Maintaining Your Homes' Smoke & CO2 Alarms We Are Good Neighbors

North American Precis Syndicate (NAPSI) reports that roughly two-thirds of house fire deaths could be avoided, it's estimated, if all homes had working smoke alarms. Properly installed and maintained, residential smoke alarms are one of the best and least expensive ways to provide an early warning when a fire begins. If you follow these simple tips, you can ensure that your home is adequately protected by working smoke alarms.

Smoke Alarm Tips: Smoke alarms should be installed in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Combination smoke alarms that include both ionization and photoelectric alarms offer the most comprehensive protection. An ionization alarm is more responsive to flames, while a photoelectric alarm is more responsive to a smoldering fire. For the best protection, smoke alarms should be interconnected, so they all sound if any one of them sounds. Purchase smoke alarms from a reputable retailer you trust and choose alarms that bear the label of a nationally recognized testing laboratory. Install smoke alarms at least 10 feet from cooking appliances to reduce the possibility of nuisance alarms. If possible, alarms should be mounted in the center of a ceiling. If mounted on a wall, they should be six to 12 inches below the ceiling. Avoid locating alarms near bathrooms, heating appliances, windows or ceiling fans and never paint over a smoke alarm. Smoke alarms should be tested once a month by pressing the

TEST button and replacing the smoke alarm batteries at least once a year is optimal. If an alarm "chirps" or "beeps" to indicate low batteries, they should be replaced immediately. You may not realize that smoke detectors have a shelf life. Replace the smoke alarms every 10 years. If your smoke alarm goes off, activate your escape plan and exit your home quickly and safely. Go to your safe meeting place and call 9-1-1 from a safe place (using a cell phone or a neighbor's phone). Meet

all your family members there and wait for the fire department to arrive. Remember to crawl low under smoke, know two ways out of each room and once you get out, stay out.

Carbon Monoxide Alarm Tips: Carbon monoxide detectors trigger an alarm based on accumulation of CO2 across time. Carbon monoxide is a byproduct of incomplete combustion of petroleum products. Cook stoves, boilers, furnaces, vehicles and supplemental heating stoves all can produce carbon monoxide. CO2 detectors require a continuous power supply, so if the power cuts off, the alarm becomes ineffective. Be sure to purchase a detector that has backup battery supply. Also be aware the average life span of many CO2 detectors is two years. It's a good idea to write the date you first plug it in on the detector with a marker, then there is no doubt

about when it is ready to be replaced. Detectors can save lives, but only if they are working properly. Make sure yours are properly installed, maintained and replaced when necessary. If you suspect that you are experiencing CO2 poisoning, get fresh air immediately. Leave the home and call for assistance from a neighbor's home. You could lose consciousness and die from CO2 poisoning if you stay in the home. For further facts and tips on smoke alarms, visit the Electrical Safety Foundation International (ESFI), a nonprofit organization dedicated to promoting electrical safety, at www.esfi.org. The association strives to see our community defined by a sense of shared ownership and collective responsibility. Anyone can attend a monthly meeting, held on the second Tuesday, 7p at Dutch Creek Elementary. Drop by, say hello, bring questions to the Board or possibly volunteer to help on a project. What Is Jeffco Schools Doing With Taxpayer Money?

Last year, the community passed 3A/3B which promised no teacher layoffs or increased class sizes. Yet we see good teachers laid off, shuffled to other positions, or teachers taking the district retirement incentive and not being replaced resulting in larger classes.

Jeffco Schools also promised the money from 3A/3B would NOT be used to fund inBloom, LoudCloud, or Classroom Dashboard. The district now says that nearly \$3 million of those funds they promised to reserve for recruiting and retaining the best teachers, for middle school librarians and orchestra and gym class, and for outdoor lab "were appropriated by the Board of Education in support of the Classroom Dashboard project" (Q&A Document presented to BoE, p. 11). These technologies are surrounded with significant financial and privacy concerns, but the district heedlessly presses forward.

The district promised that 3A/3B would reduce school fees. But parents are seeing ever-increasing lunch, student, athletic, and outdoor lab fees and still paying expensive bus fees just to get their children to school. One mom was shocked to find that she had to pay over \$1000 in school fees for her three children. Her story is not unique. According to The Denver Post, Jeffco Schools collects \$23.7 million in fees per year while Cherry Creek Schools collects less than \$ 1 million.

Jeffco Schools stated just last week that our teachers are paid 11% less than the state average. The district also budgeted only \$20 million for capital expenditures that normally average \$50 million. If the money isn't going to teachers and isn't going to building maintenance, where is it going? Our teachers and kids are getting shortchanged while the district plans to spend

millions of dollars to pay for untested, unproven technology.

A parent spoke out about such wasteful spending on unnecessary technology at the board meeting on October 3. The measure she spoke against failed and angry district employees (paid with taxpayer funds) intimidated and bullied her, and then slapped her with a no-trespass order so she can never speak to them at a meeting again without their permission. This follows a series of incidents where district employees have refused to give accurate information and continually mischaracterized the truth.

It's a Great Story

It happened every Friday evening, almost without fail, when the sun resembled a giant orange and was starting to dip into the blue ocean. Old Ed came strolling along the beach to his favorite pier. Clutched in his bony hand was a bucket of shrimp. Ed walks out to the end of the pier, where it seems he almost has the world to himself. The glow of the sun is a golden bronze now. Everybody's gone, except for a few joggers on the beach. Standing out on the end of the pier, Ed is alone with his thoughts...and his bucket of shrimp. Before long, however, he is no longer alone. Up in the sky a thousand white dots come screeching and squawking, winging their way toward that lanky frame standing there on the end of the pier. Before long, dozens of seagulls have enveloped him, their wings fluttering and flapping wildly. Ed stands there tossing shrimp to the hungry birds. As he does, if you listen closely, you can hear him say with a smile, 'Thank you. Thank you.'

In a few short minutes the bucket is empty. But Ed doesn't leave. He stands there lost in thought, as though transported to another time and place. When he finally turns around and begins to walk back toward the beach, a few of the birds hop along the pier with him until he gets to the stairs, and then they, too, fly away. And old Ed quietly makes his way down to the end of the beach and on home. If you were sitting there on the pier with your fishing line in the water, Ed might seem like 'a funny old duck,' as my dad used to say. Or, to onlookers, he's just another old codger, lost in his own weird world, feeding the seagulls with a bucket full of shrimp. To the onlooker, rituals can look either very strange or very empty. They can seem altogether

unimportant... maybe even a lot of nonsense. Old folks often do strange things, at least in the eyes of Boomers and Busters. Most of them would probably write Old Ed off, down there in Florida. That's too bad. They'd do well to know him better. His full name: Eddie Rickenbacker. He was a famous hero in World War I, and then he was in WWII. On one of his flying missions across the Pacific, he and his seven-member crew went down. Miraculously, all of the men survived, crawled out of their plane, and climbed into a life raft.

Captain Rickenbacker and his crew floated for days on the rough waters of the Pacific. They fought the sun. They fought sharks. Most of all, they fought hunger and thirst. By the eighth day their rations ran out. No food. No water. They were hundreds of miles from land and no one knew where they were or even if they were alive. Every day across America millions wondered and prayed that Eddie Rickenbacker might somehow be found alive. The men adrift needed a miracle. That afternoon they had a simple devotional service and prayed for a miracle. They tried to nap. Eddie leaned back and pulled his military cap over his nose. Time dragged on. All he could hear was the slap of the waves against the raft. Suddenly, Eddie felt something land on the top of his cap. It was a seagull! Old Ed would later describe how he sat perfectly still, planning his next move. With a flash of his hand and a squawk from the gull, he managed to grab it and wring its neck. He tore the feathers off, and he and his starving crew made a meal of it - a very slight meal for eight men. Then they used the intestines for bait. With it, they caught fish, which

gave them food and more bait... and the cycle continued. With that simple survival technique, they were able to endure the rigors of the sea until they were found and rescued after 24 days at sea. Eddie Rickenbacker lived many years beyond that ordeal, but he never forgot the sacrifice of that first life-saving seagull... And he never stopped saying, 'Thank you.' That's why almost every Friday night he would walk to the end of the pier with a bucket full of shrimp and a heart full of gratitude.

Important Voice-mail Line Information



Update on the Homicide in South Jeffco

Jefferson County, CO. – On September 18, 2013, the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office SWAT team served a search warrant at 7271 S. Webster St. It was suspected that the residence was being used as a location for various property and drug crimes. A suspect, Gregory Gruenloht (dob 090971), was taken into custody without incident.

During the search of the residence, a body, later identified as Robert Gordon Jr., 51, was discovered. Cause and manner of death is pending an autopsy by the Jefferson County Coroner.

Gruenloht is being held at the Jefferson County Jail without bond for suspicion of 2nd degree murder.

A lady called the voicemail number and remarked that she noticed in the newsletter there was no mention of Columbus Day and is hoping the association is not becoming POLITICALLY CORRECT by leaving it off the list of holidays. Columbus Day for 2013 was October 14th and here is a summary about how and when people celebrate.

Many countries in the New World and elsewhere celebrate the anniversary of Christopher Columbus's arrival in the Americas, which occurred on October 12, 1492 in the Julian calendar and October 21, 1492 in the modern Gregorian calendar, as an official holiday. The day is celebrated as Columbus Day in the United States, as Día de la Raza in many countries in the Americas, as Día de las Culturas (Day of the Cultures) in Costa Rica, as Discovery Day in the Bahamas, as Día de la Hispanidad and Fiesta Nacional in Spain and as Día de las Américas (Day of the Americas) in Uruguay. These holidays have been celebrated unofficially since the late 18th century, and officially in various countries since the early 20th century.

In the US, Columbus Day first became an official state holiday in Colorado in 1906, and became a federal holiday in 1934. However, people have celebrated Columbus' voyage since the colonial period. In 1792, New York City and other U.S. cities celebrated the 300th anniversary of his landing in the New World. In 1892, President Benjamin Harrison called upon the people of the United States to celebrate Columbus Day on the 400th anniversary of the event. During the 400-year anniversary in 1892, teachers, preachers, poets and politicians used Columbus Day rituals to teach ideals of patriotism. These patriotic rituals were framed around themes such as support for war, citizenship boundaries, the importance of loyalty to the nation, and celebrating social progress.

Since 1971, the holiday has been fixed in the US to the second Monday in October, coincidentally the same day as Thanksgiving in neighboring Canada (which was fixed to that date in 1959). It is generally observed today by banks, the bond market, the U.S. Postal Service and other federal agencies, most state government offices, and some school districts. Most businesses and some stock exchanges remain open, however, and there is a trend among some states and municipalities away from observing the holiday. (From: Wikipedia, license: CCA-SA)

Breakfast: Why Eat It Every Day?

Mother always told you that breakfast is the most important meal of the day. Not everyone listens to her advice, though. A recent National Eating Trends survey found that 31 million adults skip breakfast in the morning. Most of them are ages 18-34.

Why eat breakfast? People who sit down to breakfast every day have a 20 percent lower risk of developing obesity, and a 19 percent lower risk of developing type 2 diabetes (according to a 2013 report from the University of Minnesota School of Public Health). And a 2012 study by The Nutrition Society found that people ages 20-39 who eat a regular breakfast have lower cholesterol and are less likely to suffer from high blood pressure than those who dash out of the house with an empty stomach.
