Grocery Bills on Downward Trend For American Shoppers

You can spend a lot of money on groceries if you're so inclined, but some people get by spending as little as possible. The Gallup Organization recently reported that Americans spend an average of \$151 per week on food. Ten percent say they spend \$300 or more a week; 8 percent spend less than \$50.

Adjusted for inflation, though, the average (or mean) is actually down from years past. In 2012 dollars, the average American spent up to \$234 weekly in 1966 and 1967, a trend that drifted downward until a spike of \$214 a week during the mid-1980s. The last time Gallup asked the question in its surveys, in 1987, the figure was \$106 per week.

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Thanksgiving's Origins: No Pie, But Lots of Other Tasty Food

The first Thanksgiving didn't feature pies or cakes, because the Plymouth pilgrims had no ovens and a limited supply of sugar. But it may have included cranberries, which Native Americans used in a variety of foods (including pemmican, made from berries, dried venison, and melted fat) as well as for medicinal purposes.

So what was the "original" Thanksgiving really like? Although harvest feasts were common in what became known as the Commonwealth of Virginia throughout the 17th century, the Thanksgiving most Americans probably think of was held at the Plymouth Plantation in November 1621.

William Bradford, the governor of the plantation, organized a feast for colonists and their neighbors, the Wampanoag tribe, to celebrate a successful harvest. The harvest had thrived thanks in part to Squanto, a native of the Patuxet tribe who had learned English as a slave before returning to his native land. Squanto taught the pilgrims how to grow corn, catch eels and fish, and avoid poisonous plants in the surrounding forest, as well as helping them to forge a relationship with the Wampanoag and its chief, Massasoit.

This first Thanksgiving lasted three days, and probably did feature wild turkey as well as venison supplied by the Wampanoag – but no football.

School at Home: Growth of a Trend

Home schooling is legal in all 50 states. How many parents are choosing to teach their kids at home? The National Center for Education Statistics estimates that 1.5 million to 2 million children are home schooled in the U.S., approximately 3 percent of schoolage children countrywide. The proportion has grown by about 77 percent since 1999.

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The reasons behind the growing popularity of teaching children at home? Thirty-six percent of parents cite the desire for religious and moral instruction, 21 percent report concerns about the school environment, and 17 percent have concerns about the quality of academic instruction.



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
