

Think Spring On a nice warm sunny day after the snow has melted would be a good time to go out and take a look at your landscape from across the street. Take note of what is overgrown and needs trimmed back for security purposes, bushes that block the windows or behind which a criminal could hide to gain access to your home. This would be a good time to trim down perennial plants that didn't get trimmed in the fall and pick up the plant litter around the plants. You want to do this before it gets warm enough for bugs to hatch as they hide for the winter under this debris.

Fat Free Sewers Fats, oils and greases aren't just bad for your waist-line and your health; they're bad for sewers too. Just as fat can clog your arteries, it can clog your sewer tap and the public sewer lines making sewer overflows and backups more likely. Fort Wayne City Utilities spends an estimated \$400,000 per year to clean grease out of sewer lines and to prevent it from building up.

Grease is a by-product of cooking that comes from meat fats, lard, oil, shortening, food scraps, even baked goods. When these materials are washed down the sink, the grease sticks on the sides of the sewer pipes – both on private property and in the public sewer system. Over time, grease can build up to the point where it blocks the entire line. Home garbage disposals do not keep grease out of the plumbing system. Products such as detergents that claim to dissolve grease may just

Where Does My Drinking Water Come From?

If you are a water customer of Fort Wayne City Utilities, the St. Joseph River is the source of your drinking water. Water flows into the St. Joseph River from a watershed area that covers more than 694,000 acres in northeast Indiana, northwest Ohio and a small portion of south central Michigan. The river is fed by springs, creeks and runoff from rain and snowmelt.

Each day Fort Wayne draws an average of 34 million gallons of water from the river. The water is treated and filtered at the Three Rivers Water Filtration Plant in downtown Fort Wayne before it is distributed to the 75,000 customers of the City's water utility.

Fort Wayne operates two dams on the St. Joseph River. The Cedarville Dam is located near Leo-Cedarville and impounds water in the Cedarville Reservoir. The reservoir is a popular location for water recreation and fishing. The St. Joseph Dam near the intersection of Anthony and Coliseum Boulevards on the north side of Fort Wayne also lets the City impound water behind it, helping to ensure that Fort Wayne has an adequate supply of water, even during the driest part of the

Water Leak Detection

<u>Toilets:</u> The toilet is the most common water waster, but a leaking toilet may be less noticeable than a dripping faucet. Still a leaking toilet could cost you up to \$500 dollars on a single water bill. There are several ways to determine if a toilet is leaking:

Look at the toilet bowl after the tank has stopped filling. If you see water continuing to run into the bowl or if you still hear water running, you probably have a leak. You may have a leak even if you don't see or hear water running. A way to check for a silent leak is to put a few drops of food coloring into the toilet tank. Do not flush, but wait about 10 minutes. If you see the color in the toilet bowl, you have a leak. The leak is probably around the plunger ball or flapper valve at the bottom of the tank. Check to see that the ball valve drops squarely into the drain opening. If it does not clean it out or





Think Spring -

Once the snow has melted, you can get a head start on planting your spring vegetable garden under cloches made from taking clear two-liter soda or 48 oz juice bottles and cutting the bottoms off. Place the seed on top of the soil and cover with soilless seed starter mix according to package directions. Cover with the cloche and once it begins to warm up and the plant has sprouted, you can remove the bottle lid during the day and replace it before nightfall. By starting the seeds in these mini cold -frames, you can get the plants started to grow into their place in the garden and can reduce the stress and delay from transplanting starts later.

Once the soil temperature is above 60 degrees and is dry enough that when you pick up a handful and squeeze it crumbles then you can plant your summer flowering bulbs. The easy way to determine if the soil is warm enough for summer plants would be to sit down. If the soil makes your bottom cold, it will be too cold for the plants. 

pass it down the line and cause problems elsewhere. And while hot water may appear to make grease go away, it just melts the solids which can harden again when they hit a cold sewer pipe.

How can homeowners help reduce the chances of backups caused by oil and grease buildup in sewers;

- Never pour grease down the drain, into the toilet or into a storm drain.
- For a large amount of oil, pour the cooled liquid into a milk jug. Fill the jug about half full, then add kitty litter to absorb the liquid. Put the lid on the jug and place it in the trash.
- Scrape grease and food scraps into the trash and wipe greasy dishes and pans with paper towels before washing them. Dispose of the paper toweling in the trash.
- Place baskets or strainers in sink drains to catch food scraps and other solids then empty the strainers into the trash.

Family Jewels are costly but you do not have to spend an arm and a leg for cleaning. Commercial cleaning product can run from five to fifty bucks and they all performed about the same. Soak plain gold jewelry and pieces with diamonds, rubies, sapphires, emeralds, amethyst, or amber in mild dish washing liquid in warm water. Be sure to use a bowl and not in your sink. (Northside Plumbing is an expert for retrieving jewelry) Use a soft toothbrush to remove dirt and dry item off with a dry cloth or a chamois cloth.

Remember to buff pearls, opals, or turquoise with a soft, dry chamois. NEVER use water on them as it could damage the stone. Apply makeup, perfume and hair spray before putting on pearls as they can change color over time.

Clean Silver with silver polish or a little non-gel toothpaste. Apply it gently with damp sponge, rinse and then buff with a soft cloth. (Source: Consumer's Report, Feb. 2011)
