

Grandma's Apron

The main use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath, but along with that, it served MANY other purposes! It served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears. From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kiddoes.

And when the weather was cold, Grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring b row, bent over the hot wood stove.

Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables.

After the peas were shelled, it carried out the hulls. In the Fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner. It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that "old-time apron" that served so many worthwhile purposes. Some folks would go crazy now trying to figure out how many germs were on that apron, but I don't think I ever caught anything from my

PRESIDENT'S LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP AWARD

Please join us at this month's JNA general meeting as President **Ted Guerra** awards the following individuals with a JNA Lifetime Membership Award in recognition of their years of faithful service to our neighborhood association.

Many thanks to **Judy Jackman**, **Elia Reyna** and **Stan Waghalter** for their many years of membership and service on the JNA board. Below you will find a few words from our distinguished honorees.

JUDY JACKMAN

I joined the Jefferson Neighborhood Association in 1987 just after we moved into our house on Cromwell. Over the last 26 years that I have been a member, JNA has gone through ups and downs in membership size and level of activity. When I joined, there were a number of families with small children and JNA, as part of the Woodlawn Lake Playground Coalition, helped build the original playground at the park in 1988. We held two softball tournaments and barbecue dinners at the park. Our first garage sale was in 1988 and the money raised paid for our first scholarship which enabled a Jefferson HS student to attend a human relations camp, Anytown, sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. It also funded landscaping for Horace Mann MS. Over the years the association has awarded many scholarships and done numerous projects which benefited the community. I served two terms as treasurer in the late 1980s and have served on the Board several times.

ELIA REYNA

I have been a JNA member for at least 25 years and have served as President, Vice President, Secretary and Board member. I presently serve as the JNA scholarship chairman. I accepted this position to keep the legacy of the scholarships for graduating high school students that my mother, **Evelia Reyna**, initiated in the 1980's. The scholarship program is the JNA's only major project. Mom served as scholarship chairman until her death in 2003. In her memory, JNA recognized her for her community work and named the scholarship "The JNA/Evelia Reyna Scholarship."

STAN WAGHALTER

Lynn & I joined the JNA in 1990 at the urging of the late **Eva Levinson**. **Jane Gaitan** was the President at that time.

When **Bob Ross** became president a couple of years later, he asked me to start doing the JNA's newsletter. I took over that responsibility from **Ed Gaitan**. Along the way, I was elected Secretary and Vice President and continued to do the newsletter. I became President of the JNA in 1995 (and still did the newsletter!) **Ed Gaitan** followed me as President.

Others who have served as President since Lynn & I became members include:

Paul Konkle, Delia Guajardo, Richard Tankersley, Jacob Valenzuela, Ed Garza, Jesús De La Torre, Justin Rodriguez and Ted Guerra.

Maybe not in that order and sorry if I missed anyone.

Except for a short time, when Lynn was elected treasurer, I've held the treasury position for several years. Bob Ross incorporated the association and I followed with the paperwork to get the 501 (c) (3) designation.



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It's that time of year folks, BACK TO SCHOOL!

Keeping that in mind, we want to remind you to drive safely and forewarn you by sharing the current general fines for some basic traffic violations:

Speeding Violations:

- Speeding for the first 10 miles over the speed limit is \$166.00. Each additional mile is \$5.
- Speeding in a School Zone for the first 10 miles over the speed limit is \$206.00. Each additional mile is \$5.
- Speeding in a **construction zone** for the first 10 miles over the speed limit is **\$235.00**. Each additional mile is **\$10**. Speeding in a **School Zone/Construction Zone** for the first 10 miles over the speed limit is **\$290.00**. Each additional mile is **\$10**.

Other Violations:

- Passing a stopped school bus is \$642
- Other School Zone Violations (Excluding Speeding) are \$206
- Operating a vehicle without Valid Liability Insurance is \$277
- Seat Belt Violations are \$147.00
 - Safety Seat and Child Seat Belt violations are \$221
