February 29 General Meeting follow-up

Solar Lighting - There was discussion and some concern expressed at the meeting regarding the visibility of the solar panel at the Bauer Drive entrance. Although it was installed according to our specifications, some felt that it was too high. Bret Lyhus had checked with the vendor and found they would charge \$395 to cover their time to drive to and from their office in Fairfax County and lower the panel. There was a unanimous vote

of members present not to spend more than \$300 to do the work.

After investigating further, Bret determined that no rewiring would be required. Having already confirmed with the vendor that it would be ok, he completed the work himself at no charge.

Membership - was 49% but is now approximately 53%. Please remember you must be a paid member in order to vote.

Landscaping - Discussion regarding the theft of the Alberta spruces at both entrances ended with a unanimous vote to not replace the spruces but add more flowers. This will be accomplished in May.

Neighborhood Safety

Officer Prather reported at the last General Meeting that over the past half year we had 1 robbery, 3 burglaries, 1 home dispute and several acts of vandalism. Even with these incidents, he said we had the safest neighborhood in the area. As the summer is approaching we would like to remind the community that there are several things you can do to enhance your safety. We hope these hints will help you - all year, not just summer.

- 1- Keep garage doors closed at all times-even if you are only working in the back yard.
- 2- Keep you car doors locked and all valuable items out of sight.
- 3- If no one is home keep windows and doors locked.
- 4- It's a good idea to have a radio playing to make it sound like someone is home.
- 5- Even when you are home keep your doors locked.
- 6- If you are going away, have a neighbor take in your mail, paper and any packages that may be left on your porch do not tell the P.O. or newspaper that you will be away.
- 7- Have deliveries made when someone is home as packages left on the porch are an invitation to a burglar.
- 8- Have GOOD door locks some of the older locks can be opened with a credit card.
- 9- Be aware of unfamiliar faces and cars.

- 10- If you have a security system, do not advertise the brand in front of your house as burglars know how to break each type of system.
- 11- Do not let solicitors in your home as it is a way for them to see what you have and identify possible ways to enter your home.
- 12- Most burglaries occur in the daytime while you are at work and the kids are in school.

The Neighborhood Watch members do both day and night patrols. They have side panel decals and a flashing car roof light to be more visible. This helps deter crime.

Neighborhood Watch Findings

It was suggested at a recent meeting that we report on some of the findings entered in the Neighborhood Watch logbook. Rae Kordell reviewed the comments of the NW patrollers from April 2011 to April 2012 and found the most reported comment was "garage door open." What a great invitation to a burglar! Most garages have entry doors to the house.

Other finds include:

- 1- abandoned cars
- 2- street lights out (46)
- 3- pot holes (3) and one requiring a large section of street repair
- 4- broken curb from a snow plow mishap

- 5- bicycles left unattended and not secured
- 6- Trailway Dr. park entrance with broken lock (3) before construction was started
- 7- homes and lawn in disrepair (foreclosed homes)
- 8- speeding school buses on Rocking Spring Dr.
- 9- houses dark, unlit porch lights, many newspapers in driveway "Come on in Mr. Burglar!"

These incidents are reported to the proper office or person responsible. When you are on vacation it is your responsibility to make your house safe.

Foreclosed Homes

Foreclosed homes, as well as homes for sale, are targets for crime. It is important to be aware of uncut grass and newspapers in the driveway.

If the grass is over 12 inches you should call the county at 311 and ask for Housing Code. Tell them the situation and they will come to the house and leave a notice giving the bank a certain amount of time and if nothing has been done by that date the county will cut the grass and charge the responsible party \$750.00. Some homes in foreclosure become a real eyesore and bring down the value of our community. One house in foreclosure on our block had a backyard full of trash. When it was cleared out there was a yard full of rat holes. Please don't wait for this to happen in your neighborhood.


Tips for Gardening

This edition's tips have been provided by Vivienne Burke of our landscaping committee. They are from the Virginia Extension Service.

For trees and shrubs, spread mulch evenly to a depth of 2 to 3 inches. For trees and shrubs in beds, mulch the entire bed. For those in a lawn, mulch a wide ring (extending from 3 to 6 feet out from the trunk) around each plant. Never pile mulch against tree trunks. Pull mulch back away from the trunk about an inch or so. As organic mulches decompose, they may need to be replenished somewhat every year; but don't let mulch build up to depths greater than about 4 inches.

For flower beds, mulch can be applied up to 3 inches deep (after settling), but should be kept pulled back slightly from plant stems. Mulches should thoroughly cover an area to a uniform depth to be most effective. Low or bare spots are prone to weed problems.
