GPC (Graffiti Protective Coatings) has developed a graffiti reporting application available to the residents of the *Cactus Park West community*. This app uses a Smartphone platform available for free on iPhone, iPad, Android, and Tablets. Residents of CPW can upload this app and report graffiti incidents that will send service request to the GPC technician in real time.

The reporting citizen will also receive feedback via email informing them that the job has been completed. The database will track the address, photos, and removal information available to the CPWNA leadership team.

Simply go to "itunes" on Apple devices or "play Store" on Android devices and *download* <u>"MyCPWNA"</u> and you can start reporting graffiti. All app-orders will be addressed by GPC only in the CPW community.



On April 20, 2015, Tumbleweed received a very generous donation from CCV. They provided gift baskets for our "Be Cool Come to School" winners. In addition we received over 100 backpacks, 200 hygiene kits and 20 sports balls, including basketballs, soccer balls and footballs.

From Neighbor, Jason Laube:

When our CCV church group first heard about the needs at Tumbleweed Elementary we wanted to help out in any way we could. Our theme this year is "love our neighbor." We started collecting hygiene products to make kits for the kids who would not usually be able to afford the necessities like hygiene products. Our original goal was to make 100 kits, but when all was said and done we ended up collecting enough to make 700 kits. We donated 200 to Tumbleweed, along with some needed sports equipment and also 100 back packs which were collected from Leap of Faith Plus Dance Studio.

We were not only able to make an impact on Tumbleweed, but we blessed Arroyo and Sweetwater with 100 kits each. Washington Elementary School District contacted us when the learned we were collecting hygiene products. We donated 300 dental kits to their Refugee Parents Event in April.

All told we collected over 1,500 toothbrushes and toothpaste and 1,000 floss. We also collected over 800 combs, 650 wash cloths, soap and shampoo. We had most items donated by great dental offices in our neighborhood, co-workers, other CCV church groups and a donation from the Cactus Park West Neighborhood Association. We lacked certain items so my group held a big yard sale to raise money to purchase the rest. We raised \$1,500 in one weekend! BURNED HOUSE ON POINSETTIA

In October, we received a complaint about the house located at 3442 West Poinsettia. It had suffered catastrophic structure damage during several fires. There was no way to restore the house to a livable home, so we worked with Neighborhood Services to begin the demolition process.

This takes a long time and needs to go through required processes to ensure the rights of the owner and follow certain regulatory guidelines; to include federal environmental laws. During this process, we continued to receive complaints about weeds growing too high, trespassing and that the security fence around the building needed to be re-secured many times.

The good news is that the City responded to all of the complaints in a timely manner to secure the location, no one was reportedly injured while trespassing on the dangerous property and the required processes are almost complete! This means that the house is in the final legal proceedings and a demolition hearing is scheduled for June 10th. There is a 15-30 day appeal process, but City staff will be preparing the property for demolition during this time. Our hope is that the structure will be gone and the property will be cleaned up at the end of June or the beginning of July!

They are frightened, confused and upset. They've seen drugs, domestic violence and abuse. Local shelters are overcrowded or not equipped to safeguard these children. Their next few hours are in transit and chaos as the Department of Children's Services has no place to secure them. They are driven around in the darkened cars of social workers and try to sleep under the halogen lights of city offices. It is one thing to be taken out of an abusive home and another to be abused by a system that seems not to care.

The truth is that there are so many caring hearts *at* DCS and the City trying to aid these brave little survivors but they need all of us to pitch in, raise resources, volunteer, provide supplies and work with their offices to create lasting change. Childhelp, the Department of Child Safety and the City of Phoenix are rushing to the rescue to create a safe haven by converting space at the Childhelp Children's Advocacy Center for 6 to 9 months. Children between the ages of birth-10 will remain 24 to 48 hours as their cases are triaged and permanent placement is determined. We already have 30 beds donated and are in the process of outfitting rooms. To be complete, each of the 13 rooms will require \$1,000 of furniture, bedding, wall-hangings, toys

Discounted swim classes in Phoenix

Swim Class Registration began May 14, City Pools Opened May 23. Registration for the Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department's affordable swim classes

and aquatics activities for summer 2015 began, May 14. The schedule is <u>viewable online</u>. Information also is available by calling 602-534-6587 or e-mailing <u>aquatics.pks@phoenix.gov</u>.

Swimming lessons cost \$15 for a two-week session. Semi -private lessons also are available on weekends at select pools for \$45. Lessons are offered for all ages, including adults and seniors. Options also include swim, dive and water basketball teams.

The city's 29 pools will be open from May 23 to 25 (Memorial Day weekend) and May 30 to July 26. Regular hours of operation will be 1 to 7 p.m., six days a week (all pools will be closed on Fridays). Eleven pools also will remain open during weekends in August through Labor Day.*

Daily admission at city pools is \$3 for adults, and \$1 for children and seniors. A season pass for a family of four costs \$75 (\$7 for each additional family member), while an adult season pass is \$30 and a child/senior pass is \$20.

Admission at 20 pool locations is free for children age 17 and younger through the Kool Kids program, which provides a safe and healthy alternative for youth in at-risk neighborhoods.** The program is made possible thanks to financial support from the Milwaukee Brewers, Salt River Project, Sonic and Watermill Express.

* The pools open on weekends in August through Labor Day are Cortez, El Prado, Encanto, Falcon, Hermoso, Maryvale, Paradise Valley, Pecos, Perry, Sunnyslope and Washington.

** The pools at which the Kool Kids program is supported are Alkire, Cielito, Coronado, Eastlake, El Prado, Encanto, Falcon, Grant, Harmon, Hermoso, Holiday, Madison, Marivue, Maryvale, Perry, Pierce, Roosevelt, Starlight, University and Washington.

Calling the Police

Many of our community members are unsure of how and when to report suspicious even criminal activity. Let's have a quick how to or refresher for all our community members.



First and easiest, if a crime is in progress call 911 IMME-DIATELY. Give the dispatcher detailed information as to what you are seeing. Be a good witness and give gender, race, a physical description and clothing of the people involved. If a vehicle is involved give make, model, color and the license plate if possible. Do not place yourself in harms way to get this information. Do the best you can from a safe location and distance. If you are comfortable with your position and can snap a photo of the people or vehicle that may also assist in the investigation.

Second, when you see something that doesn't look quite

right, out of the ordinary, or a bit 'off' call Crime Stop 602-262-6151. Please don't call your friends, neighbors, Block Watch Captains or post first. You will have plenty of time to do these things after you notify the police. In addition, the sooner the police are notified the sooner they can respond.

Third, don't second guess yourself. If it doesn't look right it probably isn't. Who knows the neighborhood better than the people living there?? It is not going to hurt to call. (Yes, there are other calls and yes we are busy, but you and your community are important too). The dispatcher will prioritize the call accordingly. Just call!! So, there you have it...very simple. CALL THE POLICE FIRST!

A quick thinking neighbor did that....

On 4/28, I was in my home office and heard some loud sounds, like something being dropped. I looked out my window the second time I heard it and didn't see any-thing.

That sound sounded very different to an alert neighbor behind me and he witnessed a man trying to kick in the door of a nearby house. He immediately called the police who arrived in minutes and apprehended the lookout driver who was in a stolen BMW parked a few houses down. The thief got away, but without his stolen goods that he had piled in the center of the room. This all happen in broad daylight when most people were at work. Many thanks to neighbor, Mr. Walker for his immediate action and the Phoenix Police Department for their quick response to a crime in progress.

Some common sense things you can do to protect your-self and property:

- 1. Trim vegetation away from doors and windows.
- Lock your car, and the doors and windows to your home. Put a stick or pipe in the window if you have a window open for air.
- 3. Get a security door for that extra barrier.
- 4. Keep your radio on when you are gone to keep the criminals guessing.
- 5. Report suspicious cars or other activities that seem odd.
- 6. Talk to your neighbors. Get email addresses and phone numbers of the people surrounding you so you can be in contact with them in case of an emergency.

According to the National Safety Council, having working smoke alarms in every bedroom and common area on each floor is the best way to be alerted to a fire. Smoke alarms save lives. Three out of five home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms If your smoke alarms are powered by a battery, make sure the battery is fresh. You should test them every month to make sure they work and replace the battery at least once a year, according to the National Fire Protection Association. If the alarm makes a "chirping" **sound, replace it immediately.**


