

Summer Mediterranean Salad:

1 16 oz can of tomatoes, drained*
 1 can of sardines,* left whole
 1 can of artichoke hearts
 1 can of hearts of palm
 Italian dressing to taste and croutons

*for extra taste, try a cup of chopped WOW tomatoes from KCC farmers' market instead of the canned tomatoes and substitute great anchovies (available at Whole Foods against the wall near the packaged cheeses) for the sardines.

Salad dressing:

1/4 cup red wine vinegar
 2 garlic cloves, lightly crushed
 1 teaspoon fresh oregano leaves
 1 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves
 1 teaspoon fresh parsley
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
 3/4 cup extra virgin olive oil

Directions: Toss the tomatoes, sardines (or anchovies), artichoke hearts (or something else) and the hearts of palm in a medium sized bowl, add the dressing and top with croutons.

Thursday concerts at Foster Botanical Gardens. Every Thursday through July 28 from 4:30—7:15 pm. A musical variety from Celtic pipes through String Quartets. Free Admission. **And don't forget the Garden's magical Midsummer Night's Gleam, Saturday, July 16 from 4:30—9:30 pm.** The garden's alight with lanterns, offering children's activities, music, food and more.

For adults only. **Try After Dark at the Honolulu Academy of Art.** The last Friday of every month at the Art Academy, they hold an event with pupus and music and, of course, art: <http://www.artafterdark...>

Sending guests to the North Shore? They can learn to surf with **North Shore Surf Girls - Haleiwa 637-2977.** Private or group surf lessons in a safe bay protected from the large surf. The instructors are all females and all are solid instructors.

Or learn to stand-up paddle at **Stand Up Paddle Lessons - Haleiwa 372-9304.** These lessons take place in calm waters on the North Shore of Oahu -- even during the big surf season. Travel up a beautiful river lush with plants, turtles, and other wildlife. The river remains unknown to most tourists who visit the North Shore, and is thus nicknamed Haleiwa's secret "backyard".

And to throw in a little shopping that is Only in Hawaii. . . .

Honolulu's Chinatown is the newest hip area to peruse boutique shops, dine in great restaurants, and hang out to experience the active nightlife. It's becoming home to many of Oahu's artists who are setting up their art galleries here. **If you drop by Honolulu's Chinatown, let it be for no other reason than to check out the handful of lei shops and perhaps buy one that is freshly made. A true "aloha" for visitors and locals alike, the shops around Maunakea Street have some of the best leis on the island.**

In The Spotlight: A Farewell to Mark and Carolyn Arnold

Carolyn and Mark Arnold, who are for many of us among our favorite neighbors, have decided it is time for them to move closer to their families. This month, they will be moving to Denver, Colorado, where Mark has many family members as well as many friends. They will be living in a retirement home within the same family of homes as our Hawaii Kai Retirement home just one mile from here. Carolyn and Mark feel there are several advantages of living within the 300 Holiday Retirement group of Homes scattered across the United States. They will always have the comforts of home and be welcome to stay as they move across the U.S. to visit friends or family.

Mark and Carolyn met in Rochester, N.Y. in 1980 when Mark asked a friend to give him the name of a good insurance agent (who turned out to be Carolyn). Eighteen months later, they were married in July 1981. Mark was the Advertising Vice President for Gannett Co. which, at the time, was headquartered in upstate New York in Rochester. In the Fall of 1981, Gannett decided to launch a brand new newspaper and move their headquarters to New York City. Mark was selected to move to New York and be Vice President in charge of sales for the new newspaper. Gannett pulled other people from its other papers across the US. The staff was told this would be a secret until the Fall of 1982 and not to breath a word to anyone. *As you may have guessed, that year before USA TODAY actually launched was a very exciting and fun time for those few people working on the project.*

While in New York, Mark was also a drummer for The Westcott Rouge Jazz Band which played for charity fundraisers, retirement parties, weddings, and other events. In 1985, after USA Today had safely launched, Mark was asked to move to Honolulu as VP of Advertising for the Honolulu Newspaper Agency which owned both papers at that time. Mark and Carolyn say they have loved every moment of living here.

As you might recall, the Arnolds were spotlighted in an earlier edition of "The KokoHeadliner." There we told you that Carolyn had become active in the MTKKCA shortly after moving here, working over the years with the Hospitality Committee and the Newsletter Committee.

Now on July 10, they will be moving on to begin their new lives. On July 11 at their new residence, their retirement home is hosting a party for them and 28 of their family members and friends there.

A Malama Maunalua Tip for Maunalua Bay

Our yards—all of them—connect to Maunalua Bay through the storm drains and gulleys. We can act together to reduce the mud and pollutants that turn the Bay brown after every rain.

Tip #1: Water your yard efficiently— use drip systems and water only when dry to minimize run-off.

Tip #2: Ask your yard crew to keep trimmings and cuttings IN the green bins and OUT of the gulleys.

Tip #3: Use mulch and stones to keep sediment from flowing from your yard into Maunalua Bay. Our yards can use the dirt —the Bay has too much.
