Also, The Rock Church (involving Alice Cooper's Foundation) taking over the near empty strip mall, the SE corner of Thunderbird and 32nd St.



Villa La PAWS Fills a Need in the Community

Murray said, "Villa La PAWS Pet Resort and Spa opened at 32nd Street and Shea in 2005, quickly taking root in the community and spreading its customer base from Queen Creek to Avondale. Soon it expanded to a second location at I-17 and Bell Road, but it was the support from the community surrounding its flagship location (32nd St & Shea) that was instrumental in showing its early success."

"What started as a pet-sitting and "limo" transportation service to and from vet visits and grooming appointments, has grown into a cage-free day-care and boarding, grooming and training facility."

"We opened the pet services company after realizing a major void in the pet care industry and his hard work and dedication paid off."

"The idea for Villa La PAWS developed from a lack of resources and a personal need for my pets" Murray said. "It soon grew into a passion and I was determined to become a resource for pet-parents, whether that included a safe place to leave their pets for the day or a week, or for grooming, as well as canine training."

"Today, the services at the resort's 32nd St flagship location include fully supervised indoor/outdoor, cage-free dog day-care, cage-free pet grooming, cage-free slumber parties for canines and felines, obedience and sports training, in-home pet sitting, and door-to-door limousine service. The

company was named AZCentral's BEST Boarding and Grooming Pet Care Facilities three years in a row, and continues its fast growing base of loyal customers throughout the community."

Comforting Care for Pets

"The Villa La PAWS cage-free dog day-care focuses on socialization, fun, safety and healthy stimulation. Before coming into day-care, each dog is evaluated to determine which play group and level of activity is the best fit for them. Trained PAWS Counselors also provide constant education and reinforce proper behavior during playtime by rewarding good behavior and gently correcting inappropriate behavior."

"The resort is designed to emulate a home environment with climate-controlled indoor playrooms and fenced outdoor play areas."

Good Citizens in Training

Murray said "Earlier this year we expanded operations and now offer dog training at our new 12,000 square-foot Canine Training Academy, which is our 32nd St and Shea location. This was a significant undertaking, but a natural extension of what we do. So far our expectations have been exceeded! Our current customers utilize the service as well as the many new faces who always appear."

"The goal of the training professionals at Villa La PAWS is to teach pet-parents and pet-handlers to communicate with their dogs, and to better understand why our dogs do what they do. Classes range from behavioral and obedience training, agility courses, service and therapy dog training, as well as a new Hollywood Dogs course. Hollywood Dogs teaches the basics of auditions, screen work and photo shoots, but also builds upon obedience, and learning to communicate with pets."

Specialized Grooming

"Villa La PAWS has a team of professional groomers that bring decades of experience in all breed specialty cuts, and even cat grooming. Groomers also provide specialized care to elderly or easily stressed pets. The same cage-free philosophy carries over to grooming where pets are able to relax in open quarters while they dry.

Grooming services include:

- A soothing bath using top-of-the-line shampoo and conditioning treatments for all types of skin issues
- State-of-the-art equipment to dry and fluff pets in record time
- Expression of anal glands

Our grooming manager Jayne Haines is one of the top [groomers] in the Valley," Murray said. "Customers tell us Jayne is the only one able to groom their pets; She has the talent, like a *pet whisperer*."

Giving Back to the Community

Being involved in the community was natural for Tom Murray. Since their inception six years ago, Villa La PAWS has supported various valley animal rescue groups whether serving as a sponsor or opening the facility as a host for their events.

Murray formed a close relationship with the nonprofit Phoenix Animal Care Coalition (PACC), and earlier this summer teamed up with them to secure supplies for those impacted by the Wallow Fire. Villa La PAWS also has a presence at nearly all of PACC's annual adoption events.

"We are [also] involved with animal rescue groups in the Valley," Murray said. "We have a presence at many of their fundraising and adoption events throughout the year. We also regularly partner with area veterinarian offices, as well as our neighbor-

Tom said, "Villa La PAWS will be relaunching its franchising program in 2012 both locally and nationally. Also, we're in discussion with the landlord at Paradise Hills Shopping Center to acquire the adjacent space next to the new Canine Academy located at 10630 N 32nd St."

This 15,000 sq ft space, formerly a janitor supply store, would house an indoor/out-door dog park surrounded by specialty pet vendors in a Farmers Market type setting. There would also be self service dog wash stations and a low cost vaccination center.

This community dog park would host a variety of parties and gatherings."

to build long lasting, effective partnerships with the Precinct's residents through its support of helping to establish and manage Block Watch groups, Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol (PNP), neighborhood and business alliances as well as its participation in other community initiatives.

They achieve their operational goals through a combined approach of communication, education and enforcement. When faced with a situation they cannot directly address they will identify and enlist those who can.

In the course of any single day the squad may find itself reviewing liquor license applications, conducting a targeted crime suppression program, performing Crime Free Multi Housing certification inspections, and making a drug awareness presentation at a local school.

Considered by most to be jacks-of-all-trades the squad's officers possess the knowledge, experience and enthusiasm to resolve the majority of the problems, be they chronic or acute, vexing the residents of the Precinct and they stand always ready to help. The importance of reporting is to let others know, so they too may share the pain of a recent crime problem they too may have had, or be concerned about.

If the police are able to cross-reference or "lace" crimes together (especially reported explosions such as gunshots or firecrackers, both against the law) are reported by many, there is a good chance they can be located. You can report anonymously). With the commonalities that are hopefully exposed, and perhaps bring to the attention of neighbors, they may be more watchful. We then have a beginning of possibly resolving these problems and bring them to an end. Our common link is that we are reading this because we care and we share.

Together we are "all one", a strength! Remove one letter from those two words and move the two words together to create one word, and we are "alone".

Report anything that is an anomaly, is different from the norm.

Call: 911 if the crime is in progress. Call: 602-26-26-151 (Crime Stop) to report a crime that has occurred. If while on either call, 911 or Crime Stop, the operator can immediately change from one level to the other, so do not worry about calling the wrong number.

This is a situation that affects you who use the Northern Ave frontage road, and

more specifically, the intersection of Northern and 30th St. The problem is the fact that the speed limit on Northern *feels like* a 40 mph street with 30 mph speed signs. We need your input on this problem so we can inform Phoenix City Streets Dept how we prefer to resolve the problems of:

- Excessive speed on Northern. We've had one death there and the problem was speed and the blind curve; Disrespect of the speed, curve and two way traffic. (Some drivers on Northern do not realize they are driving on a two way street and pass on the curve of Northern east of 30th St.)
- Use of both lanes for west-bound traffic.
- Cut-through traffic coming from the businesses between 30th St and the Mercury
 Mine Bridge, especially the traffic increase and often disrespect of the 25 mph
 limit, especially during the lunch hour.
- Visibility, or lack of when entering Northern driving south on 30th St.

They did trim the bushes, and they sent a painter to paint a white line next to the stop sign at 30th St & Northern. I cannot rationalize reason or justification for the white line; it's just silly? I was told that the best treatment for Northern would be to paint "Bike Lanes" on both sides of the Northern and double yellow lines to keep traffic from passing on the curve, but no follow up yet.

Solid Waste Schedules

Our area #8 One Week Rule

City ordinance allows only nine days prior to the scheduled collection week to place bulk trash in the alley for collection. It is a violation of city ordinance to place bulk trash out before the listed date.

Placement begins Collection begins Oct. 15 Oct. 24

Mark your calendar now!

 Planing on yard cleaning this fall? Do not place items in the alley, except as defined here:

http://phoenix.gov/citygovernment/mediacenter/ newsletters/general/notes/index.html

- Bulk trash must be placed out by 6 am on the "Collection Begins" date.
- Placement is allowed only between your area's listed dates.

Items placed in alleys between pickup dates are subject to fines beginning at \$250 per occurrence. Also, if items are in your ally and adjacent to your property, even if someone else placed the items there, the fine will be charged to you as the property owner.

The same can apply to weeds, grass and other growth along your property line and includes your half of the alley.

Recycled Garbage NOTICE!

Hard plastics only!

- Please care and do NOT contaminate the load.
- No foam plastics of any kind!
- No cups, no packing, no foam peanuts
- No plastic bags or wrapping (if a cardboard package, a bottled water container for example, is wrapped with poly film, that cardboard box will be hand-picked and tossed into landfill there is no time to separate the plastic and cardboard).

- Over-height grass/weeds, dead or dried vegetation
- Inoperable vehicles
- Junk, litter, debris
- Open and vacant buildings/structures
- Outside storage
- Fences in disrepair
- Parking on non-dust proof surfaces, parking on too much of a residential property
- Graffiti

values, the community property and the community as a whole. Commander Markley and our Community Action Officers can help us deal with those problems.

If we have time we can also discuss new special training, with shorter special classes teaching the fundamentals of Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol (PNP) taught by Phoenix Police. We can request these short classes for any group of 20 or more – I will discuss this in detail soon.

The main focus for this meeting

Our PVOBW meeting October 20th (the third Thursday) will have a group of presenters to speak to most all of the situations you want to talk about. Also see pages 7 & 9.

This meeting is important, for several reasons: We will meet and become more acquainted, we will understand each other, and each other's views. When we do that, we each gain ownership of each other, and when that happens, the communication doors are open. Your presence will establish the fact that we are able to provide an audience representing our community, the fact that allows us to continue. To grow, and to be an organization that will create a presence and a draw for future groups and speakers.

Your Pool!

I've had a pool for past 39 years and in the last couple of years I've even rebuilt a couple of them, one of them literally and figuratively from the ground up.

For the past several years I've worked with three pool stores in this general area, my favorites are:

- Today's Pool & Patio (NE corner Tatum & Cactus) - 12419 N Tatum Blvd, Phoenix, AZ 85032-7798 - (602.996.8100
- One Stop Pool Shop 13825 N 32nd St Ste 48 Phoenix, AZ, 85032 - 602.971.8868
- Paradise Motor Repair 2833 E Bell Rd, Phoenix, Az 85032 - 602.971.4655

My favorite is Today's Pool & Patio and my second favorite is One Stop Pool Shop. Both are seemingly honest and helpful.

In finding what I really needed for the pools in question, the stores that seemed most courteous and forthright were Today's Pool & Patio and One Stop Pool Shop. They've kept me out of trouble with the least fuss and bother; George at One Stop is also very good at what he does and was especially helpful during my remodeling sessions — Be patient, he's brusque, a bit of a curmudgeon, but knowledgeable, harmless and honest.

Paradise Motor Repair Moved!

I had a problem with my pool pump, went looking for Paradise Motor Repair on the east side of 32nd St, just south of Thunderbird and found they've moved to 2833 E Bell Rd, right next to the Satisfied Frog. Talk to Buddie Lonon at the front counter, he has all of the answers. They will help you with any kind of motor, even air conditioning fan motors, and will verbally walk you through the process of how to remove, replace and reconnect the electrical parts.

BTW, both Linda (see below) and Buddie are quick to say,"When you buy chlorine tablets, by Omni brand. It costs a bit more up front, but the tablets are hard-compressed, 99% chlorine (90% available) and no fillers. You could say, "it's stronger, lasts longer. Fillers can add to the phosphate content of your pool water. Oh! and... the bucket is 50lbs (about \$2/lb for a near pure product) so take that into account when you check chlorine prices. Omni is one of the only chlorine products manufactured in USA, not just packaged here. That's enough to make the difference for me.

Be Proactive – Not Reactive with your pool. Test your pool water at minimum of once a week. This helps you, especially for the summer, but remain attentive and vigi-

lant even in cool weather can make it easier for you in the long run, and save money by not chasing problems that didn't need to happen.

Wind adds organic matter to the pool, and can quickly create undesirable chemical imbalances, watch for trouble after a storm.

Preventative Maintenance:

- Check the skimmer and pump baskets daily if you can, especially when we have those pesky winds.
- From time to time, ask to have your water tested for phosphates. This is a great preventative against allowing the easy growth of algae.
- Brush the pool's flat surfaces so that debris does not settle and stay, also brush walls from time to time, and if you have steps or benches, keep them "dust" free. Also watch the shady parts of walls and the vertical parts of steps, where algae gets it's start.

Mustard, or yellow, algae is one of the most common algae we see as we go into and out of our swim season. Brushing often takes care of it, but if it gets ahead of you, treat it with an algaecide and move on.

Linda Marquez at Today's Pool & Patio is the best pool expert I've found.

She started at Paddock and trained in swim pool sales which she taught for nine years, sharing her professional knowledge by training pool pro's throughout the company. She earned her CPO (Certified Pool Operator License). She also instructed classes on the use of alternative sanitizing solutions.

She was with Paddock for 11 years and five years ago she started with Today's Pool & Patio where and is now the pool products manager, purchaser and staff trainer. She works closely with, and is extremely knowledgeable about all major pool products.

Talking about moving

If you do not yet know it, Marvel Masonry & Landscaping also moved just around the corner from 32nd St to 3113 E Bell Rd - Phoenix, AZ 85032 - 602.971.2710 just west of 32nd St on the south side of Bell to a beautiful and much larger facility. If you plan on working on any remodeling, especially masonry projects, stop in and talk to Pat. These folks are very helpful!


No "Cat Food" Here!
