# **Aircraft Noise Bothering You?**

Has it seemed to you that more planes are flying over our neighborhood than before? If so, you may want to track the time and number of them and then call the Federal Aviation Authority on their 24-hour a day, 7 day a week line, 210-207-3471. As part of the larger San Antonio community, we need to bear our fair share of incoming and outgoing flight paths, but it is unreasonable for us to be subjected to more than our share.

The runway that affects us is Number 4, and part of the Jefferson Neighborhood is on the highest density approach path to that runway. In the past couple years some runway repair projects have steered much more air traffic our way. Even so, per the Noise Exposure Map Update and Noise Compatibility Program Revision San Antonio International Airport December 2014, (available online at http://www.sanantonio.gov/Aviation/EnvironmentalStewardship/Noise.aspx) runway 4 is projected to carry only 9% of all incoming and 7% of all outgoing air traffic from 2014-2019. At minimum we should be generating lots of credit for the extra air traffic over our heads.

If the noise bugs you, please call. Use specifically the term "annoyed" or "highly annoyed" and it will be registered. If enough people are bothered and speak up, adjustments can and ought to be made. Call 210-207-3471.

A note: Since February, it has seemed to me that we have had somewhat less air traffic than in the recent past. Mid-February, I received a call from the Environmental Manager with whom I shared my concerns and spoke to the report's promise of 9% and 7% average overflight. The manager was responding to my earlier "annoyed" complaint and his was intended to be the second follow-up; apparently the complaint had some impact. I believe the key to any complaint is to keep in mind that we need to bear our fair share, but if it seems we are seeing more planes over our community than we ought, then we should call.

#### JNA SCHOLARSHIPS



For many people, their home is their biggest financial investment. Here are two low cost ways to significantly raise the value of your home.

#### 1. Invest in Landscaping

According to the 2012 HomeGain Home Improvement Survey, investing in landscaping generates an average return on investment of 215 percent. The same study found that over 90 percent of real estate agents recommend that clients invest in some professional landscaping prior to selling.

Not ready to invest 10 percent of the value of the home in landscaping, as the American Society of Landscaping Architects (*www.asla.org*) recommends? Then at least make sure the lawn is green, mowed and raked at all times.

#### 2. A New Front Door

The annual Cost vs. Value Report put out by Remodeling magazine identified a new steel front door as one of the top value-enhancing improvements sellers can make to a house that actually adds value, above and beyond the cost of the repair, on average.

In fact, a new entry or door was the only renovation or improvement studied that did, in fact, earn its keep by generating about 101 percent of its cost in resale value. If the front door is old or unsightly, this is a no-brainer for boosting a home's curb appeal.

## The Gardener's Corner


I do not profess to be a Master Gardener, but I do have some experience with certain plants and enjoy working in the yard. My goal is to give you some tips for gardening.

As the days become longer and warmer it is time to start working in our yards again. Gazing at my back yard I am always charmed by the lush color of green in early spring. Closer inspection always reveals, darn it, every year, that it is not from carpet grass; instead it is from dandelions and crabgrass. I suspect that most of you can identify with this situation.

But in your heart you know that the time has come to start pulling weeds. Since weed killers are harmful to tree roots, shrubs and the environment, it's a good idea not to use them. I have lost some plants by taking the shortcut using weed killers and have learned the damage it can do to the rest of the yard. So back to the weed puller and pointy garden trowel. The best time to pull weeds is right after a rain when the ground is moist. Sometimes I cheat and water the yard the night before I begin the project.

After pulling the weeds you're likely to find the need to plant grass where the weeds had taken over. It's time to decide what type of grass you want to plant. There are many types of grass to choose from, but I have lived in the neighborhood for most of my life and am partial to St. Augustine. During my formative years living in this neighborhood I recall St. Augustine and Bermuda grass were most prevalent.

While St. Augustine is more work, it is well worth the effort. It entails digging between 2 to 4 inches, leveling the ground, planting the sod and watering until established.



Bermuda grass is much easier to plant. All one needs to do is rake the ground, sow the seeds and water daily until the grass is established. Bermuda grass has its benefits. It tends to choke out weeds and it is drought tolerant. During August and September though, it will turn brown without rain water. It seems to need the nitrogen from the rain more than just tap water can provide. St. Augustine, on the other hand, can tolerate the summer heat more easily during July, August, and September if watered once a week for two hours. It thrives in the sun and is less invasive and better for gardens. If the temperature is in the three digits you will need to water twice a week for two hours. The key is deep roots and deep watering. Sprinkling water daily only damages the roots.

The weather in San Antonio is unpredictable at times. Some years we have El Nino, a time when it rains frequently and floods. During this time the gardens can become lush with monkey grass, Ajuga, and other tropical plants. Then there are years in which we experience droughts that last for years. During this time, xeriscaping works best in planting gardens. However, these plants, even though they may be indigenous, do not do well during the rainy seasons. I try to have some of both types of gardens and keep them separated.

If it's not too wet this spring, I suggest planting beautiful yellow Esperanzas and purple Plumbagos which are both perennial. I also like annuals such as orange Mexican Zinnias, which hang in there during the heat of the summer.

Remember there all types of chemicals on the market. I suggest organic environmentally friendly ones. There are also different types of grass and I suggest you do some research to determine which one is best for your yard.

Some types of grass and turf are excellent for shade while others need sunlight. Some types of grass and turf are great for foot traffic, like grass used on golf courses, while others are not so tolerant. The chart below is a guide to help you make your selections.
