4 Ways Making Any Computer Password Protected Account More Secure



Security questions are a common and easy way to verify your online identity in the event you lose a password or need to reset your login information. But in a social, connected world, not all security questions and answers are created equal. In fact, some security questions can make your account information even easier to break into. In a high profile example, the Yahoo email account for Sarah Palin, a U.S. vice presidential candidate, was hacked in the months leading up to the 2008 U.S. elections. The hacker simply got her email address, used the password reset prompt and answered her security question-where she met her spouse-which was easy to discover with a quick online search. Here are four simple ways to ensure your security questions and answers are making your accounts as secure as possible. **CREATE YOUR OWN QUESTIONS IF GIVEN THE OPTION**

Some websites will allow you to choose from a list of security questions, while others will allow you to create your own. Whenever possible, create your own. This allows you to create highly-specific questions that prompt answers only you could possibly know: childhood friend's nicknames, favorite gifts you received in your youth, the color of your first car and other specific facts unique.

AVOID RESPONSES FOUND ON SOCIAL MEDIA ACCOUNTS

With more personal information going onto Facebook, LinkedIn and Pinterest pages every day, not to mention many other social sites worldwide, a lot of previously hard-tofind information isn't so hard to find anymore. A couple clicks can deliver correct answers to the following questions and more: Spouse's/mother's maiden name, Hometown, City of birth, Hospital you were born, School mascots, School teachers, Pet names, Children's names, Favorite vacation spots, Favorite books/authors, Favorite movies and TV shows and Type of car you drive. In today's connected social world, it doesn't matter if you're not sharing this info; if a partner, child, friend or classmate is sharing it, your information is exposed. When possible, the best option is to use questions that rely on older, more unique information from your youth or childhood, since that is less likely to appear in social media today.

CONSIDER USING ALTERNATE INFO One way to ensure that nobody can research the responses to your security questions is to use an alternate identity. In other words, answer the questions the way your parents, spouse or friend would answer them. Malicious hackers may be able to find out what your school's mascot was, but knowing to respond with your mother's school mascot would throw off all but the most determined individuals. The hard part isn't answering the questions, of course, it's remembering them. So pick an individual to focus on and be consistent in your replies. **USE A NONSENSICAL PHRASE**

Websites don't check your answers to ensure you've given a "proper" response. So instead of accurately responding to the question "What is vour mother's maiden name?" you could reply with a phrase that only makes sense to you. Maybe it's a youth sports team, a favorite song title or a personal motto or slogan. Anything other than the expected answer will do, as long as it's something you can remember. Security questions make it easy to reset passwords or verify login information in the event that you lose a password or fear that your online identity has been compromised. By following the four suggestions above when you create or update your accounts, you'll make sure your security questions actually make your account as secure as it can be. <u>Neighborhood Preservation Ordinance</u> (Common BlightViolations)

The Neighborhood Preservation Ordinance (NPO) is Chapter 39 of the Phoenix City Code. It was established to prevent and address deterioration, blight and/or hazardous conditions that can negatively impact neighbor-hoods. It provides established minimum property maintenance standards for all structures and proper-ties in the City.

Dispose of trash properly - Property owners are responsible for keeping their property free of junk, litter and debris. This includes tires, junk, furniture, building and landscaping material; litter such as discarded paper, cardboard, plastics, etc.; debris such as tree trimmings and fallen tree limbs; or any other discarded items.

Park in designated areas - All parking & maneuvering areas must be dust proofed according to City specifications. **Remove visible outdoor storage** - Outside storage of personal property at residentially zoned properties is limited to the rear yard behind the primary structure only. Any building or landscaping materials for use on the property, machinery, appliances or parts/ auto parts may not be visible from beyond the boundaries of a residentially zoned property. Outdoor storage of items for commercial or business use at a residential property is not allowed. **Continued on Page 6.....**

1st Death in 2014 from West Nile Virus Confirmed

Maricopa County Public Health Confirms First Death of 2014 from West Nile Virus PHOENIX - After reporting 3 confirmed human cases of West Nile virus infection this season to date, Maricopa County Department of Public Health announced today its first death of the season from the disease. The victim was an east valley gentleman in his early 60s with underlying health issues. "Sadly, there is another victim of West Nile virus, a disease we now see every year," said Dr. Bob England, director of Maricopa County Department of Public Health. "We can't stress enough the importance in all of us doing our part in ridding our properties of standing water, where mosquitoes like to breed. A little effort can go a long way in protecting the whole community from West Nile virus."

West Nile virus can cause severe illness in people and horses, although only about 20% of those infected will develop any symptoms at all, usually flu-like: fever, headache, body aches, and muscle weakness. Some people, especially the elderly, may experience more severe symptoms including high fever, severe headache, neck stiffness, and/or encephalitis or inflammation of brain, which can lead to paralysis or death. "Prevention is the best tool we have", said John Kolman, Director of Maricopa County Environmental Services Department. "We need to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes and also prevent mosquitoes from breeding," Kolman added.

West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of an infected mosquito. Maricopa County Health officials urge all people to "Fight the Bite" and follow simple precautions to avoid mosquitoes and the diseases they may carry:

- 1. Avoid outside activity between dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.
- 2. Wear lightweight clothing that covers your arms and legs and use an insect repellent if you must be outdoors when mosquitoes are active. Always follow the directions on the label.
- 3. Make sure doors and windows have tight fitting screens and remain closed.
- 4. Eliminate mosquito-breeding sites around the home by removing standing water in potted plants, tires, bird baths and other containers where water may collect.
- 5. Ensure that swimming pools and decorative water features are properly maintained. **Continued on Page 5...**

6. Change water in flowerpots, birdbaths and pet watering bowls located outdoors at least twice per week.

West Nile virus was first found in Arizona in 2003. Since then, over 1,000 human cases have been reported. In 2013, Maricopa County experienced a relatively mild West Nile virus season with 52 lab confirmed cases. In 2010, Maricopa County recorded its second worst West Nile virus season with 115 lab confirmed cases. (The worst season was in 2004 with 355 confirmed cases.) Many local vector control programs around the state have been treating mosquito breeding habitats and some counties have been fogging to kill the specific mosquitoes that spread West Nile virus. If you notice green pools in your neighborhood, talk to your neighbors or notify Maricopa County Environmental Services. In Maricopa County, for more information on West Nile virus, to set-up an appointment to obtain mosquito eating fish at no cost to you, to report green pools, file any mosquito related complaint, register on the Fogging Notification System or for WNV materials or presentations for your group/organization, please call the West Nile Virus General Information and Help Line at (602) 506-0700, or visit http:// www.maricopa.gov/wnv



Maintain fences - Fencing and screening walls must be structurally sound and made from the same materials. They also must be maintained so that they are free from deterioration and blight. Some examples include fences or walls that are leaning, missing slats or blocks, rotted or damaged. **Remove inoperable vehicles** - Inoperable vehicles must not be visible from beyond the bounds of the property. An inoperable vehicle is one that is not equipped with all parts that are required to legally and safely operate on public streets and/or cannot be driven under its own power. Car covers, tarps, bamboo, shades and other similar types of materials are not acceptable screening. **Keep vacant buildings secure** - Property owners are responsible for assuring all vacant buildings and structures (including primary structures, garages, storage structures, accessory buildings, sheds, etc) are secured so that windows, doors or other openings cannot be accessed from the outside. A property owner maybe required to board up a building/structure to City specifications if it becomes vacant and is not secure. Boarding up a building/structure is a one time, temporary securement option, for a period not to exceed 180 days. Rehabilitation or demolition of a structure may be required under certain conditions.

Maintain vegetation - Property owners are responsible for keeping their properties, and the adjacent rights of way, free of dead or dried vegetation (weeds, tall grass, tumbleweeds, shrubs, trees, palm fronds, etc). All dead or dried vegetation must be removed and disposed of properly. Property owners are also responsible for assuring that grass and weeds on their property and in the adjacent rights of way do not exceed six inches in height.
