Time is Brain

F.A.S.T. is an easy way to remember the sudden signs of stroke. When you can spot the signs, you'll know that you need to call 9-1-1 for help right away. F.A.S.T. is:

F= Face Drooping – Does one side of the face droop or is it numb? Ask the person to smile. Is the person's smile uneven?

A= Arm Weakness – Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

S= Speech Difficulty – Is speech slurred? Is the person unable to speak or hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sen-



tence, like "The sky is blue." Is the sentence repeated correctly?

T= Time to call 9-1-1 – If someone shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call 9-1-1 and get the person to the hospital immediately. Check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared.

- 1. Sudden **NUMBNESS** or weakness of face, arm, or leg, especially on one side of the body.
- Sudden CONFUSION, trouble speaking or understanding speech. Sudden TROUBLE SEEING in one or both eyes. Sudden TROUBLE WALKING, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination. Sudden SEVERE HEADACHE with no known cause

A Moment With The Board

The June 14th CWCA meeting of volunteers was at the Pool Pavillion, where there was approximately 30 residents in attendance for the 3rd month in a row. Thank you all for taking the time to attend and share your thoughts. The Board had asked JCSO to attend our meeting and we had (3) officers available to answer neighbors questions. Lt Happ spoke about current police activity around the 7500 block of Fremont Dr. He told us it was a stolen vehicle they pinned into a culde sac, that then hit a patrol car and the suspect ran from the scene. The Deputies asked neighbors to report any suspicious activity to the Tip Line phone #303-271-5612, please be able to provide a description of the activity, along with license plate number, which is crucial. The recent spray paint tagging and baseball bat to car side mirrors is still an active case investigation. Some other neighbors are concerned about speeding and speed mitigation, speed bumps and more signage. Lt Happ took the address of Ontario Way & Zephyr Way and will be submitting a request for mobile speed trailers to be placed at each of these areas. Be advised it may take 3-4 weeks for the trailers to show up, due to increased need for them throughout the County. The Deputies also spoke about upcoming firework displays and that extra patrols will be in the area. If you can give the JCSO a correct address for illegal fireworks being expolded, it is asked that you please call the non-emegency dispatch #303-271-0211. Deputy Jamie Gonda, our Nextdoor spokesperson, is encouraging us to continue with a National Night Out event. CWCA was partnering with Shiloh House/ Target over the last few years, but they have since made a switch to hold their activity at Clement Park. We would like to try and have an ice cream social. If anyone is interested in heading up this event please contact the CWCAtalk@gmail. com. It was a pleasure to have (3) JCSO deputies at our meeting and everyone walked away with answers. The monthly agenda covered all upcoming events including Free swim nights, Yard of the Month, Dumpster Day & National Night Out. 3. There are two types of strokes: hemorrhagic or ischemic. An ischemic stroke occurs as a result of an obstruction within a blood vessel supplying blood to the brain. It accounts for 87 percent of all stroke cases. A hemorrhagic stroke occurs when a weakened blood vessel ruptures and spills blood into brain tissue. The most common cause for the rupture is uncontrolled hypertension (high blood pressure). The only FDA approved treatment for ischemic strokes is tissue plasminogen activator (tPA, also known as IV rtPA, given through an IV in the arm). tPA works by dissolving the clot and improving blood flow to the part of the brain being deprived of blood flow. If administered within 3 hours (and up to 4.5 hours in certain eligible patients), tPA may improve the chances of recovering from a stroke. A significant number of stroke victims don't get to the hospital in time for tPA treatment; this is why it's so important to identify a stroke immediately. If you're having a stroke, it's critical that you get medical attention right away. Immediate treatment may minimize the long-term effects of a stroke and prevent death. The most important question you need to answer is the LAST TIME KNOWN TO BE NORMAL. If you see symptoms note the time of day, what was on the TV or Radio etc. You only have a 3-4-hour window from LAST KNOWN NORMAL to get TPA which can break up a clot causing the stroke. REMEMBER 'TIME IS BRAIN' DO NOT delay calling 911 At the first sign of symptoms. 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How Does Your Clematis Grow?

We would love to see how your Clematis grows, send us a photo and short message on your clematis. We have many new residents that are looking for gardening information.

Clematis plants are among the most popular and attractive flowering vines grown in the home landscape. These plants include woody, deciduous vines as well as herbaceous and evergreen varieties. They also vary greatly among species, with different flowering forms, colors, and blooming seasons, though most bloom sometime between early spring and fall.

For proper care of clematis, clematis vines prefer sunny locations (at least six hours of sun needed for blooming) but the soil should be kept cool. An easy way to accomplish this is by planting some type of ground cover or shallow-rooted perennial plants around the clematis. A 2-inch layer of mulch can also be incorporated to keep the roots cool and moist. Growing clematis vines must be supported in some fashion as well. The type of support system is usually dependent on the variety grown. For instance, poles are acceptable choices for smaller growing clematis vines, which can range anywhere from 2 to 5 feet in height. Arbors may be more suitable for growing larger types, which can get 8 to 12 feet. Most varieties, however, do quite well growing along a trellis or fence.

Nextdoor is the private social network for you, your neighbors and your community. It's the easiest way for you and your neighbors to talk online and make all of your lives better in the real world. And it's free. Columbine West Civic Association will be posting information on Nextdoor.com to alert registered neighbors to upcoming events or community issues. Guideline Update: Treat everyone with respect.

2. When is a private message more appropriate than posting to the main newsfeed?

Personal disputes between neighbors should always be settled by private message (or offline), and neighbors should generally use private messages whenever they want to call someone's attention to something they have done wrong rather than posting to the neighborhood. Nextdoor should not be used as a way to shame neighbors. If a member is concerned about how Nextdoor is being managed in their neighborhood (including asking why a message was flagged or removed), they should always communicate their concerns via private message to the Leads of their neighborhood rather than posting to the neighborhood as a whole through the main newsfeed. Similarly, if a member has feedback about a neighbor's posting style or frequency, they should provide that feedback privately rather than publicly criticizing the member in the main feed. Finally, if someone is trying to work out the timing of when to pick up an item a neighbor is selling or giving away or having a dialog with a neighbor on the newsfeed that has become simply a back and forth between two people, those discussions should be conducted via private message.

3. Why don't you allow profanity?

Some people are comfortable with profanity; others are not. Out of respect for the people who are not, and in order to keep discussion helpful, neighborly, and polite, we request that members refrain from using profanity -- at least in the main newsfeed. If you create a group, however, using colorful language is more allowable, as long as the Guidelines are still being followed in other respects.

Can You Drink The Water?

The water crisis in Flint, Michigan, has many people concerned about the quality of their tap water. If you're one of them, take these steps first to protect you and your family from exposure to bacteria, lead, or disinfectant products in tap water:

- Let water run for at least 30 seconds.
 Water just out of the faucet can pick up lead if it's been sitting in pipes for several hours, so run your tap briefly before drinking or getting water for cooking.
- Don't use hot water. Hot water leaches lead from pipes faster than cold, so don't use it for drinking or cooking.
- Boil suspect water for three to five minutes. If you want to disinfect water, boiling it for three to five minutes evaporates chlorine (the chemical used to kill bacteria) and chlorination byproducts.
- Analyze it. If your water smells funny, leaves stains in your sink or laundry, or is cloudy, have it tested as soon as possible.

Your Commute May Improve Your Health

You may not like going to work in the morning, but the way you get there can have a positive influence on your overall health. The journal Lancet Diabetes &Endocrinology has published a study that found middle-aged people who walk, ride a bike, or even take public transportation to their workplace tend to have a lower body mass index (BMI) than those who regularly drive.
