Checklist

Furnace:

Clean and inspected

Replace filters (once a month)

Clean vents, duct openings and registers

Gutters & Downspouts:

Clean out and repair, check for leaks

Make sure gutter spouts drain away from

Roof: Check in the attic for any leaks

Replace bad shingles (it is much cheaper

to replace at first discovery, then to put off and need to have a whole new roof)

Windows & Doors:


Check every window and door for drafts Weather proof with caulking or stripping

Outdoor Plumbing:

Turn off and drain hoses and faucets.

911 EMERGENCY

The Fort Wayne 911 Center provides service to the entire city and at times receives calls for agencies outside the city limits. Due to the high volume of calls the center receives, it is important that only necessary calls be made on the 911 emergency line so emergency resources can be delivered in an efficient and timely manner.

WHEN TO CALL 911:

Any crime or complaint that is in progress or has just occurred (last 15 minutes). This should be a situation where there is personal injury, property damage or a conflict has or could occur.

A situation that starts out minor (such as a property damage accident) but then escalates and turns potentially dangerous (participants of accident start arguing, or you find out there are injuries).

Anytime you feel that life or property is in danger, due to a police, fire or medical emergency.

DO NOT CALL 911:

For phone numbers, directions, or other general information. These types of calls may be directed to the:

Police desk, 427-1222. This is a 24- hour service.

If you discover that your vehicle or property has been damaged in the past and you don't know who did it. This report can be taken over the phone through:

Tele-service at — 427-1340.

CONCERNS

If a person, vehicle, or animal is hit, because of obstructed view, caused by the overgrown bushes, trees, or weeds, this could become a liability issue for the owner of the property.

Also, if your vegetation is hanging over, and it scratches someone's vehicle, you might be liable and need to cover the expenses of a new paint job. Think ahead! **Trim your bushes!**

Many neighbors have been trimming their trees and shrubbery. This has been making the area look so nice.

When it comes time to dispose of the waste trimmings, just cut them to <u>3 feet</u> in length, bundle them together. If you put them into a container – not to exceed 60 lbs. Or you can just use string or anything to tie them in bundles and stack them together.

Then put them out with your garbage collection. It is so easy to get rid of them.

PLEASE DO NOT LEAVE THEM STORED IN A PILE THAT COLLECTS RODENTS, INSECTS, OR CHILDREN.



Remember to rake your leaves on the right of way strip


Also, remember to keep the drains at the corners free of debris and leaves



Vehicle Break-Ins on the Rise Minimizing the Risk of Becoming a Victim

Fort Wayne, Ind – The City of Fort Wayne Police Department is presently investigating numerous incidents of vehicle break-ins; thirty-six incidents were reported this past week alone, and peaked at sixty-seven reports in a one-week period as recent as July 2012. While some might consider vehicle break-ins to be a "petty crime", detectives with the Fort Wayne Police Department disagree and say that the loss to victims can be significant, and the crime itself feeds other criminal activity making prevention all the more important.

Significant Loss to Victims

Victims' losses include purses, wallets, check books, credit cards, cash, cell phones, jewelry, GPS units, laptops, CDs, clothing, other valuable electronic or digital equipment, stereos, and even loose change, medication, and garage door openers.

Vehicle Break-Ins Feed Other Criminal Activity

Many of these items are taken with the intent to be sold or pawned, and in some instances stolen credit or debit cards were used to make large purchases shortly after the break-in was believed to have occurred. Also, if the criminal obtains the victim's personal documents then the victim is at risk of identity theft. Additionally, statistics have shown that if a garage door opener is stolen from a vehicle that the criminal will attempt to burglarize the home at a later date.

Police Efforts to Reduce Vehicle Break-Ins

Typically vehicle break-ins occur where there is greater opportunity for reward; that is, where the criminal element can have access to many vehicles as opposed to only a few. Prime locations or targeted areas for this crime are parking lots (nightclubs, exercise facilities, apartment complexes, hotels, shopping plazas, churches), and <u>residential neighborhoods</u>. These areas are most commonly targeted in the overnight hours, but vehicles have been targeted during daylight hours as well. Patrol officers periodically patrol these areas. In addition to marked patrol units, the Fort Wayne Police Department employs the use of unmarked surveillance vehicles. You can help too by reporting any suspicious person(s) or activity, and by minimizing your risk of becoming a victim.

Prevention - Minimize Your Risk of Becoming a Victim

Park your vehicle in well-lit areas;

Always secure your vehicle's doors and windows;

Never leave valuable items in your vehicle; if necessary to leave valuables in your vehicle, then hide them prior to arriving at your destination.

Always document serial numbers of valuable items.

Install an alarm on your vehicle;

Check your vehicle prior to exiting; ensure that you didn't leave valuables in plain view.

The Fort Wayne Police Department would like to remind you to be vigilant in the protection of your vehicle and the items that you keep inside them. Criminals look for the easy target. Is your vehicle an easy target?

Remember that only a small majority of the population are the ones that are not law abiding citizens. Remember—law enforcement officers can't be everywhere at once-but as neighbors we can.

Ask a person who has been a victim of a theft from their home or vehicle.

It is a real stressful experience!

Put that neighborhood "know how" to work. It's simple—Use your eyes and ears and then your telephone.

If you spot something suspicious, call law enforcement immediately.

As a neighborhood, we need to start letting people know that we are serious about protecting our property, whether it is our homes, our cars, bicycles, landscape, or our neighbors property. We need to take action against the criminal element.

JOIN YOUR NEIGHBORS IN FIGHTING CRIME REPORT IT

Notice-Warning-Beware

You might think that it is your next door neighbor who is calling the police or neighborhood code or another city department, but you could be **VERY WRONG!**

Wednesday, October 31, 2012


6:00 pm - 8:00 pm

The official hours for 'Trick-or-Treat' for 2012 have been established for the City of Fort Wayne. Trick-or-Treat will be observed in the City of Fort Wayne from 6:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 31, 2012. Trick-or-treaters should only visit those homes with an illuminated exterior front light (or porch light) indicating that trick-or-treaters are welcomed. Trick-or-treaters should remember the following safety rules:

- Do not wear costumes that obscure your vision;
- Wear reflective clothing, or light colored clothing to make you more visible to motorists;
- Travel in groups composed of at least one adult;
- Have a pre-planned route;
- Only cross streets at the crosswalks;
- Visit familiar homes, and do not enter a stranger's home;
- Be prepared for adverse weather;
- Refrain from consuming any treats until inspected by an adult.

Bloomingdale Neighborhood Boundaries



The City of Fort Wayne wants to expand State Boulevard into a primary east-west arterial corridor like Coliseum Boulevard

Plans are currently prepared to widen State Blvd. from two lanes between Wells and Spy Run to FIVE lanes, straightening the carefully designed traffic-speed-calming curves over Spy Run Creek and through the National Register of Historic Places <u>BROOKVIEW NEIGHBORHOOD</u>. The city plans to elevate the roadway 7' - 9'; turning this appealing residential district into yet another wide, fast urban highway.

The Brookview Neighborhood is adjacent to our area.

The concerns of many neighborhoods that will be effected are about property values; quality of life; city attractiveness; safety and transportation accessibility for uses that include local vehicles, biking, walking and public transit.

This project should be halted and plans to modify State Blvd. should begin anew with more of a public transparent planning process that will benefit both the city and neighborhoods.

People do not realize how much more traffic this will bring to a residual neighborhood. Downtown is trying to limit the lanes of traffic and amount of traffic...do you think that this part of the city will become a primary artery from Hwy 69 up Goshen Road down W. State to E. State to Coliseum Blvd??

Think about the traffic congestion now....what will it become like if these plans are completed as proposed?????
