### Message from the President



As I write this note it's a few days after New Year's Eve and I am again reminded that there is an indisputable truth: Our neighborhood really knows how to bring in the New Year. The fireworks-both official and

unofficial-were really spectacular. I believe we are all in agreement that everyone held permits, of course. After the holidays most of our lives are back to normal with politicians working on campaigns while the rest of us are back to work and in our comfort zone of watching Spurs and Cowboys.

Traditionally, JNA holds a political forum prior to elections which affect our neighborhood. This year we plan to have a political forum in lieu of our February 9, 2015 meeting since the special runoff elections are going to be held on February 17th. The following candidates will be invited to speak: State Rep. Trey Martinez Fisher and State Rep. Jose Menendez for the Senate Seat. You will be kept apprised of the forum if there are changes. It is always interesting to meet our candidates and hear their campaign messages. There will be a question and answer session so please start thinking about what you would like to ask these candidates.

Last month I reported that one of our goals was to make our neighborhood a crime free environment and gave a justification for installing pedestrian street lampposts to make our streets safer and more attractive for taking walks. This is under review by Councilman Cris Medina who has requested more information. Other suggestions made include considering placing surveillance cameras throughout the neighborhood to capture license numbers of crime suspects.

Last month I asked for suggestions concerning the goals set for 2015 and got a great response on

Facebook from Adam Vega. He made following suggestions:

1. Donaldson is too wide, both around Jefferson High School and Jefferson Village. Bringing it down a bit, adding sidewalks that aren't immediately next to a busy street would increase pedestrian traffic. In the long run this will save taxpayers money as the maintenance of the road is reduced.

2. Trees. During the summertime it's way to hot to walk along Donaldson. Drought tolerant oaks and other species would help, and give the area a much nicer feel as they mature.

3. Installing a traffic turn around would help control traffic at Manor and Donaldson. They have one at Blanco and Fulton and its done wonders for the walkability of the nearby stores.

4. The space between the Primera Iglesia and Donaldson has an astounding pavement to building/ business ratio. There's got to be a better plan that allows for safe pedestrian crossing.

5. Growing local business always yields more in the long run. We don't have to sell out to some large chain store with endless tax incentives.

You don't always need giant interventions to make change. These are all relatively small projects that should yield plenty of rewards for the local community and businesses.

Bianca Maldonado responded: Attend your neighborhood meetings and lend your support because there will be another City Bond.

Thank you Adam Vega for your great suggestions and thank you Bianca for your advice. Change is possible with your support. Let's band together to keep improving our neighborhood.



**During his time in the public** eye, from his national service, to his service on City Council and his role as the first chair of the City/County Joint Commission on Elderly Affairs, **Bob Ross** made every effort to give voices to the voiceless, to provide a heart to public policy and most importantly, to serve as a role model to untold citizens who always found a

kind word in his statements. He devoted much of his life and efforts raising awareness of senior concerns and issues in San Antonio.

In May 2003, under the leadership of Mr. Ross, the Commission presented a recommendation to City Council and the Bexar County Commissioner's Court that senior one-stop access centers be created in each of the county's four quadrants. Councilman **Art Hall**, Council District 8, responded to the Commission's recommendation and in November 2003, San Antonio and Bexar County voters approved bond funding for creation of the first senior one-stop center to be located in the South Texas Medical Center (Council District 8 and County Precinct 3).

On October 20, 2005, City Council unanimously approved the naming of the future senior one-stop center to the Bob Ross Senior Multi-Service Health and Resource Center.

#### Saving Water Means Saving Money This Season

Using less water this winter can actually lower your SAWS bill. SAWS bases its residential sewer service fee on average use in the winter months when water needs drop dramatically. Winter averaging monitors the amount of water you use during three complete consecutive billing periods between mid-November and mid-March to calculate your sewer fee for the whole year. Fix those leaks and save!



### What's Yours is Mine

At the last JNA meeting on January 12, Robert Saucedo, founder and owner of Pre-Sentence Assistance Services (PSAS), and two probationers presented a home burglary prevention dialogue. PSAS is a free service provided to those who have been arrested for DWI, assault, drugs, or other offense, and need help, advice and guidance. PSAS is not a law firm and does not work for attorneys. They are a group of legal advisors, criminal law specialists, retired probation officers and former prosecutors who joined together to offer free legal advice, and diversion plans to defend against lengthy probation or prison sentences, enhance opportunities for reduced or dismissed sentences, or help probationers qualify for early probation release.

They offered the following tips to help keep your household safe from burglers:

- · Lock your doors, even when you're home
- Keep bushes trimmed below windows
- Windows are the most comon entry point
- If you have a privacy fence take extra measures to secure the enclosed area, burglars love privacy
- · Cameras and alarm signs are sometimes a deterrent
- A big dog in the back yard, or a Chihuahua inside is sometimes a deterrent
- If you're hit, get fingerprints from any hard surfaces on the car or house
- Take pictures of your property with serial numbers because pawn shops must get the serial numbers of pawned goods plus the ID of the pawner
- When a service or repairman is over don't give out too much information about yourself
- When you get new appliances don't leave boxes on the street for trash collection, break them down and put them in the recycle bin
- Burglers look for predictable times when occupants are gone, it's the number one thing they want to know
- Burglers usually knock first to see if anyone is home
- The first target of thieves is the master bedroom
- Order of things burglers want: Cash and creditcards; jewlery; drugs; electronics; guns; tools; household goods; liquor; and ID information
- Communicate with your neighbors
- Tell the neighbors when you will be away from home
- Don't leave trash bins on the street for extended periods, get neighbors to move them in
- · Leave a TV or radio on when you're gone
- Call police if anything looks out of place

### SAPD, Social Network Nextdoor Announce Partnership

The San Antonio Police Department has announced a partnership with Nextdoor, a private social network for neighbors, in an effort to improve safety and communication across the city.

Nextdoor is a free service available both online or through their smartphone app, and allows residents to communicate with one another on a variety of topics related to their neighborhood.

"What this is going to allow us to do is tie our communities close together in an effort to prevent crime, increase awareness in neighbors, and really get neighbors to get to know neighbors through this social media platform," said Chief Anthony Trevino.

According to Trevino, there are 420 communities in San Antonio, and 60 percent of them are already using the service. The goal, Trevino said, is to get the remaining 40 percent to take part, as well.

When a resident signs up for the service, they must undergo a verification process to be able to access information in their particular neighborhood.
