inches higher and a foot wider than the ones on Cheryl. Maybe if some of

these speeders got the bottom ripped out of their cars, then maybe they might slow down. As it is now, many do not slow down on Cheryl. They just hit them (the speed bumps) hard and fly right over. I sympathize with the folks on Cinnabar, but I think we have an even bigger problem on 30th St, Turquoise, and on Cheryl between 30th St and 28th St 24 hours a day. And don't forget about Northern. We need more PNP volunteers. Because of work schedules and personal situations, 5 of us PNPérs cannot patrol our neighborhood as needed. We need double or triple that to be really effective. The problem is really on every street in our neighborhood. Maybe we could get crossing guards or some volunteers to put up barricades on side streets like Cinnabar at the beginning and end of their shifts. (Just a thought) Along with signs saying no school traffic and no neighborhood traffic during certain hours. (Another thought)

This can be a subject of discussion at the next BW meeting.

Also what is the deal with that large commercial box truck that is parked on Onyx usually most of the day during the daytime, and usually parked on the south side of the street in the wrong direction. Is this truck legal. This is almost as bad as the guy who wanted to start an RV business on 28th St, only a little less visual. None the less, I'll bet the neighbors aren't to happy about it.

This is me, Jerry Cline speaking: I am not in favor of speed bumps and for the record neither are police officers in general. It takes longer for them to respond because they are naturally slowed, where the bad guy does not care so much about launching over the "catapults" as they attempt to get away. Phoenix Fire will tell you that when they respond to an emergency in an area "plagued" by speed bumps, the response time will proportionately be lengthened relative to the type and quantity of speed bumps encountered en route. A few seconds in cardiac arrest or your home on fire can make a difference.

There are other measures we can consider and as noted, getting involved up close personally and preemptively, is not only effective, but personally rewarding, is much faster than the studies and the installation, and surveys that will be needed for the consideration of change in the neighborhood, and the cost of the project.

For Northern Road as an example:

 I would like to have Phx Streets, paint double yellow lines from Onyx to as far as they will, and can legally do so. • Paint white "bicycle path" type painted lines on both sides of Northern. The illusion makes the road seem narrow, effectively slowing traffic, and with the double yellow lines, at least to 30th St, should effectively "neck down" the traffic.

For 30th St, restrictive signs for cutthrough traffic, maybe the bike lane effect and preemptive action working with the businesses on Northern. Maybe even double yellow lines there to, it is a curvy street.

For Cinnabar, see what I proposed. And I absolutely want to be a part of any interaction with neighbors and Mercury Mine management. I've wanted to connect with our local schools personally, and this is an excellent opportunity. I would like to get our Community Action Officer (CAO) or School Resource Officer (SRO) to be part of the group and have a formal conference of all who have interest in the project.

This is exciting! Please keep me in the loop with any exchanges or ideas, and let's discuss this further Thursday at evening our meeting! I am well connected with our official resources, and I look forward to all of us working together on this as a project as we create fresh new look and effectiveness in our neighborhood communications.

Jerry, did you get any response from the original member re any interest in the PNP program?

On a different tack I wonder what could be done to work with Mercury Mine. Maybe they could send home a flyer to explain the neighborhood concerns about safety issues in our neighborhood. We have the same issues with the Montessori school, although that's more about reckless driving than speed. Jackie

New (to you) Clothes and Bedbugs

The bed bug epidemic ... from an entomologist's view.

NOTE: Don't let this article bug you! But do follow the basic ideas of hygiene. The following was checked for its "urban legend" qualities, read it here:

The info is rated as mixed facts and assumptions. The basic premise is sound.

Similar articles have been on NPR and National TV. Whatever and however, its reality, just read it and be aware. I think we've all heard and read, that bedbugs are immune to the use of pesticides and that they are useless and harmful to you. More children, adults and pets have been harmed than have bedbugs by using the pesticides, especially when using multiple control chemicals in combination. Be careful and considerate of what you do to yourself, family and pets!

Also fact: A temperature of minimum of 113°F is the only known reliable control for this pest. If washing the item is used to rid the pests, the water must be at or above that temperature. The part about the temperature when using the drier is fact.

The bed bug epidemic from an entomologist point of view.

Since much of our clothing, sheets, towels, etc. now comes from companies outside of America, (sad but true), even the most expensive stores sell foreign clothing from China, Indonesia, etc. The bed bugs could be coming in on the clothing as these countries do not consider bedbugs a problem. His recommendation is, that if you buy any new clothing, even underwear, socks, sheets, towels, etc. that you bring them into the house and put them in your clothes dryer for at least 20 minutes.

NOTE:

One other detail is important to the process. The heat (must be a minimum 113°F) to kill the bugs and their eggs. After the drier has been active for about five minutes, open the drier door, place a thermometer inside and observe the temperature. If it is 115°F or higher it is doing what needs to be done. Remove the thermometer and let the drier run another 15 minutes or so.

Do not purchase clothes and hang them in the closet first

Not only clothing, but shoes, purses or any item from an unknown source ... Beware!

Beware of clothing from second hand type stores, garage sales, friends, etc, if the item is new to you, take necessary precautions.

The price range is of the clothing does not matter what, or even if the items come from the most expensive store known, the shipments from foreign countries.

All that is needed is to bring one contaminated item that has bugs or eggs into the house.

AS of now, entomologists state, "bedbugs feed only on humans, are harmless, do not carry, vector or spread disease, but are termed as an extreme nuisance."
