Why Does It Have to Be So Hard?

Hope everyone has dealt with their taxes by now.
Now I'm not an advocate for a flat tax, but, does it really have to be so complicated? It made me wonder when taxes started and how complicated were they back then? Thanks to the internet, it was easy to find out (a lot easier than trying to figure out how to deal with the tips my daughter earned in her new job).

The roots of IRS go back to the Civil War when President Lincoln and Congress, in 1862, created the position of commissioner of Internal Revenue and enacted an income tax to pay war expenses. The income tax was repealed 10 years later. Congress revived the income tax in 1894, but the Supreme Court ruled it unconstitutional the following year.

In 1913, the 16th Amendment was ratified giving Congress the authority to enact an income tax. That same year, the first Form 1040 appeared after Congress levied a 1 percent tax on net personal incomes above \$3,000 with a 6 percent surtax on incomes of more than \$500,000. The form was 3 pages long, there were no other forms, the directions

were all on one page, and there were only 6 lines for deductions! Interestingly, this tax touched less than 1% of Americans.

In 1918, during World War I, the top rate of the income tax rose to 77 percent to help finance the war effort. It dropped sharply in the post-war years, down to 24 percent in 1929, and rose again during the Depression.

During World War II, Congress introduced payroll withholding and quarterly tax payments and raised the top marginal tax rate to 94 percent (whew!). Well into the '50s, the highest tax rate was over 80 percent and the payas-you-go withholding system introduced as a wartime measure was never shut down. Progress in lowering taxes was sporadic and confusing. Rather than rolling back rates as such, the tax code was being rewritten to allow deductions and lower rates in certain circumstances while raising rates on others. This explosion in loopholes and fine print did spur on one industry: H&R Block started helping folks with their taxes in 1955. Go figure.



Ever needed to hire a plumber or an electrician, but didn't know where to start? You could subscribe to Angie's List, or you could just check in your Colvin's Glen Citizens' Association community directory.

The directory not only provides the names and addresses of every household in the neighborhood, but also provides recommendations from your neighbors on various tradesmen. You can take

a recommendation as is or call your neighbor and ask further questions about a particular recommendation.

Other useful information in the directory is a dog and cat directory (great for

helping a lost pet find their way home) and a neighborhood "yellow pages" to see what services your neighbors may have to offer.

Traffic Calming

The Traffic Calming Task Force has been working with the county to come up with some options to help slow drivers down in the neighborhood. You may have noticed the nomadic digital speed radar device, first measuring speeds on Dunn Meadow in the next neighborhood, then on Dunn Meadow between Delta Glen and




Yellow Pine and finally, on Yellow Pine. The feeling is that it did help to slow folks down and make people aware of really

how fast they were going. It will hopefully be brought back for a few days on Colvin Forest Dr as well.

Fairfax County Department of Transportation, together with the Task Force, are now offering to add two stop signs at the intersection of Yellow Pine and Dunn Meadow. There is already a stop sign facing Yellow Pine traffic, so this would add stop signs for drivers traveling east and west on Dunn Meadow toward the intersection. In order to

implement these stop signs, the county requires that at least 50% of the households in the neighborhood cast and return a ballot and that at least 60% of those ballots approve the addition. If you haven't returned your vote, please do so (must be postmarked by April 26th).

The county is also supposed to have some police enforcement, but as of the last neighborhood meeting,



none had been spotted. However, be forewarned that police enforcement has been promised!

The dues are used to continue the Citizen's Association efforts to communicate issues that affect our community both externally and internally; enhance the quality of life in our community via social activities; coordinate upkeep of entrances to our neighborhood; and improve safety

Nearby neighborhoods pay dues that are usually mandatory and anywhere from \$120 to \$540. Our neighborhood dues are only \$50 and they are voluntary.
