# First Annual Wrigley River Run Clean Up

The Wrigley Association partnered with 17 organizations from across our city including the Roosevelt Neighborhood Association, Wrigley Is Going Green, Long Beach Neighborhood Foundation, Better Balance Long Beach, Neighborhood Advisory Group, Neighborhood Restoration Subcommittee of the LBDHHS Weed and Seed, Long Beach Litter Free Program of the Environmental Services Bureau, and the Long

Beach Rescue Mission to organize a neighborhood clean up in preparation for the Wrigley



River Run 5/10K taking place the following Saturday, June 11, 2011. In addition to cleaning the streets and alleys, residents were allowed to throw away large items and tires, and recycle their ewaste. Our goal was to help create the most beautiful neighborhood possible for the visitors and runners of the Wrigley River Run and Tadpole Trot.

The clean up was anchored at the corner of Pacific Avenue and 25<sup>th</sup> Street and covered areas of the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> Council Districts, from Long Beach Boulevard to Deforest Avenue and Willow Street to Hill Street. Volunteers cleaned up the streets of Pacific Avenue, Willow Street, Burnett Street and all interior alleys on the north and south of side of Burnett Street. In addition, the Long Beach Litter Free crew drove a van with community service volunteers, a flat bed truck and a refuse truck through the target area picking up large items, tires, and televisions. We also used a Neighborhood Services Bureau truck to pick up large items from the alleys of Long Beach Boulevard to Pacific Avenue and Willow Street to Hill Street. In

More than forty volunteers were involved in addition to city workers. Twenty business owners on Willow St signed a pledge to



maintain the streets appearance for the week before the race. Fourteen tons of trash and discarded furniture was removed.

# Hesch and Wu Double up at Wrigley River Run & Tadpole Trot

So. Cal's Elite Runners Join

## More Than 1,200 Running Long Beach's Premier 5/10k event



Reigning champion Eli Rodriguez was edged out in both the 10k and 5k coming in second to Christian Hesch both times as Hesch continued his dominance of the southern California racing scene this year, by winning both races at Long Beach's premier 5/10k event, the fourth annual Wrigley River Run and Tadpole Trot, presented by Buono's and the Naza Family. Hesch out kicked the field with blazing times of 15:49 in the 5k and 31:55 in the 10k, both course records. Rodriguez finished just a stride or two back each time.

In the women's division, Cambria Wu raced to victory, winning by a comfortable margin in both the 5K (18:38) and 10K (37:42). Road Runner Sports donated

shoes to the male and female winners of the events, so Hesch and Wu both went home with two pairs of shoes each for

their efforts.

The kids in the Tadpole Trot were the highlight of the event for most. Every one of the more than 200 under-ten Tadpole Trot competitors—from the winner, Amber (who you can be see running the race in this great video <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=bFWtZZbeM2A">www.youtube.com/watch?v=bFWtZZbeM2A</a>) to those at the back of the pack who held hands with their parents the entire way up and down Pacific Avenue—received medals and enjoyed pre- and post-race fun in the bounce houses as well as face painting provided by Oakwood Academy.

The event's organizing entity, the Long Beach Neighborhood Foundation (LBNF), reports that more than more than 1200 runners and walkers partici-

pated in the events: the 5 and 10k's and the Tadpole Trot kids run and were supported by hundreds of volunteers. The event generated more than \$37,000 (gross) in donations and registrations from the community. Net proceeds from the event will be used to support programs that benefit at-risk youth in Long Beach and college scholarships to local high school students.

In addition to Buono's (the official Pizza of the Wrigley River Run) and the Naza Family, many local businesses supported the race through monetary and product donations including AECOM, AA Graphics, DBL Logistics and CCEJ Building Healthy Communities.



There was plenty of music with *Zero Period* playing at the finish line and the Cabrillo HS Jazz Band and *Stan DeWitt* keeping the runners moving on the course. LBNF President Gavin Mc Kiernan said, "As this event grows we are proud that top runners as well as casual athletes flock to our event but more than that we are happy to have been able to put on an event that involved so many diverse parts of our community. Several area schools participated in a significant way and many businesses responded affirmatively to our call for support for a family-friendly community event, showing that



communities can and will come together outside of Downtown and Belmont Shore, where the overwhelming majority of events as well as media coverage in Long Beach currently take place."

The 5k and 10K race courses went from Holy Innocents Parish on Pacific Avenue to Burnett Street, west to the LA River Trail, and back to Holy Innocents. Performers from the Stearns Musical Theater Group saw the runners off with the national anthem prior to the 10k after the Cabrillo JROTC presented the colors. 7<sup>th</sup> district councilman James Johnson welcomed the runners in the 5k after Theresa from 24 Hour Fitness warmed them up. The participants enjoyed post-race food and drink donated by Buono's, Clif Bar, El Paisano Supermarket, Honest Tea, Gonzalez' Northgate Market and The Bagelry.

Mc Kiernan recognized "our superb volunteer board of directors from all parts of Long Beach that are dedicated to putting on quality community building events in areas of the city where they traditionally have not had them. We also appreciate all the help we received from various city departments and groups, the West Division of the LBPD, LB department of Special Events, and of course the support and guidance of our Advisory Board, including Former Councilwoman Tonia Reyes-Uranga, Long Beach First Lady Nancy Foster, Long Beach Rescue Mission CEO Jim Lewis, Bixby Knolls BIA Executive Director Blair Cohn, CPAC Chair Annie Greenfeld-Wisner, Former Assemblywoman Betty Karnette, Long Beach Little Ones Founder Laura Gallagher, and LB Historical Society President Evan Braude,.

### WALKING LOOPS: Discovering Community

"All walking is discovery. On foot we take the time to see things whole" - Hal Borland

#### THE BACKGROUND

Walking is the most fundamental mode of transportation, and walkability is an important aspect of healthy communities. Walking Loops are a relatively simple addition to the built environment that can have a lasting impact and affect permanent change in neighborhoods. The impact is the creation of community and culture; community thrives in the interactions and observations of delity life. As Long Beach is the site of Pro Bike Pro Walk 2012, the City would benefit greatly from a well developed set of walking opportunities throughout its many neighborhoods.

### THE VISION

CITY FABRICK, a nonprofit community design studio and urban planning organization, will work to facilitate this effort.

Walking loops are not only an amenity to the built environment, but also:

- Bulld community by helping neighbors, businesses and institutions to interact.
- Promote exercise and related opportunities to encourage healthy living.
- Provide potential business for local commerce near and along the route.
- Foster the education of local history, assets, landmarks or issues within the local area.
- Create a method for showcasing neighborhood assets and treasures.
- Identify and address pressing safety and enhancement issues.
- Invigorate areas of the city that suffer from blight or lack of use.
- Provide resources for employers and visitors.
- Assist in the development of a more livable and vibrant Long Beach.

### THE PROCESS

WHAT:

The production of a series of five to six Walking Loops in Long Beach, utilizing signage and graphic markers to delineate the route, as well as a template/toolkit for the production of future walking loops. Some loops may have a specific goal beyond walking and community involvement, including:

- Education on the history of local neighborhood, portrayed in signage and markers along the route
- Showcasing local art or architecture that creates a sense of place in the community
- Enlivening commercial districts and encouraging local residents to "buy local"

WHO:

The WALK LONG BEACH committee and City Fabrick will work together to coordinate and produce the first set of Walking Loops and the toolkit.

WHEN:

The work will commence in June 2011, and be completed in approximately six months.

WHERE:

Walking Loops will be developed in various locations across the communities of Long Beach.

HOW:

Tasks include:


- Determination of the actual loop routes in coordination with volunteers and City staff
- Development of graphics and wayfinding markers in conjunction with the City of Long Beach
- Coordination of actual street markings
- Production of promotional tools for encouraging the use of the Walking Loops
- Production of a procedure or toolkit for future community use.

### THE DELIVERABLES

- A documented initial walking loop.
- A framework for a toolkit/template for community groups to utilize in the future.
- A set of images, and video for use in promotion of Walking Loops.
- Suggestions for graphic signage and wayfinding along the route.
