"Strong neighbors build strong communities, forging and building relationships that become the enduring mortar that unites."

Nestled in an obscure storefront in Jefferson Village resides a 50 year old San Antonio treasure.



Ballet Folklorico de San Antonio has called 1008 Donaldson Ave its home for over 10 years serving the Jefferson/Monticello Community and the greater San Antonio area.

The bright painted walls, with pictures of past performances on them, reflect

the vibrancy of their mission and their long-standing dedication to their cause.

Ballet Folklorico de San Antonio (BFSA) was founded in 1965 as a non-profit organization, dedicated to the preservation of original and traditional dances of Mexico and Spain. Throughout these past five decades, the company has maintained high quality instruction and disciplined performances projecting all the aesthetic qualities of the origins of these dances.

The dance troupe, headed by **Emma Ramos** for more than four decades, has held many exciting performances, delighting crowds at *Hemisfair '68* and *Fiesta Noche del Rio. Texas Folklife Festivals* and annual performances at the *Texas State Fair* are other notable venues. They are a staple at many Fiesta events and have traveled to Mexico and throughout the United States for both performance and study.

"BFSA has developed a program offering from beginning dance techniques for young and new individuals, to supporting a full-time professional dance company and academy," Mark Molina, Co-Artistic Director of the company, recently told me. It's a delight to see Boni Ramos lead and nurture young students in the expressive traditional dances that have been the pride of Folklorico. As the lead dance instructor and Co-Artistic Director, Boni teaches with the passion of a seasoned performer and the grace that can only originate from the Alma. The academy has a dedicated and solid team of supporters and I understand Miss Dominga has been the lead seamstress for decades, confectioning the fl owing skirts requiring many yards of colorful fabric.

BFSA has an open enrollment: all ages and levels of dancers are welcome year round. Call (210) 478-7830. Tuitions are affordable. *Let's dance JNA!*

pectations for all the high schools in the district. The five year goal is to have all SAISD schools achieve an increase performance in reading and math, an increase from the current 33% in reading and 32% in math to 60%. Current state average is 45% in reading and 46% in math. He wants an increase in SAT/ACT scores from 5% to 43%, the national average. He also wants to see 80% of SAISD graduates attend a two year college, and 50% to attend a four year university, and from those graduates 10% attend top tier institutions. JNA supports Superintendent Martinez's initiative!

About the piece

"Dim Sum" was cut from rice paper with exacto knife, in 2006, the Chinese year of the dog, when it was first exhibited at a gallery in the Blue Star Complex. It portrays two of friends of the artist, a Chinese national and a South Korean from Brazil, dining at the Golden Wok restaurant while being served by a very young Eurasian waitress, who is pushing the dim sum cart. The 24/36" work, is sandwiched between 2 layers of plexiglass, the outer, being UV protected.

About the artist

Kathleen Trenchard is a native of New Orleans and graduate of Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, N.Y. with a Masters in Painting and Printmaking. Kathleen maintains a studio near downtown San Antonio. She has been researching, collecting, and working in traditional Mexican papel picado ever since she was introduced to the technique while visiting Huixcolotla, near the City of Puebla, Mexico, in the early 1990's. Her work continues to explore contemporary designs, applications and materials suitable for cut work using hammer and chisel.

Jefferson Community Garden: A Place to Grow and Nurture

This past Spring I became the new Jefferson Community Garden (JCG) Steward, essentially the garden coordinator and point person. Lately, I'd found myself worried about all I need to accomplish at the garden. The community garden, a place I loved to go, was becoming a chore in my mind and I hated that! Until September 12 when I witnessed a beautiful reminder that it's more than just lush plants and pretty garden plots that matter. It's what one experiences at a community garden that makes it so special.

It was the second Saturday of the month and the garden's regularly scheduled workday. I overslept (not hearing my husband turn off the alarm) and ran out the door with a couple of breakfast tacos he made wrapped in foil and only a few sips of coffee in me. I stepped onto our back porch and, as much as I dislike being hungry and harried, I saw it was a GLORIOUS morning to be in the garden - sunny, slightly cool and breezy. I could FEEL the promise of fall around the corner. It felt marvelous.

Shortly after I arrived Ramses and Gabino (two undergraduate students from Our Lady of the Lake University), Mateo (a graduate student from the University of Texas at San Antonio), and Liliana "Lily" Mireles Moreno (neighborhood resident showing her Mustang pride with her red and blue "Jefferson" tank top) appeared. We all agreed we couldn't have asked for more perfect weather for a garden workday, and you could sense everyone was glad to be outdoors experiencing this exquisite taste of fall.

The guys started working on one of the raised beds. It turned out Mateo graduated from OLLU, bringing an instant camaraderie with Ramses and Gabino. They talked about all things college, and their conversation was steady with intermittent laughter. I enjoyed hearing the students discuss similar experiences, and Mateo sharing insights as one just a little further along in his education.

Liliana and I tackled the raised bed next to the guys. We did some catching up on one another's lives including chatting about work. I hadn't realized the guys were listening in, and soon one of the undergraduates started asking Lily a slew of questions about her job as an accounting manager. Next thing I know, Ramses and Gabino stopped working on their garden plot to come over and direct all their attention to this conversation.



At this point, I also stopped my gardening to watch what's going on. In fact, I'm staring at this beautiful back-and-forth, watching Lily share her wisdom and experience regarding the nuances of her field and general career considerations as well as posing thoughtful questions to the students based on their responses. You couldn't have set up a more perfect spontaneous mentor/mentee experience! These guys came to contribute their time to a community garden for school service hours and left with the vocational insights of both a grad student and career professional. I heard one of the students say "Next time" which meant I had a happy volunteer eager to repeat their experience – a garden steward's dream come true!

Around noon the guys left, navigating their way to El Paraiso, keen to try the renowned paletas Lily and I kept raving about, and I hope they had just as good a time there as they did at the Jefferson Community Garden. Because that's really what a community garden is about. In tending the earth together we cultivate relationships that last when we leave.




