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## Medical ID Theft

It just happened and apparently medical info brings more per name on the black market than even credit card numbers. Let's start with things you should know.

Cash paying patients seeing doctors who keep paper charts are SAFE. Unless someone breaks into the doctor's office and ransacks his/her chart room.



The rest of you are at risk. Even if your doctor uses paper charts, if you want your visit paid by an insurance company, the doctor has to file a claim. Very few insurances permit paper claims. Usually the claim is sent and stored electronically and therefore at risk for hacking. That's your name, address, date of birth, diagnosis, visit date, and policy number. If you're a Medicare patient, your identifier contains your social security number. If your doctor follows the mandate and keeps electronic records, just about everything about you can be exposed.

### WHAT TO DO?

Clark Howard, a nationally syndicated radio host, says a CREDIT FREEZE is one way to go. This makes it impossible for anyone to open accounts and run up big bills in your name. Details are at [clarkhoward.com](http://clarkhoward.com). Please know I don't have any connection with Clark. I just follow his guidelines and have never gotten into trouble.

Also consider checking with your bank to see how they prevent a stranger from claiming to be you and attempting withdrawals.

And if you bank online, ask about TWO STEP AUTHENTICATION. Kim Komando at [Komando.com](http://Komando.com) has some tips on how to do that.

**BOTTOM LINE:** In truth, your private information will get where it doesn't belong. So be defensive now! Fix it so your info is useless and the crook goes to the next name on his list.

## Former Northpark (Northgate) Mall Site to Become 'Metro31'



El Paso's City Council approved plans for a 31-acre transit-oriented mixed-use project slated for the former Northpark Mall site at the corner of Dyer Street and Diana Drive. The project, submitted by El Paso-based Hunt Companies, Inc. (Hunt) and called "Metro 31", will employ SmartCode development and will consist of 325 units of Class A apartments, 80 units of affordable senior housing and 48 Live/Work units featuring contemporary open floor plans and upscale finishes with resort-style amenities – according to Hunt's website.

The property's uses can roughly be categorized into three areas, the largest being the residential section that takes up nearly the eastern half of the development. The central area and southwest corner contain mainly retail and office uses, and the northwest corner is dedicated to transit and includes a Sun Metro BRIO terminal for northeast bus rapid transit with covered parking for commuters and a transit plaza



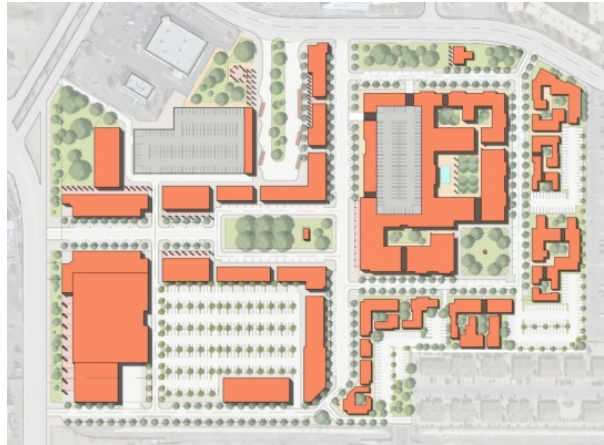
*An artistic rendering of the western entrance to the Metro 31 development off of Diana Street, coming to Northeast El Paso in the next few years.*

## ***Architectural Character and Design***

*Through its varied massing, diverse frontages, and architectural variety, the Metro 31 plan envisions a vibrant mixed-use village that captures the visual interest of its residents and users, while offering rich opportunities for places to shop, live, work and be entertained for all El Pasoans.*

offering transfers to regional and area destinations. According to Gary Sapp, Executive Vice President of Hunt Companies, Inc., the intent is for Metro 31 to not only be the best development in the Northeast, but for it to be the best development in the entire city of El Paso.

Site plan data shows the project includes 135,115 square feet of retail space and approximately 100,000 square feet of office space. Included in the retail area is a 50,000 square foot grocery store. Sapp said tenets weren't being solicited during the early planning stages with the City. Since the plans were approved this past December, Hunt has initiated aggressive recruiting.



Currently, the site is bordered on the east and south sides with open drainage channels. These will be converted into landscaped "urban arroyos" with trail access for pedestrians. Additionally, the plans call for numerous water management elements such as storm water harvesting from roofs and garages; cistern storage for irrigation; pervious paving for groundwater recharge and will

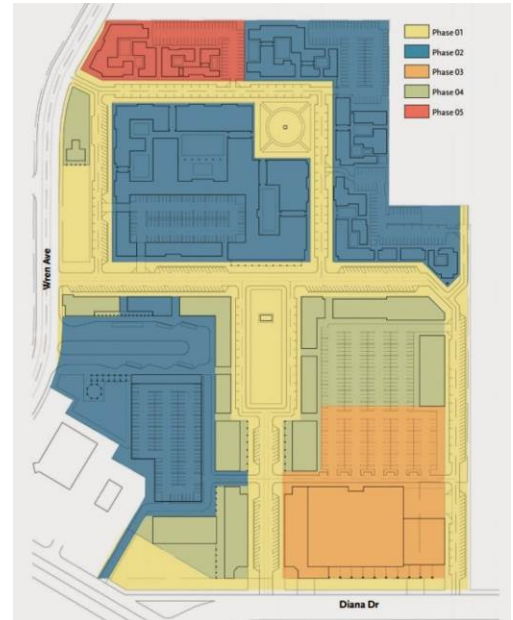
serve as a model for future development in our arid region.

The development documents also include a phasing plan, indicating the project will go up in five phases. Phase 1 includes building streets, parks, and other infrastructure; Phase 2 will see the construction of the majority of market-rate apartment buildings as well as the transit facility; and Phase 3 involves construction of the grocery store.

Phase 4 includes construction of the retail/office structures, some of which will include loft apartments on the upper floors. And Phase 5 will see construction of the affordable housing apartments.

Vertical construction may not be seen for a few years, according the development agreement's timeline. Completion of Phase 1's infrastructure is tentatively scheduled for June of 2017. However, the agreement also states that phases may be completed in any order and concurrently if needed.

The ultimate design of the project may also change, with final design documents due on September 1, 2015.



## Motorist Information

### Step One

Pass a vehicle inspection and retain the vehicle inspection report issued by the station.

### Step Two

Renew your annual registration by mail, online or in person, and your inspection status will be verified electronically. A passing inspection is required for registration.

If your vehicle passed inspection, but the system is unable to electronically verify it, simply present your valid, passing inspection report (VIR) at the time of registration.

## Get Ready for the Texas Two Step



The state of Texas recently (March 1, 2015) stopped issuing vehicle inspection stickers as part of its migration to a “Two Steps, One Sticker” inspection and registration program. Under this new system, Texas vehicle owners will need to pass inspection prior to renewing their registration. As a result of Texas House Bill 2305 passed during the 83rd legislative session, vehicle owners will now be issued one sticker as proof of inspection and registration. Inspection stations will no longer issue inspection stickers. The Texas Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) will cooperatively administer the Two Steps, One Sticker program.

The Texas DMV sends a renewal notice to vehicle owners 90 days prior to registration expiration. The renewal notice breaks out the registration fee, any local (county) fees, and mailing fees. Renewals can be done through the mail, in person at the county or a contract location, or online.

This first year of the program will be a transition period to allow vehicles’ inspection and registration expiration dates to align. During this period (now through February 29, 2016), a vehicle having a current (unexpired) vehicle inspection at time of registration will be allowed to register. This will facilitate syncing of the registration and inspection expirations within the 90 day window in the second year.

Commercial vehicles will continue to follow the current annual inspection requirement, and will not be affected by the 90 day registration window. DMV renewal notices will now contain a line item for state portion of the inspection fees. Remember that a current, passing inspection is required for registration renewal.

Going forward beginning in the second year of the program (March 2016 and beyond), all vehicles, with the exception of those required to obtain a commercial inspection, will be required to obtain a passing inspection within 90 days of their registration expiration. Your inspection and registration will expire at the end of the month shown on your registration sticker. Registration will still be available through the mail, in person at the county or contract location, or online.

The Texas DMV touts four benefits to “Two Steps, One Sticker”. Once your current expiration dates are synched, you just have one sticker with one expiration date. This results in less clutter and a better view – you just have the familiar blue-bordered registration sticker in the corner of your windshield. Because a passing vehicle inspection is a requirement to renew your registration, more Texans will comply with the safety and emissions testing laws, resulting in safer and more environmentally-sound cars on the road. And finally, with inspection stickers no longer needed under “Two Steps, One Sticker,” this change will eliminate the risk of inspection sticker fraud and theft.

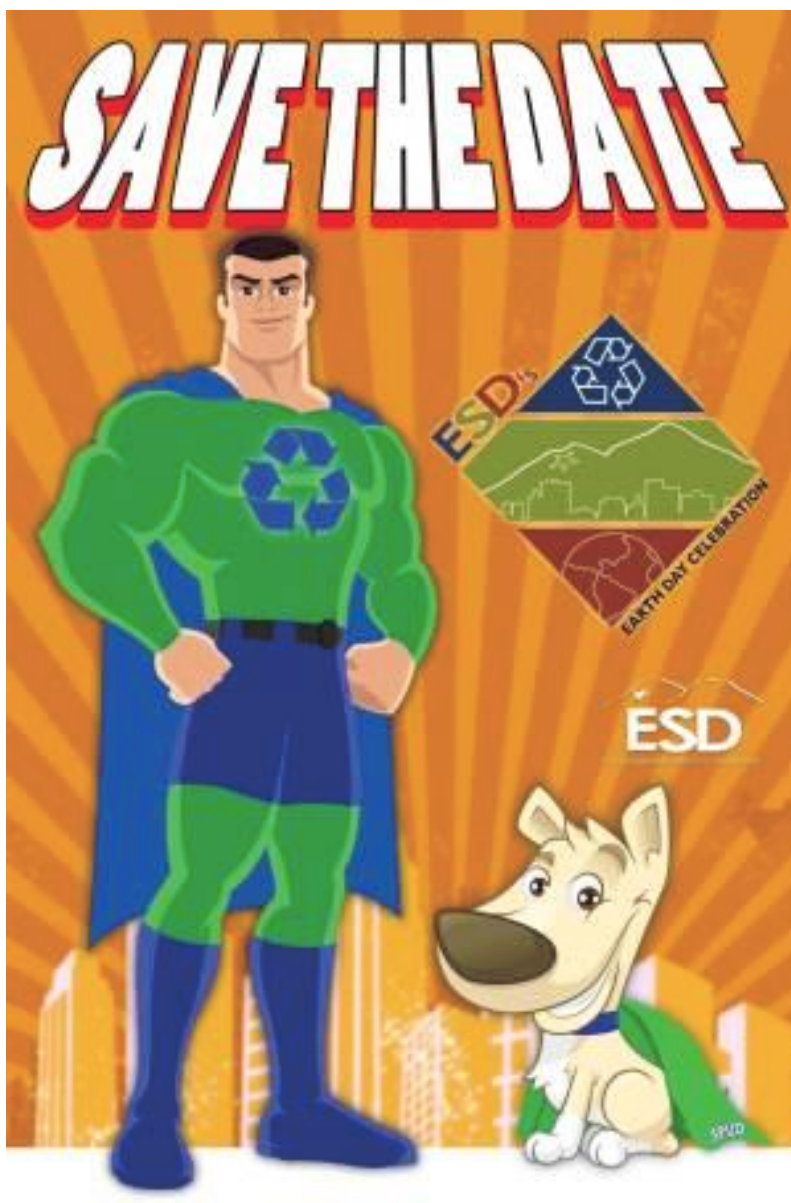
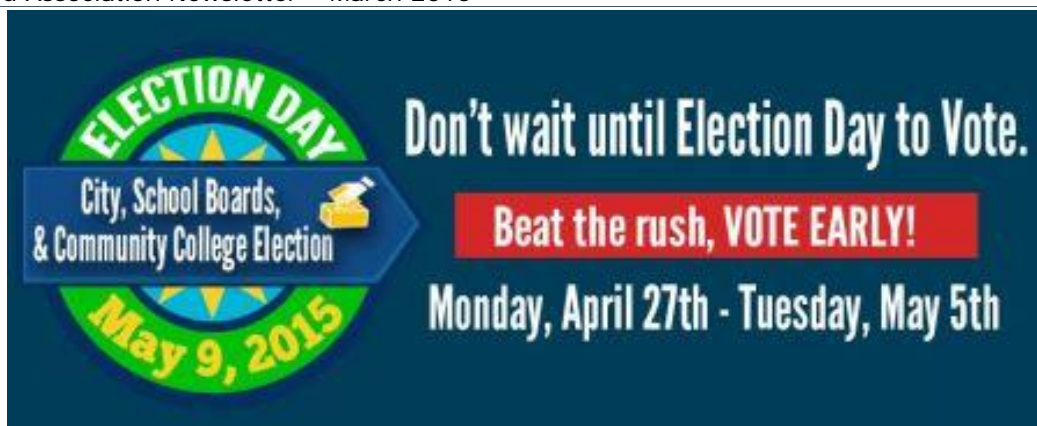

## Easy Way to Invest in Our Future

As Whitney Houston told us in her 1986 rendition of the Michael Masser/Linda Creed song Greatest Love of All, "... the children are our future. Teach them well and let them lead the way."

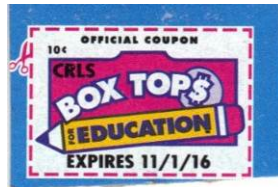
Decades of research established the criticality of childhood mental, emotional and social development on future success for our kids. However, scholastic funding has struggled to keep up with the increasing demands. One way to help get additional funding to our local school without resorting to increased taxes is to support Whitaker Elementary School's participation in two commercial programs: Box Tops for Education and Labels for Education.



### Simple Participation

- Locate and clip participating product UPCs beverage/sauce caps or Box Top Coupon
- Turn them in to Whitaker Elementary School office

No extra fundraising, buying or selling required



**Box Tops for Education** is a program administered by General Mills, Incorporated – the American multinational manufacturer of consumer foods, headquartered near Minneapolis, Minnesota. Established in 1880 to produce Gold Medal Flour, General Mills has increased their brand portfolio to include many cereals, baking products, snacks, frozen foods, meals, and yogurt.

General Mills started the Box Tops for Education program in 1996 and has since partnered with Boise (makers of office paper, labels, and wood pulp products), Expedia (the on-line travel company), Hanes, Hefty, Horizon Organics (producers of organic dairy products), Land O' Lakes, Walmart and Ziploc.

This program works by having families and community members collect box tops on hundreds of products described above and providing them to the school's Box Tops Coordinator who will send them in to be redeemed for cash. Each Box Top is worth 10 cents, but that adds up quickly. Checks are mailed to the school twice a year, in April and December. Occasionally, stores hold promotions where they give away extra Box Tops at checkout.



**Labels for Education** is a program administered by the Campbell Soup Company, headquartered in Camden, New Jersey. Established in 1869 to produce canned tomatoes, vegetables, jellies, soups, condiments and minced meats; it has grown into a global food company with an expanded brand portfolio that extends beyond soup to foods such as cookies, crackers, biscuits, beverages, carrots and dressings, baby food, broths, pasta sauces and Mexican sauces. The Campbell Soup Company started the Labels for Education program in 1973 and has since partnered with several other companies, including Diamond Foods, Post Foods, Glad (makers of trash bags and plastic food storage containers), Société Bic (commonly known simply as Bic – makers of disposable consumer products such as pens, lighters, razors, and printed paper products), and the Dannon Company (the American division of Groupe Danone – makers of dairy products, waters, early life nutrition products, and medical nutrition products).

This program works by having families and community members collect UPCs and beverage/sauce caps from over 2,500 products from the companies listed above to earn schools points that can be redeemed for arts, athletics, and academics merchandise.

Through both of these programs, it is easy to support Whitaker Elementary. Simply shop as you normally do, clip the participating product UPCs, beverage/sauce caps or Box Top Coupons; and give them to Whitaker's office staff for the respective program coordinators. The Box Tops for Education coupons and Labels for Education UPCs/caps can be collected throughout the year, benefiting Whitaker Elementary and there is no extra fundraising, buying or selling required. This simple, easy act will help increase Whitaker Elementary School's resources to apply towards materials and activities not covered in the school budget in order to enhance the education of our children – the future. As the late Miss Houston sang, "Give them a sense of pride to make it easier. "
