

The dark days of winter

As our days get darker there are a lot of things we forget about and often overlook the changes we can make that will make our lives easier and safer.

Starting with our autos, slow down during the dark and dim times and in the rain turn your car lights on. Safer neighborhoods are the ones that are better lit. Turn your porch lights on earlier or put them on a timer and or consider a motion light. Watch for people walking and bikes. Too often the walkers and bikers will have dark clothing and without any kind of lights or reflective clothing.

Do not leave your garage door open and do not leave your garage door opener visible in your parked car. In a car prowl it is easy to get your name and address and if the garage door opener is taken the thief now has an entry into your home. Even if the home is locked, if a person has a way to get into your garage they can usually get into the home thru the crawl space. If you live in a duplex or connected town house they can easily get into other units.

Let me also remind you to not leave any packages visible in your car while shopping. Keep packages out of sight or at least cover them up with something.

This is just a little reminder to do some things a little different during the dark days and especially during the holiday season.

The Historic Padden Home will house Vancouver Washington's only culinary school for children.

One of Vancouver's oldest houses will be home to a brand new business, with a very young clientele.



The Kids Cooking Corner opens its doors on December 1, 2010. With Home Economics no longer offered in public schools, The Kids Cooking Corner will offer a valuable service to busy local parents. The school will teach kids of practically all ages how to be safe, comfortable and creative in the kitchen.

Heidi O'Connor is the entrepreneur whom is bringing The Kids Cooking Corner to life. A local mother of three, Heidi was inspired to create the school by her own children. "Young people no longer have the opportunity to learn Home Economics in school," said Heidi. "Parents these days are so busy it's tough to find the time to teach kids how to function in the kitchen. What we hope to accomplish with The Kids Cooking Corner is to let kids experience first-hand how much fun cooking can be."

Students at The Kids Cooking Corner will be instructed according to age and skill level. Parents can enroll their kids as young as three years old for the Assistant Chef Program, where they will learn the basics of safety, stirring, mixing and cleanliness, with a major focus on fun. As kids learn, the classes get more challenging, with students in the Junior and Senior Chefs programs preparing and serving full meals to their families.

The Kids Cooking Corner will also offer regular sessions for autistic and other special needs children.

The Padden Home, located at 5206 NE 78th Street, was built in 1902 by the Padden Family. At one time, the Padden Dairy was Vancouver's largest dairy farm.

Today, numerous businesses in the Hazel Dell & Orchards areas carry the historic Padden name.

Did You Know? The average American household adds large amounts of biodegradable food scraps and yard debris in landfills each year. Over a fifth of your garbage (22.6%) is compostable. When we put biodegradable items such as food, leaves and lawn clippings in the trash they do not break down as fast as they could because they are buried away from light, air and water. Our landfills are filling up with compostables. Start your compost now to reduce landfill space, help the soil retain moisture and return nutrients into the soil. Fire Safety Message

As temperatures drop outdoors, residential fires rise as people try to stay warm in their homes. During the last cold spell, Fire District 6 crews responded to two chimney fires

In both incidents, there were no injuries and minor damage to the homes. But heating equipment, including fireplaces, is a leading cause of residential fires and fire deaths each year.

Fire District 6 recommends that you have your chimney inspected annually by a professional and cleaned as often as inspections suggest; use only wood that is properly seasoned to reduce creosote buildup. When enough creosote is present, it only takes a spark to ignite and cause a chimney fire.

Also, take the following steps:

- Install a tight-fitting fireplace screen and never leave your fire unattended.
- Keep combustibles at least 3-feet away
- Use caution when disposing of fireplace ashes. Allow them time to cool completely before placing them in a metal container.

What is a Neighborhood Association?

Every community has something that makes it special and sets it apart from any other area. A community is made up of a collection of neighborhoods and they are each unique and reflect the interests, concerns and the make up of that area. Each shares a common bond that brings them together to work on issues that impact the quality of life in their Typically Neighborhood area. Associations form around a single issue, like community safety, but can also mobilize to address other issues of concern to the people who live within their boundaries. The of the Neighborhood leaders Association are all volunteers and elected by their members. Some dedicate a lot of time to their association, while some give what time that can to work on a specific project or issue. Some Neighborhood Associations meet every month and some meet once a year, while others may meet three

or four times a year. Some publish a newsletter like this one, while others may publish only periodic flyer meeting notices.

Neighborhood Associations vary in size. In the City of Vancouver there are some that have less than 300 people living in a small geographic area while in the unincorporated Clark County there are two associations each with over 15,000 people who live in a fairly large geographic area. For NE Hazel Dell example. Neighborhood Association is 4.2 Sq. Miles and contains 17,054 people.

Most Neighborhood Associations are primarily composed of residential areas, but NE Hazel Dell, Salmon Creek and others also have large commercial districts, therefore the issues that surface will vary from the norm. Neighborhood Associations work closely with the Clark County Sheriff's Department using Community Policing to help make our community safer.

Neighborhood association leadership has a wealth of knowledge and experience working on a variety of community issues. They try to keep informed and knowledgeable about important happenings which includes residential development, commercial development, Traffic, road conditions, schools, parks, public issues, senior issues, youth activities, litter pick up, sewer district issues, Fire Department and Paramedics support, safety issues, environmental and ecological design issues, clean water. codes standards, and code Neighborhood enforcement. Associations reach out to build partnerships with local business, local government, non-profit groups, clubs and other organizations and individuals to achieve objectives that can't be done by any one group.

Neighborhood Associations work closely with local government, city and county, on a variety of issues impacting the livability and quality of life of our community. They serve as a direct information source and are available to help neighbors in need when they don't know where to turn for assistance.

To be a member of a Neighborhood Association you must live, work or own property within the boundaries. Meetings are public and open to anyone. They never turn down volunteers to help on projects, even if they are from the other side of the river.

Neighborhood Associations are non profit organizations, have bylaws and are recognized by local They depend on government. donations and fund raising projects to pay for the costs to operate the organization. Most of the operating costs are for postage (mail newsletters), office supplies and miscellaneous expenses. Those that serve their neighborhood associations get a lot of personal satisfaction from helping people in their community and seeing the fruits of their labor through projects make a community difference in their community that will last for generations to come (for example the Metro Park District).

There is a large need for community volunteers. There are many ways to help your community and everyone has something to offer. Your Neighborhood Association is a good place to start no matter where you live.
