CACTUS PARK WEST GETS A GRANT 5 YEARS IN A ROW!!!

Dan Glauber, Chairman of CPWNA, is happy to announce that we have been approved for a **\$9999.00** grant by the City of Phoenix Neighborhood Block Watch Program. Many thanks go out to **Gloria Lamb**, our Treasurer who continues to write outstanding grants for our neighborhood.

A major portion of this grant will go towards removing any graffiti in the neighborhood and the remainder will be used for the printing costs of the neighborhood newsletter. **Graffiti Protective Coatings (GPC)** comes out and takes care of graffiti sighting within **24 hours of notification**. **GPC has cleaned/removed 101 sites in our neighborhood from Jan to March, 2014.**

Their presence has made a huge impact in our community. They are responsible for cleaning our sidewalks, walls, alley ways, and garbage containers. Now we ask all of you who live in the neighborhood to help us keep it **graffiti free** by going to the neighborhood website (neighborhoodlink.com/phoenix/cpwna), e-mailing cactusparkwest@gmail.com, calling Brad at 602-615-9449 or using your smart phone (see next article) to report any graffiti. A huge thank-you in advance for enabling us to rid our neighborhood of this problem.

This grant includes covered areas between 35th Ave – 43rd Ave, Peoria – Cactus, Tumbleweed, Cactus Park, and Moon Valley High School Exterior walls

SCHOOLS OUT.....YOU KNOW WHAT THAT MEANS:

GRAFFITI goes up when school lets out. Know where your kids are and talk to them about defacing property and the consequences you and they can incur if apprehended. Parents, you are liable for your children under 18.

GPC (Graffiti Protective Coatings) has developed a graffiti reporting application available to the residents of the **Cactus Park West community**. This app uses a Smart-phone platform available for free on iPhone, iPad, Android, and Tablets. Residents of CPW can upload this app and report graffiti incidents that will send service request to the GPC technician in real time.

The reporting citizen will also receive feedback via email informing them that the job has been completed. The database will track the address, photos, and removal information available to the CPWNA leadership team.

Simply go to "itunes" on Apple devices or "play Store" on Android devices and download **"MyCPWNA"** and you can start reporting graffiti. All app-orders will be addressed by GPC only in the CPW community.

Any requests that are outside of CPW, belong to the City of Phoenix, call them at 602-495-0323 or email: graffiti.busters.nsd@phoenix.gov. Download **"MyPhxAZ"** and use that app to **request service outside** of the CPW jurisdiction.

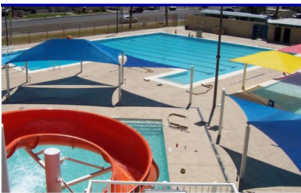

Phoenix's Cortez Pool Reopens May 24, Public Celebration June 6
Councilwoman Thelda Williams will preside over a grand re-opening celebration June 6 for the rebuilt and improved Cortez Pool, 3434 W.

Dunlap Ave.

The pool will reopen for the season with all other city pools on May 24. The June 6 celebration, which is set for 6 to 8 p.m. will be an opportunity for residents to enjoy the pool on a Friday, a day city pools normally are closed. The pool had been closed for the past five seasons due to structural damage.

In the past year, crews rebuilt the entire main pool; constructed a separate shaded kiddie pool with zero-depth entry, play equipment and water jets; and built an entry pool for two new water slides. Additional improvements include shade throughout the pool area, a new turf area, and new LED lighting. The rebuilding project cost \$3.3 million and was funded by the Phoenix Parks and Preserve Initiative.

Cortez Pool's reopening also means another city location for a full selection of lessons and swim programs.

Free and discounted swim classes in Phoenix

Swim classes are an absolute must for children in the valley of the sun. So many pools make for a serious danger

zone. There are plenty of classes with the city of Phoenix that are very inexpensive.

 **Swim classes** There's even some free classes for 7 to 15 year-olds. It's a 5 week program, children are divided by age (7-9, 10-12, 13-15) and 15 kids are allowed in each class. The city of Phoenix also has other classes for children that are reasonably priced (\$15 for 8 sessions). Classes for babies (and mommy's), Levels 1 through 5 plus swim and dive team classes which are more expensive (\$45). Some of those classes are also discounted to \$3, depending on the location.


There are 20 pools throughout the Phoenix area, they're open everyday, except Friday, 1-7pm, \$1 for kids \$3 for adults. People are encouraged to bring their own food, there are only vending machines available.

HELP OUR VETERANS!

Memorial Day has come and gone. There as been a lot of news lately about what is happening to our veterans. At least 350,000 veterans of wars before those in Iraq and Afghanistan have outstanding appeals of benefits decisions, according to VA records. Meanwhile the VA has touted how much it has cut the backlog of benefits claims that have taken longer than 125 days to resolve from 611,000 in 2013 to 344,000 in April.

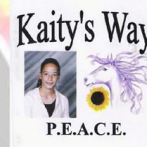

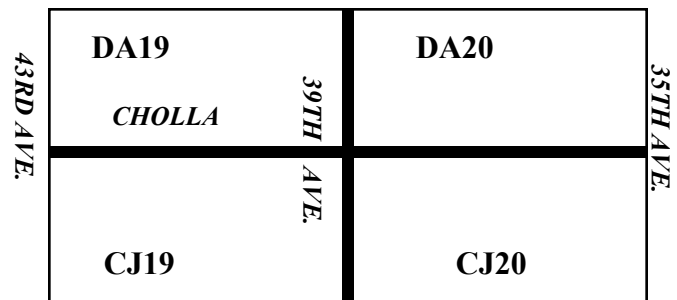
