Did vou know....

Since December, 2009 The Phoenix Police Department had more than 3,600 sworn positions in the Department? Currently that number is less than 3,000. Every position lost through attrition was a position worth keeping, serving a job worth doing, and maintaining the low crime rates that you, the citizens, deserve.

While Phoenix Police Department staffing levels continue to decline, the City has told residents and police officers that the Department will not be hiring until at least 2015. What does that mean for our City? Today, squads that once numbered a dozen officers or more often hit the streets with as few as two officers. This leaves beats uncovered in neighborhoods all over Phoenix.

What does this mean to you? It's time to get involved in your neighborhood and partner with the police. The only way to do that is to talk to your neighbors, report crimes when they happen, get a neighborhood patrol together and come to your community meetings. The police can't do everything, especially since they are understaffed.

Is it easy to get involved? No, it takes work. There are solutions to the problems, but you can't expect help if you don't want to get involved. Continued on page 4



Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol

Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol has long supported the notion that involved residents are the

most effective crime fighters, reporting suspicious activity as it occurs. This program allows residents to become more actively involved as partners in crime prevention. They are the Phoenix Police Department's "Eyes and Ears!"

Citizen Patrols? I thought patrolling was a job for the Police! Crime prevention is every citizen's responsibility. Some communities in Phoenix already have conducted citizen patrols with success. Providing these patrols often gives people a stronger sense of ownership in their neighborhood, as well as drawing neighbors together in a common cause. The citizen patrols can be conducted on an 'as available' basis and are by no means mandatory. The Phoenix Police Department will provide the training and tools to volunteers who would like to become more involved in crime prevention around their neighborhoods. **Continued on page 4**

What are the requirements for becoming a P.N.P. Member?

After the following qualifications are met, a background check will be completed. This process will include a check for warrants and any criminal record. Persons listed as suspects or investigative leads on police reports will be handled on a case-by-case basis. Final approval for participation in the Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol program will be at the discretion of the Patrol Division Assistant Chief of Police

Qualifications:

§ Reside in the City of Phoenix

§ Be at least 18 years of age

 $\$ Possess a valid driver license or Arizona identification card

§ Complete mandatory Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol training

Disqualifying conditions:

§ Felony convictions within the past 60 months (from time of application)

- § Any pending criminal charges
- § Conviction for child molestation
- § Registered as a sex offender

§ Adjudicated by the courts to be mentally incompetent

DID YOU KNOW CONTINUED....

We have lived in the neighborhood going on 19 years. I think it has gone down a little, and took a big hit when the economy tanked, but that happened everywhere. This neighborhood is a popular area to move into because of the closeness of Moon Valley High School, Tumbleweed Elementary, Abraham Lincoln Traditional School along with Cactus Park, Cactus Precinct, shopping and ASU West which make it a great area. Have we had problems? Someone stole our bike 18 years ago because the garage was left open. Someone wanted our daughter's rims off her car ten years ago. Most recently in December, someone stole new plants out of the yard of all things. This month my neighbor called me regarding my plants again....please be on the lookout for a dangerous young boy, under the age of ten, wearing a red shirt on a scooter who just had to have one of my plants! Maybe he is going to be a botanist or a horticulturist?

We care about blight and crime in our neighborhood, and have city ordinances that cover those problems. On a serious note, we have been alerted to a couple of possible meth houses in the neighborhood and the police need your help to get them out of the neighborhood....

If you see unusual activity, cars coming and going at all hours of the day and night or lots of yard sales for junk, or smell a strong chemical or ammonia smell, you may have a meth house near you.

Users themselves will also have distinctive appearances. They'll often be nervous and "twitchy." Many have red sores all over their bodies. They're usually very skinny, like to be awake at night and can go for a few days straight without napping or sleeping. **Continued on page 9**

How many hours are required to participate?

Once you complete the 4 hour training, you decide the amount of time you wish to participate. Any volunteers contributing documented hours to this program will be invited to annual programrelated ceremonies.

Below is the Training Outline and Schedule dates.

The "powers" of a Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol member? Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol participants are citizens, not police officers or police department volunteers. They have no powers of arrest beyond that of any private citizen. They are trained for observation purposes only and participate for benefit of their community or neighborhood.

Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol Training Training Calendar for 2014

There are 4 hours of training in the areas of patrol procedures, observation skills, the 9-1-1 system, reporting techniques, confrontation avoidance, safety practices and Block Watch grants. Citizens who complete the training will be provided program identification cards, authorized to use identifying automobile door placards and cellular telephone equipment to conduct crime prevention activities in their neighborhood and to record and report suspicious activity. Block Watch does not promote intervention. Participants will exchange ideas involving crime prevention with patrol officers in their area.

ANOTHER WAY TO REPORT GRAFFITTI

GPC (Graffiti Protective Coatings) has developed a graffiti reporting application available to the residents of the **Cactus Park West community**. This app uses a Smartphone platform available for free on iPhone, iPad, Android, and

Tablets. Residents of CPW can upload this app and report graffiti incidents that will send service request to the GPC technician in real time.

The reporting citizen will also receive feedback via email informing them that the job has been completed. The database will track the address, photos, and removal information available to the CPWNA leadership team.

Simply go to "itunes" on Apple devices or "play Store" on Android devices and **download "MyCPW"** and you can start reporting graffiti. All app-orders will be addressed by GPC only in the CPW community.


CPWNA can now report graffiti via smart phone!

GPC has created a smart phone reporting app – FREE – to CPWNA.

CPW residents can download app on Android or iPhone on iTunes or Play Store.

The App is called "**myCPWNA**". All reports are routed to GPC technician in **real time** and abated within 24 hours. Reporter then receives an email notifying that the work is complete.




