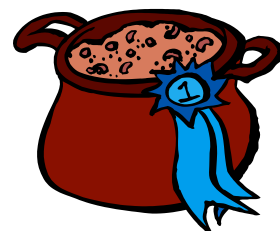

NEIGHBORHOOD ICE CREAM SOCIAL



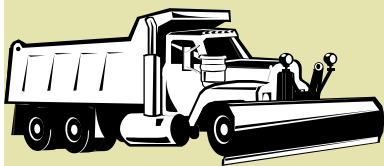

CHANGES IN WESTWOOD'S SNOW REMOVAL

Neighbors requested that Westwood sign up for the City's Snow Priority program. The City will use its larger wing plows that reduce the number of passes they have to make, and therefore we will have less snow buildup and narrow lanes. Plowing will also start much sooner--- after only one inch of snow on the ground. Currently, the regular plows are not out until there is four inches of snow. 'Priority Snow Street--No Parking' will be posted on all the streets in Westwood's boundaries. Cars not moved from the street will receive a \$35 ticket. Being on the Snow Priority Program should make our streets easier to travel on!

LUIS, KATIE, AND LUCCA GO BATTY FOR HALLOWEEN

The horrendous number of mosquitoes in Westwood Neighborhood Association this summer has led the Leon family on 51st St. to install a bat house. The small bat house, mounted on an unused utility pole, has room for up to 30 bats as they like to pack themselves in tight. Bats, meanwhile, are reported to eat anywhere from 300 to 1000 insects a night. So if all goes well, in a few years when the bat house is full the Leon's actions could mean 9,000 to 30,000 mosquitoes that are being fed on in their backyard—rather than feeding on us each night.

Bat houses can be hung anytime, and should be left in place year-round. They should be hung roughly 12 to 20 feet above the ground, sheltered as much as possible from the wind and where the approach is unobstructed by vegetation or utility wires. A bat house can be placed on a tree or pole, although those attached to the side of a building have had the most success because they provide added temperature stability. If a bat house is not occupied by the end of the second year, you might change its location. In Iowa, its best to mount bat houses facing south and in the sun as they need the sun's warmth all day. Painting the house black is also reported to help in our climate.



MORE FACTS ABOUT BATS:

- Bats are incredible creatures and hold the distinction of being the world's only flying mammal. Bats occur worldwide and make up a quarter of all mammal species on the planet. Of the approximately 850 species of bats only 39 occur in the United States
- Bats are an essential link in the balance of nature but are on the decline throughout the United States. Loss of habitat due to the disturbance of natural and man-made roosting sites in buildings, old trees, and caves is a major factor in this decline. Another factor is active and persistent persecution by people not aware of the bat's gentle nature and beneficial activities.
- Bats are actually clean animals that groom themselves daily. You are more likely to contract rabies from an unvaccinated dog or cat or contract food poisoning at a church picnic than get sick from bats.
- The 3 species of vampire bats live only in Central and South America. Scientist are currently studying the saliva of these bats in the hope of developing new anticoagulant drugs to prevent blood clots in heart patients.
- Bats have been unjustly persecuted by misinformed people who have been solely educated by exaggerated stories, media hype and horror movies. As a result of our ignorance bat roosting sites have been intentionally destroyed resulting in the death of millions of bats

Homeowners who are interested in preserving and attracting bats can help by preserving uncut wood lots and snags, especially in locations next to water, and putting up bat houses, as all serve as important bat habitats.
