




Message from the 7th District Councilman

We've had quite a bit going on in the 7th District over the past few weeks. As some of you have seen, the tree trimming in South Wrigley has begun. By the time the trimming is complete, every street tree from Pacific Coast Highway to Willow Street will have been trimmed.

Also, work on Baker Street park continues in Wrigley Heights, with the park due to open later this summer. I was happy to host a community meeting discussing the park and progress on the Oil Operator's site adjacent to the park two weeks ago.





On the legislative front, at the last Council meeting, city staff presented a report on my request to study the Governor's pension proposals. Our police officers and fire fighters have already stepped forward to create a more sustainable pension system, but we still have work to do with our remaining employee groups. When I took office I promised that pension reform would be one of my primary concerns. It's so important to me because I know that in order to provide the level of service that residents deserve, we need a pension system that is sustainable and fair to the taxpayers and to our city employees.

On March 14th, I will chair the new Joint Use Committee with the City of Long Beach and Long Beach Unified School District. This committee, which was created by the Council at my recommendation, will help us work with the LBUSD to best utilize our limited resources in these tough times in order to provide the best possible service to residents.

Banking on Community

The Long Beach Time Exchange is a <u>time</u> <u>banking</u> community, where members use an alternative currency called <u>time dollars</u> to exchange skills and services.

Time banking was developed in 1980 by law professor Edgar Cahn in response to severe cuts in government funding for social programs. With less money available to address social problems, Edgar realized that a different kind of currency might be able to fill in the gap, a kind of currency that empowers community. In time banking communities, "time dollars" are the unit of exchange. They place equal value on each of a wide variety of services offered within a community.

The concept is simple: One hour equals one time dollar, regardless of the service given, so there's really no bartering involved. From dog-walking to graphic design, community organizing to tutoring, cooking lessons to massage therapy, everyone's time is valued equally.

When someone helps you, they earn a credit that they can spend with any other member on any of the services in our network. All member exchanges, offers, requests, and transactions are organized through a web-based software system called <u>Community Weaver</u>, developed by Time Banks USA.

Wrigley Coyote Alert!

Coyote sightings are on the increase South of Hill Street next to the Los Angeles River. The other night one was standing in the middle of the intersection at San Francisco Avenue and West 21st looking intently at my 80-pound chow mix. I chased after him with a broom. He immediately ran back into the riverbed. Hazing is an effective tool for discouraging coyotes from coming into the neighborhood. **Remember: NEVER run away from a coyote!**Coyotes are skittish by nature and as a rule do not act aggressively towards aggressive people. The simplest method of hazing a coyote involves being loud and large: Stand tall, wave your arms and yell at the coyote, approaching it if necessary, until it runs away.

If a coyote has not been hazed before, he may not immediately run away when you yell at him. If this happens, you may need to walk towards the coyote and increase the intensity of your hazing. The coyote may run away, but then stop after a distance and look at you. It is important to continue to haze the coyote until he completely leaves the area.

You may need to use different tactics, such as noisemakers, stomping your feet, or spraying the coyote with a hose, to get him to leave. The more often an individual coyote is hazed, by a variety of tools and techniques and a variety of people, the more effective hazing will be for changing behavior. The coyote being hazed must be able to recognize that the potential threat is coming from a person. (Hiding behind a bush and throwing rocks, for example, will not be effective.)

Engaging animals that are sick or injured can result in unpredictable behavior. If you suspect that a coyote is sick or injured, contact the proper authorities and DO NOT interact with the coyote.

Construction will begin in 2018, but now is the time to make our preferences known to the project planners. Six alternatives are still under study and will be analyzed in the draft Environmental Impact Report scheduled for release later this year.

One of the six alternatives under study involves construction of an elevated freight corridor between Pacific Coast Highway and Willow Street to avoid taking people's homes on the Westside. Improvements will also be made to interchanges to improve traffic flow.
