Funding for San Antonio Parks

During the 84th Legislative Session, Representative **Trey Martinez Fischer** and Representative **Justin Rodriguez** successfully passed an amendment to the state budget securing funding to provide \$3 million in matching grants to four San Antonio parks. The rider by Representatives Martinez Fischer and Rodriguez is included in the final state budget that was signed into law on June 20, 2015. In fiscal year 2016, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will allocate \$3,000,000 in matching grants for the following parks in the city of San Antonio in the following amounts: **Hardberger Park:** \$1,000,000; **Rosedale Park:** \$250,000; **Monterrey Park:** \$250,000; and **Woodlawn Lake Park:** \$1,500,000.

The rider stipulates that "grants to Woodlawn Lake Park shall be made in coordination with the City of San Antonio and its development of a library or activity center in or adjacent to the park." The City of San Antonio's Parks and Recreation Department will be meeting with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) at the end of August and will then outline a public engagement process with stakeholders to include finalizing the project scope. Airport Noise Update

Have you noticed that there are fewer planes flying over our houses in the last couple months? The planes we hear are almost always the arrivals using Runway 4 at the San Antonio International Airport, and there have been measurably fewer recently.

Departures for planes leaving the airport and climbing in the airspace above our neighborhood are from runway 22 (the other end of runway 4) and typically don't cause much noise for us because the planes climb so rapidly. The Jefferson area is, however, right in the middle of the flight path for runway 4, and is, thankfully, supposed to be one of the least used for the next several years, according to the FAA mandated noise report submitted December 2014.

At a JNA member's request, **Steve Southers**, Environmental Stewardship Manager for the San Antonio Airport System, performed a study of the percentage of plane arrivals on runway 4 for this year compared to all arrivals on all runways. Here are the results: for the first quarter of 2015 (Q1), the percentage was 13% of all arrivals using runway 4. For the last time measured (mid-June) the percentage is a much more livable 5%, making the first half of 2015 (H1) average work out to about 9.2%. According to Mr. Southers, the choice of runway is finally the airport controller's and the pilots'. He states that because of prevailing winds, Q1's and Q4's numbers are usually higher than for the rest of the year. The FAA report sets the goal for runway 4's arrival percentage at 9% and 7% for departures on runway 22. Although the actual arrival percentage was off goal by quite a bit in Q1, it is now closer to the estimate.

Regarding complaints, the airport aviation department answering machine states that voicing a complaint has no impact, but letting local officials know if you believe there are excessive fly overs cannot hurt and may help keep our area a little quieter. If you do choose to voice a complaint, your statement will have much more impact if you make accurate counts (ideally with visual confirmation) of date, time and number of planes and state that you are "annoyed" or "very annoyed." As I've said before, I believe our neighborhood has good citizens who want to do their fair share in absorbing the discomfort of the noise, but vigilance helps to ensure that we don't get taken advantage of as a neighborhood.

To say that **Bihl Haus Arts** has put our Jefferson/Monticello neighborhood "on the map" in the art community is an understatement. The **Go! Arts Program** which offers art, poetry and writing classes to seniors through out the city, and the **On and Off Fredericksburg Rd Studio Tour**, an annual event that has grown to become an acclaimed and respected artist studio tour inviting guests to visit and purchase works from our many neighborhood artists, are just a couple of examples of "community" BHA nurtures.

Living up its mission statement: **Creating Community through the Arts**, Bihl Haus Arts is founded on the belief that each person, when given a chance, will achieve significant personal, social, and cultural growth through the arts.

In 2005 neighborhood residents led by **Eric F. Lane** got solidly behind a project to restore the dilapidated and crumbling Bihl house that dominated the northeast corner of the property that would become Primrose at Monticello Senior Apartments.

With vision and passion, **Dr. Kellen Kee McIntyre** proposed that the Bihl house be redesigned as a multi-use community arts space to meet the needs of both residents of the Primrose at Monticello Park Senior Apartments and the surrounding neighborhoods.

Many local artists, poets and writers have had shows at the Bihl Haus Arts Gallery, too many to mention here, but all passionate about their works. Personally, I have attended many of the Bihl Haus exhibit openings, they are always great fun. Kellen McIntyre pairs the wine, music and food with the featured artist and their exhibit; dancing in the moonlight around the pool is always encouraged! I'm still talking about the Mojitos and Cuban artist Adrian Rumbaut; his exhibit at the Bihl Haus a couple of years ago was amazing, and a testament to the reach the Bihl Haus strives for.

The diversity of the artists and exhibits is part of the charm the Bihl Haus brings to our community; one always takes away a new perspective, sometimes aesthetic, sometimes disturbing, always thought provoking.

Sen. Menendez VIA Bus Tour

On Saturday, June 27, I represented the Jefferson Neighborhood Association for District 26 **Senator Jose Menendez's** VIA bus tour. After a complimentary meal served at the VIA main office, VIA president/CEO **Jeffrey Arndt** spoke on the transit system's efficiency and highest rating in the country. The bus tour which followed included stops at the Alamo and South Texas Medical Center. Senator Menendez pointed out that he proposed legislation, which passed, placing the Alamo under state control. This ensured allocation of \$52 million for needed repairs and upkeep. The Senator also spoke about the pending designation of the Alamo as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO, which would put the shrine in an elite category.* Another interesting portion of the tour included visiting the Babcock VIA transit station. Information was given about the newest transit center in downtown San Antonio which will be completed in the fall. Our tour transportation on Saturday was aboard one of the Primo buses. These buses are available for rental by groups or organizations for private tours.

6th Annual Citizen Preparedness Workshop

The **San Antonio Office of Emergency Management (SAOEM)**, in support of National Preparedness Month, invites you to the 6th annual Citizen Preparedness Workshop. The workshop encourages San Antonio residents to create a preparedness culture. This interactive training prepares participants to be preparedness leaders in their neighborhoods and communities.

This year the workshop will consist of **Active Bystander Training**. The goal of this training is to strengthen the role of bystanders who help at the scene of an emergency. Over the past several decades, the United States has experienced a rise in the number of manmade and natural disasters and other tragedies like motor vehicle accidents and house fires affect individuals every day. A common theme emerging from these experiences is the importance of bystanders - people at the scene of an emergency who are not part of the formal emergency response system. Typically, there are not enough responders immediately available after an emergency, and often they do not have immediate access to those who require assistance after an event. Bystanders can and do save lives when they step forward to help.

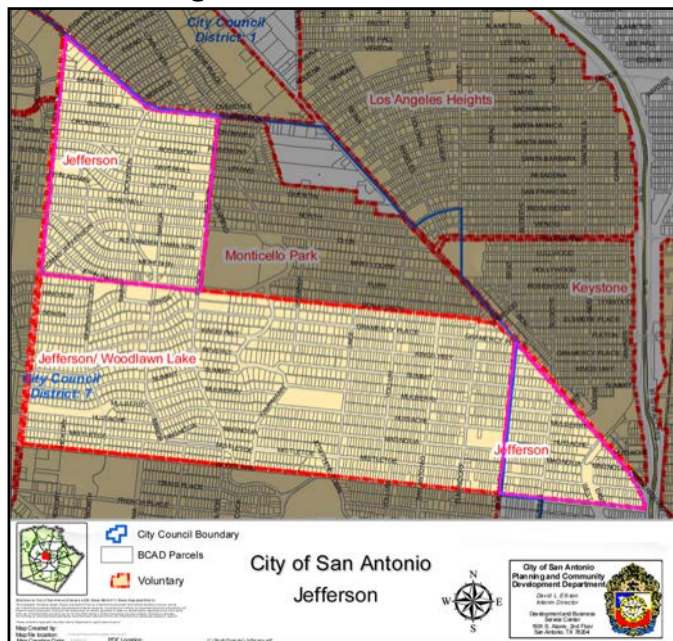

On Monday July 20, 2015 I read an interesting article written by **Elaine Ayala**, Opinion Columnist for the San Antonio Express News and mySA.com. She wrote about the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund MALDEF and how they were recently "honored and given an award for the service to the nation by the San Antonio Association of Hispanic Journalists."

She went on to say that "it was founded in San Antonio in 1968 at the height of the Civil Rights movement" ... and how "MALDEF has challenged discrimination against Latinos in every sector of life, including education, housing, employment and voting."

After reading a few more lines, I saw that **Al Kauffman**, my neighbor and a JNA Member was mentioned. He is a Professor of Law at St Mary's University. **Marisa Bono** the Interim Regional Counsel who accepted the award on behalf of MADFE, acknowledged Al as "the Great Al Kauffman" the first person to win a ruling from the Texas Supreme Court finding the inequities in our public school system unconstitutional. It was the Edgewood case "in the late 80's when a group of parents... were "fed up with the substandard educational opportunities for their kids... because they lived in a low income school district."

As I read about my neighbor, the unassuming, cordial man with a smile on his face who lives in a home two doors away separated only by a street corner I thought: now I understand why when someone asks about my neighbors and I mention Al Kauffman, I get a unanimous positive response. He is such a nice person. Now I know what everyone else knows.

Jefferson is a great neighborhood!

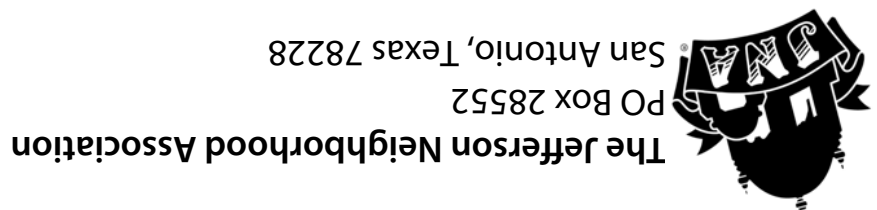
