Neighbors, Agents Team Up to Boost Home Values

In the metro Atlanta area, home values have dropped by about one-third in five years. To prevent values from dropping any further, home owners are teaming up to hold neighborhood clean-ups and working with real estate professionals to promote open houses.

For example, neighbors are organizing monthly neighborhood cleanups that include mowing lawns, hauling away trash, and painting exteriors of homes that have been abandoned and foreclosed upon in their neighborhood. Following the cleanups, real estate professionals will host open houses for the homes as neighbors work to help publicize the open houses by handing out fliers and talking with friends.

"Quite frankly, [the home owners] are doing it often out of necessity," Dan Forsman, the CEO of Prudential Georgia Realty, told The Atlanta Journal-Constitution. "They have an investment in their community. They have some pride and want to see their community soar."

Some developers are also working with neighborhoods to help stabilize home values. For example, a developer for a Dunwoody condo community bulldozed unfinished foundations and turned the empty properties into a neighborhood park with trees, gardens, and a grilling area. Don Wrenn, a home owner in the development, told The Atlanta Journal-Constitution that now potential buyers no longer see a half-finished neighborhood stalled but with the addition of the park area, they see a neighborhood that is finished.

90 GALLON TRASH CONTAINER INFORMATION

These instructions are for the City-provided 90-gallon containers. Yard waste cannot be thrown away with regular trash. Please schedule a special collection for bulky items like furniture and appliances. NO BULK ITEMS WILL BE COLLECT-ED UNLESS THE RESIDENT SCHEDULES COLLECTION ONLINE OR CALLS 645-3111.

- Put your container at your designated collection point before 6 am.
- Remove container from the collection point no more than 24 hours after collection and keep it in a safe place.

<u>Please Take Note:</u> Our Deed Restrictions state that garbage must be stored and maintained in containers entirely within the garage or within an enclosed area attached to the dwelling which effectively shields it from view and the container must be covered with lids and may only be put at the collection point during the times stated above.

Reduce Odor: Put only normal household trash in the container. Tightly bag your trash before placing it in your container. This will help to reduce bacteria build up and odor caused by spilled garbage. Do not put trash around the outside of the container. Only trash inside the container can be collected.



Remember: When cleaning out your garage or shed, please keep in mind that the following items are not apart of your normal waste collection pick up and should not be placed in your container: paint, paint thinners, oil, oil filters, oil rags and insecticides.

For repair of 90-gallon containers, follow these instructions:

- If your City-provided trash container is lost, stolen, vandalized or defaced, please notify the City at 645-TRSH. You may need to pay for a lost or stolen container because the City only provides one per household.
- If your container is damaged in the collection process or from normal wear and tear, it will be replaced at no cost to you.
- One container per household remains the property of the City of Columbus and is printed with the address of the home. If you move, leave the container on the property in a safe place.

YARD WASTE

Residents can contact the city's 311 Customer Service Center at 311 or 645-3111 to find out which day of the week is their yard waste collection day. You can also go online to the website below www.311.columbus.gov

The weekly yard waste pick-up service is provided to 227,000 single-family homes by Rumpke.

- This includes households that use 90 and 300gallon regular trash containers
- · Yard waste should never be mixed with regu-

Yard waste includes organic waste generated during regular household gardening and landscaping activities, including:

- · Grass clippings
- Leaves
- Twigs
- · Branches
- Shrubbery

Items that will not be collected with yard waste:

- Rocks
- Dirt
- · Plastic bags
- Food waste

To prepare yard waste for pick-up:

- · Place yard waste in biodegradable (paper) bags or rigid containers marked "Yard Waste"
- Bags are generally available for purchase at home improvement or grocery retails stores.
- · Please do not line the paper bags with plastic bags.
 - · Cut branches to less than four feet in length
- · Tie the branches into bundles with string or twine
 - · Each bundle should not be wider than two feet

There is no restriction on the number of bags a household can put out for pickup

 Each container, bag or bundle must weigh less than 50 pounds (Containers meeting this requirement will likely have a 30-35 gallon capacity).

Yard-Waste Recycling Tips:



Returning grass clippings to the yard keeps your grass healthy and saves space in the landfill. In fact, grass clippings contain valuable nutrients that can generate up to 25 percent of your lawn's total

fertilizer needs. Grass clippings do not contribute to thatch since grass clippings are 75 percent to 85 percent water and decompose readily.

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Neighborhood Liaison Program



Mayor Michael B. Coleman has made it his mission to serve neighborhoods in a more effective, efficient and responsive manner. Recognizing that each Columbus neighborhood is unique, with different attributes, Mayor Coleman created the new Neighborhood Liaison program in the Department of Development.

The Neighborhood Liaisons are a team of advocates created to work across Department lines to get results for citizen requests, problems and questions. The Liaisons are responsible for three tasks:

- Coordinating the exchange of information among citizens, neighborhood organizations and city staff
- Providing technical assistance and serving as an advocate on neighborhood issues.
- Coordinating the investment of city resources in the neighborhoods

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The city has been divided into 12 service areas and a Liaison has been assigned to each of the areas to work directly with the citizens and neighborhood organizations. Whether it's cleaning an alley, replacing a burned out street light, arranging for grass in a public right-of-way to be cut, the Neighborhood Liaisons are there to connect you with the right people to get the job done – and you need only make one phone call.

Each Neighborhood Liaison also serves a specific Area Commission and/or a Civic Association by working to assist the organization with any issue involving the better delivery of City services.

Fight Crime - Home Safety Tips

Our Homes can never be 100% safe. We can bar our doors and windows. Put security cameras at all points of entry, and hire a full time guard to watch all the cameras. But the fact is, if someone wants to enter your house they will find a way inside. What can you do? Slow them down! Every home has the means of slowing down a crook, even without the cameras.

Here's some tips:

- Lock all doors, windows and gates! If you have locks, make sure they are the right type for the doors placement. Make sure all your windows have window locks. If you have a rear gate to your backyard, make sure to put a lock on it.
- Keep your garage door closed!
- **Light up your property!** Put up motion detector lights around your doors (front & Rear). Make sure your backyard is well lit at night.
- **Neighbors** work with your neighbors to watch the streets during the day & night.
- **Keep shrubbery trimmed back.** Keep all your trees trimmed up four feet from the ground. This way no one can hid and your neighbors can keep an eye on your front door and windows.
- Alarm Signs. Put the alarm signs where everyone can see them. People walking to your front door should notice the sign without searching. If they see a sign after approaching your home, they may just walk away.
- Be a Good Neighbor. Good neighbors should look out for each other. Get to know your neighbors
 on each side of your home and the three directly across the street. They can report suspicious activity
 to the police or to you while you are away. Good neighbors can pick up your mail, newspapers, handbills, and can inspect the outside or inside of your home periodically to see that all is well. Good
 neighbors will occasionally park in your driveway to give the appearance of occupancy while you are
 on vacation.
